LEWISTON LIONS

Albert Lewis III, a Niagara Wheatfield graduating senior for the class of 2015, was awarded a \$500 scholarship from the Lewiston Community Lions. Lions John & Theresa Tourbin



were present at the awards luncheon to present Albert with his well-deserved check.

The Lewiston Community Lions offer a \$500 yearly scholarship to a Native American High School senior, living on the Tuscarora Reservation, based solely on their volunteer actions and community service. Lewis has helped on the Tuscarora Nation by volunteering at their Health Fair, the Nations Annual Picnic, Tuscarora Nation Health Center, and assisted the Sanborn Ladies Auxiliary.

In addition to his volunteer work, he serves as a Lewiston Police Explorer, in which he works directly with the Lewiston Police officers to assist with patrol functions, special events and traffic control. Lewis will be attending Fredonia State University in the fall, where he hopes to further his law enforcement knowledge and obtain the experience and qualifications to further serve his community as a police officer. As a Native American living on the Tuscarora Reservation, he would like to succeed in dispelling the stereotype and negative ideology around what it means to be a police officer.

"Who I am today is completely shaped by where I come from and everything I endured. Therefore, I am using all of my experiences to drive myself to pursue a college degree, despite the financial obstacle", stated Lewis.

Lewis wants to be a model for future graduates and generations of the Tuscarora Nation by successfully obtaining a higher education degree, and wants to teach community members to trust the educational system despite downfalls in life. He wants students to use school as an anchor to fall back on when doubting their futures success.

"The Lewiston Community Lions are proud to offer their support, and wish Albert much success in obtaining his dream", stated club president Regina Cecconi.



EYEGLASS DONATIONS

On August 13th, Lions and volunteers came together at South-side Trailers, Lion Zappia's current place of employment, for a work party to sort through hundreds of boxes of donated eyeglasses. The day began with comments from District Governor Nancy Luckman and an invocation by Deacon Dan Mackowiak of Niagara Catholic High School. PDG Reinagel then directed workers into groups at tables brought by a number of the volunteers and the sorting began in earnest. Hot dogs cooked under the direction of DG Luckman, pop, water and a variety of snacks satisfied over 75 Lions (from 14 Clubs -Amherst, Boston, Clarence, Evans Township, Gasport, Grand Island, Pendleton, Kenmore, Lancaster, Orchard Park, Sheridan Drive, South Buffalo/Lackawanna, Town of Niagara



and Youngstown) and volunteers who worked tirelessly to sort eyeglasses, sunglasses, eyeglass cases, cellphones, and ink cartridges into separate cartons (donated by Norampac in Lancaster). Several of the volunteers drove their vehicles filled with cartons of eyeglasses for recycling (100 cartons in all totaling over 100,000 pairs of eyeglasses) to Walmart for shipment to the New Jersey Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center.

Going forward, instructions are available on the Lions District 20-N web site for our new recycling program to prepare glasses for delivery to Walmart locations throughout District 20-N.

We filled a total of 1,889 backpacks, which equaled 13,223 meals plus over 7,500 snack items for those youngsters identified as "food insecure" on weekends!

BRENTWOOD ISLANDERS LIONS CLUB AND THE SUFFOLK LIONS VISION SCREENING TEAM PROVIDE VISION SCREENING AT BRENTWOOD FIRE DEPARTMENTS FIRE PREVENTION EVENT

On October 24, the Brentwood Islanders Lions Club joined with the Suffolk Lions in providing Vision Screening to those attending the Brentwood Fire Department's Annual Fire Prevention Event. This Vision Screening event was coordinated by Suffolk Lions District Governor Manny Vidal and Brentwood Islanders President Roland Jimenez.

The District 20-S Vision Screening Team utilizes a Vision Screener (Spot made by Welch Allynn) to test for visual errors i.e., Myopia (near sightedness), Hyperopia (far sightedness) and astigmatism, Anisometropia (unequal refractive power), Starbismus (eye misalignment), Anisocoria (unequal pupil size. The Vision Screener prints out the results of the exam immediately and the results are given to the person that was examined, to the parent or guardian depending on the age of the individual being screened. If the results indicate a need for further testing the team suggests that the client contact their eye care professional for a follow up and that they make an appointment for a comprehensive eye examination.
