POSSIBLE INTERNATIONAL DUES INCREASE

Board Submits Proposal To be voted at the 2022 Convention

Lions Clubs International supports clubs and members around the world so we can advance our global mission of service together. Our international support and the work of Lions Clubs International is fueled by the international dues of our incredible members.

In recent years, it has become increasingly clear that the services Lions Clubs International has been able to provide to members with the available budget is no longer in line with what Lions need and expect.

The International Board of Directors voted in October 2019 to approve an international dues adjustment resolution that would be voted on at the 2020 International Convention, but it was postponed due to the cancellation of our 2020 convention and the move to a virtual convention in 2021 as we adapted to the pandemic. The new dues adjustment model will be voted on at the 2022 International Convention.

The Board of Directors undertook an extensive review of Lions Clubs International's financials, including the implementation of substantial budget reductions. After much consideration, the board proposed to adjust dues \$7 over a three-year period.

Under the proposal, international dues would be adjusted according to the following schedule:

- •\$3 increase on July 1, 2023
- •\$2 increase on July 1, 2024
- •\$2 increase on July 1, 2025
- •

Why an international dues adjustment is needed

We realize the association has been reluctant to adjust dues over the years, and we have not adjusted international dues since 2011. The proposed adjustment will help cover our costs and allow us to suitably serve our members' needs. With that said, the Board of Directors did not take this issue lightly, nor are we minimizing the value of each dollar that our members contribute.

Multi-district support was approved by the governors at their previous meeting. The request is scheduled to go before the International Directors and has been recommended for approval.

The council agreed to endorse the candidacy of PID A.P. Sing, MD 322, India, for the position of International Third Vice President.

The Fayetteville has submitted a bid to host the Arkansas State Convention for 2023 which was accepted by the council.

WSB RECEIVES LCIF GRANT

World Service for the Blind was awarded a Lions Club International Foundation matching \$100,000 grant. The announcement was made by LCIF in mid-January.

WSB wants to remodel part of their existing campus to include a group home that provides permanent housing and a supportive services for individuals who are either elderly or have other disabilities, in addition to being blind. WSB has raised and used 3.5 million dollars for capital improvement and will include that as part of their matching funds for the 8.9 million dollar project.

The proposal was made to the Council of Chairs at their last meeting which they voted to support.

Grants such as this must be supported by the multi-district and the council chair at the time of its inception becomes the grant administrator for the duration of the project.

World Services for the Blind was founded by the Arkansas Lions and continues to be one of our state supported projects.



Every Christmas for the past several years, the Ozark Lions Club has provided toys for area kids. The club partners with Ozark/Altus Area Christmas Spirit for this huge service project. Working with the schools, Department of Human Services and churches and other groups, the Christmas Spirit committee solicits applications from 200-225 low income families. All applications are reviewed and those that are approved will receive a bag of food along with potatoes, milk and a turkey. The CS committee identifies families with children ages 0-12 and gives the Ozark Lions a list of the number of toys needed and the ages and gender of the children. The Lions members then schedule a day to shop for the toys. The number of toys is usually 200-250. Lions and community members then meet together with the Christmas Spirit committee to wrap all the toys. The toys are then labeled for each family, bagged in trash bags and matched to the food bags. Distribution is two days later. Hundreds if not thousands of needy children from North Franklin County have received gifts from Ozark Lions members over the years. Money for the project is raised through fundraisers and donations.

In his letter to International President Douglas X. Alexander, DGE Rowland explains how he reached out and received help for his friends from Boston Lion Mary Bura DiMasi.

He received a letter from President Alexander along with a presidential banner.

