CHANGE IN CONVENTION RULES

Effective in Buffalo

The MD20 convention in all dues mut be paid by MAY 1st. Delinquent dues may be paid and good standing acquired up to fifteen (15) days at any time prior to the close of credential certification, as such closing time shall be established by the rules of the respective convention.

(1) Multiple dues and fees paid in full; and (2) No unpaid balance of International dues and fees greater than U.S. \$10; and (3) No unpaid Lions Club International account balance greater than U.S. \$50, outstanding ninety (90) days or more.

This will be in effect at the MD20 convention in Buffalo where all dues most be paid by MAY 1st, 2016 with certification ending May 15th, 2016.


PENDLETON LIONS

THE LIONS SEE UPDATES - ONE & THREE



As you know, the MD20 endorsed multiple district project, Lions SEE, is going through a transition. This has resulted from several unexpected circumstances that will be listed below. But first please understand that the Lions SEE program is not ending or closing. AND the Board of Directors is operational! Only the Ross Eye Institute is closed.

LIONS SEE has joined forces with LCI's Kids Sight. Please be aware that Lions KidSight is an international program whose purpose is to promote children's eye screening throughout Lionism in both the USA and the Lions' world. Importantly, at some point, KidSight will request the *basic numeric results* from all Clubs' screenings to be entered in a worldwide tally system for studies of young peoples' screening needs. SEE is providing the mechanism.

The paramount reasons for the modification we are making are:

- The new screeners (SPOT and Plusoptix) provide on-the-scene results, and the Sure Sight has a similar capability; thus central follow-up is not needed.
- The need for an office staff is now irrelevant.
 Donations for other purpose will still be needed.
- The new screeners provide for greater utilization and sharing, offering potentially increased screening in each district.
- Follow-up will be conducted locally allowing for both speed and response in processing.

The need for oversight continues and with assistance from each district in MD20, Lions SEE will provide it. Briefly:

- The SEE Board is operational and shortly will have three members elected from each participating district.
- Each district is asked to establish a minimum subcommittee of six, consisting of the three elected Board members and an appropriate additional number to provide oversight, training, outreach, program promotion, and liaison with the central Board.
- SEE has prepared new forms, stickers, practices, promotions, and liaison for all the districts, thereby enhancing the program in every possible way. Some of this will require funding; more on that in a later communication.

AND THERE WILL BE A MULTIPLE DISTRICT TRAINING SESSION FOR ALL CLUBS ON JANUARY 9th IN SYRACUSE COVERING ALL ASPECTS OF THE NEW LIONS SEE. PUT IT ON YOUR CALENDAR NOW.

Simply put, as a result of the need to redesign and change forms, the use of new more effective devices, and our partnership with Lions KidsSight, the old is no longer "BEST PRACTICE." Even if your club is now using all the prior procedures of screening, there are new requirements, knowledge, and practices that need to be presented, promoted, and implemented.

SEE is particularly fortunate to have speakers who will be able to provide you with that new look. They are:

- SEE President Lion Dave Rutkowski and Board of Directors' members will present new operational practices: newly developed forms, follow-up procedures, reporting requirements, public relation ideas. An open Q&A session will also be held.
- Lion PID Dr. Ed Cordes (LCI Kids Sight Chair) and Lion Dr. James Reynolds (Ross Exec. Director) discuss clinical issues, medical concerns, tips for resolving screening problems.
- Cyd McDowel, PlusOptic, President and Steve Lomonoco, Welch/Allyn, Specialty Marketing Sales Mgr., will present information about their devices. Private discussions will be possible.
- Lunch is available for a small fee.





DISTRICT 20-0

AMENIA: In September, food provided for Community Day. This was our first year at a new venue in conjunction with a Community Day held at the High School in our local town in October. We did a walk-a-thon to raise funds and awareness for the JDRF.

BETHEL: In September, a Knight of the Blind Plaque was presented to a member for her Sight and Hearing work. During October, 232 children were screened at Head Start locations in Monticello and Woodbourne, New York with 22 referrals.

CORNWALL: The Halloween Art Contest, initiated and sponsored by the Lions since 1996, is always held the Saturday before Halloween. In November, the Club presented 1st and 2nd place awards for best Peace Posters. The Club's first place recipient also won 3rd place in the 20-O Lions convention competition.

ELDRED: In September, the Club provided help with food and admissions for St. Baldrick's Day. In November, the Club helped Santa prepare his sled for the voyage to Port Jervis to spread Christmas Joy to the young and old.

