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
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Greetings, Lions!

March was filled with excitement and purpose! The biggest highlight was welcoming another granddaughter! We were blessed with Greta's arrival a bit early, but everyone is healthy and thriving! Mabel is the best helper and this Nana's heart is full, again!

Back to business; foundation tours, more DGE training, and an unforgettable Disney themed Friendship Banquet! I was excited to have the opportunity to tour the Can Do Canines facility and learn more about the people that their dogs serve. I know we have Leader Dogs, which serve the blind and visually impaired, but the Can Do Canines are trained to serve those who need assistance because of hearing, mobility, seizures, diabetes, and autism. The stories of what these dogs do for those that need them are heartwarming. We only have a handful of dogs placed within 5M4 so let's help spread the word! At the U of M, we visited the Department of Otolaryngology and the Lions Voice Clinic. (Please see page 9). Returning to the Lions Voice Clinic brought back many memories, as I am well aware of the incredible work they do! It was interesting to hear about their research, explain the complexities of the voice, and the problems one can have. Seeing the Stroboscopy machine again (a founding gift to the Lions Voice Clinic) was a familiar sight. The MN Lions Hearing Foundations has also helped fund the newly opened Temporal Bone Lab. The advancements in technology for the doctors, surgeons, and students in this new lab are truly remarkable compared to the old one! What a gift!

To learn more about our efforts in assisting the eye bank, our next stop was the Lions Gift of Sight, owned by the MN Lions Vision Foundation. It is one of eight largest eye banks for transplant tissue distribution and ranked in the top four for research tissue distribution. We learned about the extensive use of corneal and eye tissue for both transplants and research. On June 30th, 2025, we will celebrate 100 years of partnering with Helen Keller to be Knights of the Blind in this crusade against darkness. What service project can you do to help celebrate this milestone? Another exciting revelation was the new era of discovery in the search for a cure for Type 1 Diabetes! These scientists were so eager to share their groundbreaking work and to show us around their labs. Their passion and excitement for the accomplishments and research work they are doing was something to see! They are making incredible progress in developing a limitless source of islets

for transplantation, increasing kidney transplant eligibility, and eliminating the need for long-term immunosuppression in transplant recipients. The Schulze Diabetes Institute at the U of M is at the forefront of these advances, attracting many talented researchers – this department is on fire and forging forward with passion! DIABETES INSTITUTE

A NEW AGE

Science has ethered an exchang few ear in delivering a bona fide cure for T1D. This new era will be defined by a limitless source of sites for transplant, increased eligibility for kidney transplants, and no need for long-term immunosuppression in transplant recipients. Your previous support enabled us to show diabetes reversal in people following islet transplantation and to make islet transplants survive long-term in transplanted monkeys without the need for anti-rejection drugs.

Inspired by these advances, many researchers joined the field and industry made a large commitment, building considerable momentum and delivering tangible successes:

- In ongoing clinical trials conducted by industry, >10 diabetic recipients have achieved insulin independence after transplantation of stem cell-derived islets.
- These results indicate that stem cellderived islet could soon provide an unlimited supply of islets for transplantation.

Diabetes is history, My family doesn't worry about it. Hypoglycemia and insulin aren't even in our vocabulary. We have quickly adapted to this new life (without diabetes), and it has been a wonderful gift"

ELIMINATION OF IMMUNOSUPPRESSION

A second key area in which significant progress has been made involves developing strategies to induce immune tolerance to transplanted islets and kidneys. Inducing immune tolerance to transplants would eliminate the need for immunosuppressive drugs, thereby decreasing the risks of infections, cancers, and other complications associated with these medications in transplant recipients.

The implications would be far-reaching.
Performing transplants without
immunosuppression would be transformative in
diabetes care and transplantation, analogous
to conducting phone calls without a land-line
and driving cars without gasoline.

Previously, our team was the first to induce tolerance to transplanted islets in monkeys, thereby allowing long-term diabetes reversal after islet transplantation without immunosuppressive drugs. This major accomplishment was published in the highly acclaimed publication Nature Communications.

By working with scientists, diabetologists, and our biotech partner, our larger team has:

Obtained clearance from the FDA to conduct clinical testing of our immune tolerance protocol to human islet transplants in patients with diabetes. Secured a multi-year award from NiH to apply the immune tolerance technology to kidney transplantation. The objective of these preclinical studies is to develop a safe and effective protocol for testing in humans who will undergo kidney transplantation.

WHAT DOES THIS MEAN FOR YOU?

In this new era, several novel clinical trials of islet transplantation are on the horizon, several with regulatory approval in place. For patients with diabetes to benefit to the fullest extent from these trials, we must be able to answer these questions.