Last November, I reached out to a Lions Club in Boston, Massachusetts. I was reaching out for a friend in need. A couple of amazing things happened while preforming this task. The first one is that I got the number off Facebook, called that number and here it is Someone answered that call! After introducing myself the female voice interrupted me and said it was not a good time and asked if she could call me back in an hour. I said sure. So in about an hour, to my amazement, the female voice apologized and then introduced herself. She was a member of a Lions Club in Boston, I explained the reason for calling was that a friend of mine and his wife were up there for a fall foliage tour, but she got sick and was now in the hospital. I was trying to find a way to help them for a long term stay, but didn't know the area and my friends for sure didn't either. This female voice turned out to be Lion Mary Dimasi. She immediately went to work to help. She quickly made sure my friend knew the best routes to travel back and forth to the hospital daily. The subway was the method of travel. Also, he was not allowed to stay at the hospital and could only see his wife during visiting hours. Lion Mary made sure he had restaurant gift cards and cash, all donated from clubs in the area. After surgery, Lion Mary Damasi kept on checking in up to the point my friends made it back home to Arkansas.

I wrote a letter to our International President, Douglas X. Alexander, explaining all that Lion Mary did to help my friends. The second amazing thing was IP Alexander sent her a personal letter, small banner and pin thanking her for her kind service.

I tell this story because I want to ask you this question. Will you answer the call when your service is needed? It may be something you never expected. Lion's service starts like this! Will you answer the call?





A 105 year history — Part 3

1930-1939

It has been said that the EVENTS which took place in the decade of the thirties had more of a lasting impact in America and the World than any other decade.

America and the World than any other decade. After the Stock Market crash in October 1929, America and the World went into a deep Depression; in America the Great Dust Bowl hit the Midwest and war was looming in Europe which eventually involved the whole world. By 1933 unemployment had hit 25%; people were forging in garbage dumps for food and panic runs on banks threatened to bring down the entire financial system. The newly elected President, Franklin Roosevelt, promised and delivered, His "New Deal" – work relief projects that set the jobless to work building dams, bridges, highways, airports and school houses. Congress enacted reform such as Social Security, unemployment compensation and Federal Insurance of Bank Deposits. Through all of these events Lions International, the Lions of Arkansas and the Little Rock Lions Club kept the faith.

In June 1930 at the Fourteenth Annual Lions International Convention Lion Earle Hodges a former member of the Little Rock Lions Club was elected President of Lions International.

Quotes from the August 1930 "The Lions" magazine: "The new president had given many years to the service of Lionism and who by inclination and training was equipped to lead. At age nineteen he bought a country newspaper and became a publisher and editor. Three times he was elected secretary of state for Arkansas and he missed being Governor of Arkansas by only a few votes. As a Lion he had been a leader from the very beginning. Twice he was chosen president of the Lions Club of Little Rock and was credited with making it the biggest Lions Club in the world. It was then he founded the club bulletin, "The Jungle" and as its editor calling himself "The Jungle Guy" which won wide recognition as a writer. Three times the Arkansas clubs elected Lion Hodges their District Governor. Then International demanded his service and he was made a director. Two years later in 1927, he was elected vice president of International and has advance yearly until now he is president over 2,200 Clubs and 80,000 Lions".

On a Wednesday evening of November 18, 1931 the Lions of Arkansas held an "All Arkansas Banquet". The following article appeared in the Arkansas Democrat the following day on November 19, 1931.

"Lions Feast On Products Of Arkansas – Entertainment and food Abundant at State Wide Gathering Approximately 250 Lions and Lionesses representing Lions Clubs from widely scattered parts of the state attended the All-Arkansas banquet sponsored by the local organization, given Wednesday night at the Hotel Marion. The visitors brought their own contributions to the feast, which consisted entirely of food produced within the borders of the state – cigars, coffee and salt excepted. It was one of the most elaborate programs ever undertaken by the local club and included a huge variety of entertainment – singing, dancing, speaking, as well as the heaps of Arkansas-grown food on the festive board. William Johnson, feature writer and agricultural editor of the Arkansas Democrat, was the principal speaker of the occasion. While his talk was chiefly humorous, he spoke briefly on the abundance of the natural resources of the state, which should carry its people through the depression with little or no signs of hunger and want. The delegation from Fayetteville brought tomato juice and apples; DeValls Bluff, White river catfish; Fort Smith, ham, butter and bread; Blytheville, string beans; El Dorado, sweet potatoes and jellies; Stuttgart, rice; Mena, sweet potatoes and sorghum; Camden and Russellville, green vegetables; Jonesboro, sorghum; Harrison, apples; Hot Springs, water and ginger ale, while Little Rock provided steaks, bread, cigars, cabbage and pineapple salad and coffee and cream. The Arkansas Power and Light quartet, The Mazda Melody Men sang a few selections and a dance program was presented by students of the Dorothy Donelson School of Dancing. H. T. (Will) Terry, District Governor of Lions clubs, delivered the address of Welcome, while Fred A. Weise, president of the local club, served as toastmaster. The All-Arkansas banquet idea was sponsored by Mr. Weise and was generally regarded, especially after the dinner and entertainment, as a "wow" of a success".

