

What is an endowed chair or professorship?



It is the highest academic award that a university can bestow on a faculty member, and it lasts as long as the University exists. It is one of the most prestigious academic positions a professor can achieve.

Thus, it is both an **HONOR** to the named holder of the appointment and an **enduring tribute** to the **MINNESOTA LIONS HEARING FOUNDATION**.

In 2011, the Hearing Foundation pledged \$1 million to the establishment of the endowed chair at the University of Minnesota and in 2021 completed the funding. We are now waiting to share the name of the professor of the Otolaryngology department who will be the first one to hold the chair.

Endowed faculty chairs are crucial for recruiting and retaining the highest-quality faculty. The greatest institutions have the **best minds**, the **most-creative researchers** and the **most-engaged teachers**, which attracts the **brightest students**. Having endowed faculty means students get to rub elbows with the most talented scholars in the world.

For **the Minnesota Lions**, this means that any time the professor speaks, presents a research paper, or receives an award, **our name** will be included, sharing in the prestige and the acknowledgement.

The perspective candidate for this position has been doing research and clinical trials that show that combining sound and electrical stimulation of the tongue can significantly reduce **TINNITUS**, commonly described as "ringing in the ears." They also found that therapeutic effects can be sustained for up to 12 months post-treatment.

We hope to announce the candidate soon. Stay tuned for more!

Dear Leader Dog Chairs/Trustees,

You may be asked, "What happens to a career changed Leader Dog?" If a future Leader Dog is not destined for a life as a guide dog, we first look to other organizations that may be able to benefit from the characteristics of that dog. One agency, who receives all of their service dogs from us, is the Canine Advocacy Program. From their website, "The Canine Advocacy Program (CAP) was developed to provide advocacy services to child victims utilizing a highly trained dog to help alleviate the anxiety associated with being involved in the criminal justice system." Our local community of Oxford, Michigan, suffered a devastating school shooting last week. It has impacted our staff, volunteers and Lions. The following article gives a little insight to how our canines (previous and current) have helped make a positive impact in the healing process. Together we serve,

When Oxford High students return, at least 50 support dogs will greet them

Those are dogs, but not just any dogs.

They work for the Ingham and Oakland counties' prosecutor's offices offering comfort to victims, usually children, who have to testify against an abuser.

On Friday, they were among 13 dogs scattered throughout Oxford elementary and middle schools for the half day of classes. The dogs were there to ease anxiety for students who were returning for the first time since the Nov. 30 shooting at Oxford High School that left four students dead.

"I have seen the impact it has in having dogs there to comfort people, so when I got the call ... we did what we could," said Dan Cojanu, the founder of Canine Advocacy Program, or CAP, and a retired Oakland County Prosecutor's Office Victim Services supervisor.

"This affects everybody," he said. "The peripheral damage impacts everyone. The teachers, the kids ... it's been an emotional morning. It's a healing force we're seeing today." Returning to a crime scene

Earlier in the week, the Oxford school district leaders called Cojanu, requesting support dogs for returning students and staff.

Cojanu trains the dogs for the work they do with trauma victims and he has 32 dog teams that are part of CAP in Michigan.

He coordinated bringing five dogs from various organizations, such as prosecutor's offices, and eight "Ambassador" dogs from Leader Dogs for the Blind.

"What I am seeing is the kids are coming back to school today and they know something very traumatic happened in their school district," Cojanu said. "They get to spend the morning petting puppies. It's a good distraction and very welcoming."

But Cojanu is bracing for early January when he has to get at least 50 therapy dogs ready to be inside Oxford High School when the doors are expected to reopen, he said. "There are 1,600 students coming back to a crime scene," Cojanu said. "The number is staggering. We plan to escort these kids to their lockers, classroom, counseling center

... whatever they need, that's what we'll provide." Oxford Community Schools officials did not respond to requests for comment.

'They need somebody'

The dogs are a proven comfort to people suffering from trauma, said Jessica Carls, who is Kory's handler and a victim advocate for the Ingham County Prosecutor's Office. "Having a dog in these situations with kids helps distract them from the circumstances of why they're there," Carls said. "(Kory) comforts them, she plays with them, she snuggles with them, I've seen her realize and know these kids are upset and they need somebody."

That's exactly what happened on Friday at Oxford Elementary.

"There was a girl today who had traumatic events happen to her recently," Carls said. "Kory instantly walked in the room, went to that girl and laid at her feet without any direction by anyone."

A million-dollar dog

Carls and Kory, a 4-year-old golden retriever, arrived at Oxford Elementary at 8:30 a.m. to greet kids at the drop-off area.

Some of the children had older siblings who attend Oxford High School and were there the day of the shooting. Those children were worried, Carls said. But many faces lit up and smiles broke out when they saw Kory and ran to pet her, Carls said. One child offered Carls "a million dollars" if she would let the child take Kory home.

Kory started off life at Leader Dogs for the Blind. But the agency assigned Kory a "career change" when she did not fit as a leader dog. Ingham County now owns Kory, but she lives with Carls. The two are part of CAP, where Cojanu trained Kory for trauma work with the Ingham County Prosecutor's Office.