GOSHEN: Yearly in October, members prepare and serve dinner to 20 to 25 of the less fortunate in the community. Also, we collected 155 pairs of eyeglasses in October and 175 in September. In November we collected 114 bags of food and two cases of jelly for the Goshen Food Pantry. We were helped in our efforts by 13 members of the Goshen Leos Club who brought the food up the stairs and helped restock the shelves of the Food Pantry.

GERMANTOWN: In September, club participated in Hudson Valley Apple Festival.

GREATER WASHINGTONVILLE: In October, 900 bags for our 7th annual food drive were prepared and distributed in Washingtonville and approximately 450 full bags of nonperishable food were picked on 11/7/15 and delivered to our local food bank.

HUDSON: In October, several members volunteered at the Fireman's Home for Dalmatian Day. The community came for activities and tours of the property to support retired firefighters. Used winter coats were collected from boxes distributed throughout the community. After being cleaned by local dry cleaners, who donated their services, the coats were brought to a thrift store for distribution to anyone in need. The event was sponsored by the local radio station and heavily publicized on the air.

HURLEY: On 10/5/15, our club held its 16th Annual Golf Tournament at Wiltwyck Golf Club with over 120 golfers participating. In November, Lions wired the Children's Addition at the New Hurley Library and helped Boy Scout Troop #20 (which we sponsor) to collect food and old electronic equipment. Also, we filled six grocery baskets for needy families in the Hurley area.

HYDE PARK: In September, 2 hearing aids purchased for person in community. Transportation for testing and fitting provided by club. In October, the Hyde Park lions joined the town farmers market and held a flea market. In November, we collected glasses.

JEFFERSONVILLE: In October, a \$200 donation was made by the Club to Ride 2 Survive, a local non-profit organization. All funds raised by this organization are given back to Sullivan County residents who are battling cancer, for travel expenses. In November, Club paid for an eye exam for a high school student.

KINGSTON: In Sept., members of the Kingston Lions Club sold the club's cookbooks at the Uptown Kingston Farmers' Market. For over 30 years the Lions Club has hosted a free roast beef dinner in November. This year 220+ were served by Kingston Lions members, along with staff and their families from Rondout and Ulster Savings Bank. The Kingston Lions Club band the Roar'n Pride provided entertainment.

LIBERTY: The club collected 342 paperback & hardcover books, and magazines and donated to the Sullivan Co. Volunteers for Literacy to assist in its fundraising for charitable activities. Since 2012 approximately 8,000 books, CD's, and video tapes have been collected and delivered.

MAMAKATING: In September, 4 members were trained in Plus Optix. In October, the Club held a Silent Auction fundraiser with walk and tour at Basha Kill Winery. Then, a Halloween Parade at a local school with pumpkins supplied to all students. In November, collected 100 pairs of glasses and 5 hearing aids.

MIDDLETOWN: In September, over 4 days, Lions from Middletown, Pine Bush and Goshen clubs screened 218 prekindergarten and kindergarten children attending 4 elementary schools in the Pine Bush School District: 22 children referred. Club members volunteer at Hand in Hand Adult Day Care. In October, after a club member filled out the required paperwork, a client at Hand in Hand, also a WW II Veteran, was selected as one of the veterans flying to Washington D.C. for the day to be honored. He served in the Pacific from 1944-46 and flew transports as a member of the Army Aircorp. Our No Kid Hungry Program began on October 15. During the 2015-2016 school year, backpacks will be filled every Thursday morning for distribution to 3 elementary schools in the Middletown School District. The backpacks are distributed by the schools' social workers and/or principals to children who are identified as food insecure going into the weekend: they receive free breakfast and free lunch the days they are in school but do not have adequate food on the weekend. Our goal is 60 backpacks each week - which means 20 backpacks to each of our three elementary schools.

During the month of October, 220 pair of eyeglasses were collected for recycling. During November, we screened on 4 days at two preschool programs in our community. A total of 106 youngsters were screened (ranging in age from 14 months to 5 years); 29 were referred.

The Middletown Lions Club had 26 entrees for this year's Peace Poster contest with one of our entrees chosen as the winner at the District 20-O convention. The annual holiday wreath, a tradition begun perhaps 40 years ago, was created and placed on the facade of a former bank building in downtown Middletown on Friday, November 27. The greeting attached to the decorated wreath sends holiday wishes to the community from the Middletown Lions Club. Lions are involved in decorating and carrying it to the exact location. And for that many years Mr. Lewis of the Lewis Sign Company comes in with a crane to put the wreath in place at the top of the building. Mr. Lewis volunteers his time and his equipment and recently stated "I know the holiday season really begins when I put the wreath up." 3 hearing aids and 265 pairs of glasses collected. The warming station in Middletown opened on November 15 and is open every day of the week. It is equipped to serve up to 30 people a night.