on May 30, 31, 1932 with 148 Lions registered and over 200 Lions and guest participated in the convention with District Governor Will Terry of the Little Rock Lions Club presiding. Up until 1932 Arkansas only had one District Governor. By resolution adopted at the and "The Jungle"

1932 Convention Arkansas was divided into two Districts. A district north of the Arkansas River with 26 clubs and a district south of the Arkansas River with 25 clubs. Lion Will Terry was re-elected as District Governor for the South District and Charles Stuck from Jonesboro was elected District Governor for the North District of Arkansas. When Lion Will Terry was elected to the International Board of Directors two months later at the International Convention in Los Angeles, California he gave up his office as District Governor. Lion W. E. Silliman from Camden was chosen to fill the vacancy for the year 1932-1933 replacing Will Terry. Also, during the 1932 Convention the delegates adopted two activities for the year: Immunization of School children against diphtheria and the Lions Juvenile Braille Magazine. The Little Rock Lions Club elected to participate in both of these Service projects along with their Eye Glasses and eye examinations for school children as well as their other sight projects. Notes from the Clubs archives: "In 1933 when the banks throughout America were closed by order of President

Notes from the Clubs archives: "In 1933 when the banks throughout America were closed by order of President Roosevelt the Little Rock Lions Club was without funds to operate. The Hotel Marion Management notified the club Secretary that they had to have cash each week until the banks were opened again. The Board of Directors met to decide how to pay cash. One of the members was Will Rogers who was manager of the Bulk Plant of the Standard Oil Company in Little Rock and did only cash business. The Secretary contacted him to see if his company would lend the club enough money to take care of the meals at the hotel each week until the club could get their cash in the bank. Lion Rogers contacted his superior officers and came back with a much desired favorable reply. Lion Rogers was a real Lion and a life saver for the club. That was real Lionism in real action".

Despite efforts like this, many members did not have the money to pay their dues. As a result membership during those depression years dwindled in the Little Rock Lions Club and throughout Lions International. At the 20th anniversary of the club in 1936 there were three of the original 39 charter members still in the club. The total membership in the June 1936 roster stood at 103 active members. From a high of 188 members in the latter part of the 1920s the membership in the Little Rock Lions Club had dropped down to 104 members in June 1939.

Although the Little Rock Lions Club had declined in their membership, the club helped to spread Lionism in Arkansas by organizing three new Lions club during these years: Benton (1931); North Little Rock (1931); and Pulaski Heights (1937). The club also provided leadership in the state when Lion Hugo Norvell was elected District Governor for the 1934-35 Lions year. In addition International Director Will Terry had completed his two year term on the International Board and was elected District Governor in Arkansas for the 1937-38 Lions year over the South District in Arkansas.

During the latter years of the thirties the Little Rock Lions Club was instrumental in having the Little Rock City Council pass an ordinance giving blind persons holding canes the right of way. In addition, through the cooperation of Past Club President J. G. Burlingame the County Judge assisted a student at the Arkansas School for the Blind obtain permission to operate a newsstand in the County Court House. This was the beginning of the stand program which provided gainful employment to a great number of blind and visually impaired individuals. There will be more about this program and the establishment of Arkansas Enterprises for the Blind in the next Issue on the History of the Little Rock Founders Lions Club.

On September 1, 1939 Germany invaded Poland from the east inciting Poland's Allies, Great Britain and France to declare war on Germany. Thus a decade starting in a Depression ended with a War which would involve the whole world. Six years would pass before the struggle ended.