"From which trial can I expect the most benefit?" In transplant trials in T1D, a key question is whether the autoimmunity, which caused diabetes decades earlier, has persisted and puts the transplanted islets at risk If so, a suitable study must be selected.

"I have diabetes and kidney failure, will kidney transplants w/o immuno suppression become possible?" The clinical protocol used to prevent islet cell rejection is being tailored so that it also prevents kidney (solid organ) transplant ejection.

"Will human islet cell transplants become a treatment option for my type 2 diabetes?" For a subgroup of people with type 2 diabetes, increasing their islet cell mass through transplantation (w/o the need for immuno-suppression) may cure T2D.



The 16th Annual Minnesota Lions Diabetes Foundation Research Update was held March 15, 2025 in St Cloud, MN. We heard from some of the University of Minnesota scientists who are conducting leading-edge research aimed at both preventing and curing diabetes. Faculty Research Presentations were given by:

Dr. Brian Fife - Curing Diabetes by Stopping the Body's Immune System

Dr. Sabarinathan Ramachandran and Dr. Singh - Bringing Immune Tolerance to the Clinic for People with Diabetes and Kidney Failure

Dr. Byrne - Generation of cells, tissues and organs in animals for the treatment of human disease

More than 29 million people in the United States are living with diabetes—a growing number that includes 340,000 people in Minnesota alone. Unfortunately, that number is on the rise. Dr. Byrne highlighted the tremendous human cost of kidney and heart disease. Kidney failure is one of the worst side effects of Diabetes. When disease management fails, Renal or Cardiac transplantation is necessary. Renal allotransplantation (human to human)....27,000 kidney transplants per year in the US. Cardiac allotransplantation.....(human to human) 4,100 transplants per year in the US. Unfortunately, there is a limited supply of human organs. He then went on to explain about Xenotransplantation as a solution. Clinical Xenotransplantation has begun: 2 pig to human heart transplants at the University of Maryland and 4 pig to human renal transplants (NYU Langone (2) and Massachusetts General Hospital (2). He highlighted those human cases. The pig heart transplant patients lived for 40 days and 60 days. They each had complications due to human blood products with anti pig antibody. This discovered after the fact. The pig kidney recipients had somewhat better results, with two of them still surviving 49 and 110 days post transplant.

Following the research presentations, guests had the chance to interact with the scientists one on one, learn more about their research, and ask questions. There were silent auction items where you had the opportunity to support the Minnesota Lions Diabetes Foundation in our mission.



Eighty-five years ago, three Detroit-area Lions founded Leader Dogs for the Blind. **Today, Top Dog Lions Clubs continue to be sustaining supporters of our mission.** Top Dog clubs are those who donate \$5,000 USD throughout the fiscal year. We recognize these clubs with a call from a client, a Top Dog lapel pin for each club member, a Top Dog certificate and patch for the club's banner, a Leader Dog plush, recognition on Leader Dog's Facebook page, and a Top Dog digital badge to display on their website and social media.

This year, we will celebrate more than 50 Top Dog clubs, including the Galveston County Cigar Lions Club, chartered in Texas in 2023. **Galveston County Cigar Lions Club** offers an atmosphere of fellowship for cigar enthusiasts and members look for ways to increase funding to serve their community. By being a volunteer puppy raiser, you and your family create life-changing moments, while helping a person who is blind or visually impaired regain independence.



WHAT DOES A PUPPY RAISER DO?

- Devote 12-15 months of your time, energy and love to raising a puppy
- Provide daily care, such as feeding and walking
- Teach basic commands based on Leader Dog guidelines
- > Introduce the puppy to a variety of people and environments
- Receive tons of ongoing support from Leader Dogs for the Blind



There are multiple puppy raising options to fit your lifestyle.

ONE HOUSEHOLD

This traditional way to puppy raise is perfect for families, college students, active singles, retired couples and empty nesters.

CO-RAISING (PRIMARY AND SECONDARY RAISER)

This option is for someone who wants to share duties with a person from another household.

PASS-ALONG

One raiser has the puppy for the first six months and a second raiser has the puppy for the next six months.





Individuals with pet weight/size restrictions or who may be more comfortable handling a younger, lighter dog can raise for the first six months, while individuals who prefer a dog that already has foundational behaviors may prefer raising the last six months.

CORPORATE

Employees can raise puppies individually or in teams of up to three.

- Great for employee engagement and social responsibility
- Provides marketing, traditional media and social media opportunities



For college students raising on campuses approved by Leader Dog.

- Must participate in campus puppy club and meet with assigned puppy counselor
- > All supplies, veterinary care and food paid by Leader Dog