Carls said she is used to working with Kory in the courtroom, where the dog often sits for hours next to child victims as they testify, giving them courage and keeping them calm. So the four hours Carls and Kory spent Friday at Oxford Elementary were uplifting, Carls said.

"It made me feel good that I could do something to help," Carls said. "We all feel helpless when these types of things happen, so this is a way to help." Dogs sense the sadness

The first time Cojanu brought CAP dogs to a community trauma event to comfort victims was five years ago.

It was two days after the July 11, 2016, shooting at the Berrien County Courthouse. Two courthouse officers were fatally shot on duty when an inmate, on his way into a courtroom, overpowered a deputy and took his gun. A woman was accidentally injured in the melee too.

The dogs came to comfort the county employees who were in the courthouse the day of the shooting.

"It was emotionally exhausting for us and the dogs," Cojanu said. "The dogs take all this in and they pick up and sense the sadness. Everyone I talked to said their dogs crawled up in the backseat and went to sleep afterward."

Cojanu said most of the support dogs who do the trauma work come to CAP from Leader Dog, so they are already highly trained. He trains them to stay still and behave appropriately in a courtroom, he said.

In fact, on Friday, Leader Dog provided eight of its "Ambassador dogs" to Oxford's return to school, said Rachelle Kniffen, Leader Dog director of communications. One, a blonde Labrador named Coco, went to Oxford Elementary.

"We've had dogs that go out, not for a situation like this, but go to university campuses during finals week so when the students need a break and need to relax, the dogs go in," Kniffen said. CONTINUED ON THE NEXT PAGEww

The dog handlers are highly trained too.

They are mostly people who have degrees in psychology and sociology who are familiar with working with trauma cases and know what to say to victims, Cojanu said. There is also ongoing trauma training by the Prosecuting Attorneys Association of Michigan, he said.

"There's a lot of interaction. You have to know what to say and when to say it, you don't just stand there with the dog and the magic happens," Cojanu said. "The dog is a tool for the advocate to use."

The Oakland County Prosecutor's Office has used support dogs since January, when it got Lance and Frieda, said Betsey Hage, chief of administration for the office. Lance, an 8-year-old Labrador retriever, and Frieda, a 4-year-old golden retriever, typically work at the courthouse in Pontiac. When requested by prosecutors, the dogs support a victim of a crime, which could include meeting with victims or going with a victim to court.

"The court process for most people — not just children — is a scary and intimidating process and to provide an animal for support is helpful," Hage said.

Cojanu, who started CAP in 2011, has spent decades working with victims and has seen the difference dogs make.

"It's huge when you see a kid smile after a court hearing," Cojanu said. "You know there's been an impact and the dogs do that."

Cajanu only has 30 dogs lined up for opening day at Oxford High School now, but he will push on to get more, ensuring those students and faculty have the animals to comfort their pain.

"I think everybody is saying the same thing, 'If there's an opportunity to support that community, you do what you can' and this is what we can do."


Local Lions clubs donate to 'Coats for Kids'

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

Local news is for everyone! The Lions Reading Program for the Visually and Physically Impaired provides a means for the visually and physically impaired to be kept informed by the hearing of local newspapers read and broadcast through online, through an app, or your smart speaker.

The Lions Reading Program for the Visually and Physically Impaired started with an event the Fergus Falls area in 1992. Lion John Bloom wrote a Letter to the Editor of the Fergus Falls Daily Journal explaining the thing he missed most when he lost his sight was walking into the cafe in the morning and discussing what the local newspaper had to say about local issues. He asked if there was any way they could fill that gap.

Interested people in Fergus Falls including an editor of the newspaper, State Services for the Blind, and representatives of the local Lions Clubs got together and the program was developed. In the next few months, readers were tested and trained. A small transmitter unit was made and installed in a room furnished by Bethlehem Lutheran Church. On April 1, 1993, the first broadcast of The Daily Journal went on the air with special radios that picked up the transmission. We now celebrate the 28th year of our program.

The broadcast has expanded to include local weekly newspapers from: Battle Lake, Frazee, Vergas, Grant County, Henning, New York Mills, Parkers Prairie, Pelican Rapids, and Perham. The broadcast, as of this year, it is available through your computer, online at Radio Talking Book Minnesota/ State Services for the Blind.

Volunteers are the heart of the program! An hour of broadcasting takes place Monday through Saturday at 7pm due to the commitment of much appreciated volunteers: Lions and others from the public. Volunteers read with a partner and they dedicate 2 hours, in one evening, each month, for preparation and reading to our listeners. This reading program is very cost effective because of many hours of volunteer time.

We are in need of volunteers. Any interested people can contact Lion Ginny Paulson (218-736-5109) or Pamela Shroden (218-731-2954). It is an easy and important way to make a wonderful difference in our communities.

This is a nonprofit organization. It is governed by representatives from Riverside Fergus Falls Lions Club, Elizabeth Lions Club, consumers, and readers.