TOWN OF MILLERTON: In October, an evening of fun for the community youngsters including contest, candy, refreshments and prizes.

NEW WINDSOR: In October, EmergencyOne held its annual Children's Health & Safety Expo with the Newburgh Enlarged City School District Autumn Art Show and invited the New Windsor, Cornwall, and Newburgh clubs to participate. In November, the New Windsor and Newburgh began discussing a joint fundraiser. Collected 138 pairs of glasses.

NEWBURGH: In October, the club had pre-k vision screenings. 291 pairs of glasses and 3 hearing aids dropped off. Assisted New Windsor at EmergencyOne with pre-k vision screening.

NINE PARTNERS: In November, the Club provided SEE screening to over 700 children since Oct 2105, conducted a road-side cleanup, and provided food cards for multiple families for both Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners.

NORTHERN COLUMBIA: September's 2 day tag sale required 4 days to set up and 3 days to tear down. In October, 308 pairs for eyeglasses, 60 pair of sunglasses and 1 pair of safety glasses were delivered to the Eye Bank in Albany. \$200 was given to each of our local libraries: Kinderhook, Valatie and North

Chatham. In November, sponsored the blood drive in Kinderhook. We made phone calls, provided baked goods and manned the refreshment table to talk to the donors. 60 people signed in to donate blood.

OTISVILLE: In November, monies donated to help local churches food pantries and to help underprivileged students in our school district for the holidays.

PAWLING: In September, we collected 95 bars of soap from members which was donated to local organization to supplement low income families. In October, 50/50 holiday raffle started. In November, we had a workday to clean up our meeting building at Murrow Park. Activities included washing windows, tables, walls, and floor. Our club donated \$40 worth of toilet paper to the resource center to those in need.

PINE BUSH: In September, our club donated to the Wounded Warrior project in honor of a member's father. Our annual Town Harvest Festival in October was a great success and included a wheelbarrow raffle; we sold our first aid kits. Eye screenings at 3 schools and several referred. 10/6/15 Blood Drive gathered 42 units.

PLEASANT VALLEY: In September, the Club held its Bikeathon, a 25 mile and 10 mile bike ride in the area to support fundraising activities. In October, 206 pairs of eyeglasses and one hearing aid with batteries collected. Club working with local authorities to sponsor a Halloween youth parade.

RHINEBECK: Prepared and delivered Thanksgiving dinners. STANFORD: In October, 115 pairs of glasses collected and one member learned how to use new camera and screened 140 children at the Astor School in Poughkeepsie.

TOWN OF DEERPARK: In September, participated in local Fall Festival & Community Day. In October, club members celebrated 36th anniversary with a Game Night dinner. Plusoptix SEE training for club members. In November, members attended installation of Leo Club.

TOWN OF FALLSBURG: In November, annual dinner with 30 attendees at local hospital where we donated \$3,000.

TOWN OF HIGHLAND: In October, sold 120 dozen donuts for a fundraiser.

TOWN OF WOODBURY: In September, fall cleanup from several miles of road the Club sponsors. In October, bulbs sold to support Club and to raise money for future community needs. On Halloween, the Club participated in the Woodbury Truck or Treat, a community-wide trunk or treat at the Smith Clove Elementary School in Central Valley, NY. The event, designed to keep young children off the street at what can be a dangerous time, drew hundreds of children and many local business and community organizations. It also provided a forum to explain to parents what the Lions club does both locally and nationally. In November, 3 club members attended the District 20-O Convention and completed training for PlusOptix Training.

TRI-VALLEY: In September, 3 members attended the Plus Optix training provided by Sullivan County Sight and Hearing. In conjunction with the Sullivan County Sportsmen Association, we provided free soft drinks and ice cream for youth participating in the Youth Day Celebration. In October, the Club provided beverages for the crowd attending the Daniel Pierce library pumpkin party fundraiser. 104 pairs of eyeglasses collected and donated \$300 to purchase school supplies for our schools backpack program. In November, 2 lions were certified to operate the Plus Optix Vision Screener. Our club submitted a Peace Poster for District Judging. We donated \$300 to our local Cub Scout pack to assist with camp sponsorships for 2016. We have sponsored this scout pack since 1971.
