I have attended all my Official club Visits except for London West. I have been in communication with the club and trying to get them to attend a zone meeting or invite me to one of their gatherings. I have held two zone advisory

meetings, with the last one being January 7th being hosted by the London East Lions Club. The meeting was very well attended. Our guest speaker was from The Alcohol and Gaming commission of Ontario and he gave us a lot of valuable tips for hosting our fundraisers. We have been discussing different ideas for a zone project, many clubs volunteered some ideas. The clubs have until January 31 to make their decision and then I will decide what our cause will be after I receive all of the club results. I would not only like to give a financial donation but I would also like to coordinate a service zone project with the organization we decide to donate to. All of the clubs have been very active serving their community. I see their presence on Facebook and that is such a great way to reach out to their community and beyond. I get so many comments oh I saw the Lions on Facebook, which starts a good conversation if they are not already Lions. I encourage my clubs to grow their membership any way they can, and also to build a good relationship with the other clubs in the zone to build stronger communities, and to help each other with their fundraising goals. A summary of Zone 4 Activities Thorndale Lions – They have hosted two bingos, one in October and one in December. They held a community breakfast in October and are holding another one this morning...that's one way to get out of a district meeting. They hosted a Santa Claus Parade and collected 705 pounds of food for the food bank. They recommend to support Matty Wilson Walker as a zone project. They are also selling trip of the month tickets. Keep up the good work, and remember I bought a book of tickets and love to travel!! Hyde Park Lions Club – They have inducted one new member, and will induct two more in February. They presented the Bill Sells Scholarship to two graduating students of St Andre Bassette Catholic SS School. Hosted a BBQ at Parkway Gardens in support of Northwest London Resource Centre. Held a fall cleanup of the highway and the park they adopted. They hosted a very successful Santa Claus Parade despite having to start from scratch. They Hosted Breakfast with Santa with the Hyde Park Business Improvement Association. Helped with the Salvation Army Kettles. I encourage Hyde park Lions to Keep up the great work. So proud of the great progress you have made this year. Keep going strong. London East Lions – They cooked up hot dogs at a hockey event at Robinson Mitsubishi, a great way to get some visibility. They run a monthly bingo at Bingo country. They have assisted elderly neighbours, the visually impaired, and the youth in their community. They assisted the Salvation Army with their kettle drive. A very big announcement was made on October 15 after several years of meeting with the city of London. It has been voted unanimously in favour of the East Lions Community Centre as

the official name of the new building at East Park Lions Park in London. The London East Lions plan to host a free family swim monthly and continue to negotiate with the city other ways to serve the community through this new centre. I am so proud of the London East lions Club, this will give you so much exposure and lots of room to grow. Congratulations!! **Lambeth Lions Club** – The club roster stands at 19 members. They have had a transfer from Dorset Lions Club recently. They held their annual memory Box Fundraiser and it was another sold out success. They make approximately 60 boxes a year. In 2019 the club delivered 48 boxes to the hospital. 30 to PCCU and 18 to the NICU. They have collected over 500 pairs of socks, and well over 200 pair of glasses. They volunteer every month to the blood donor clinic. They held a breakfast with Santa. They participated in the Hyde Park Santa Claus Parade. They delivered hampers with the London Chaplaincy. They helped with Salvation Army Kettle. They made 8 donations to the community – effective speaking, London Knitting group, Lambeth Girl Guides, Canadian Young Lions Retreat, Eyes Right, Lambeth Christmas Lights, John Allen, Madison Wilson Walker. Although you are a small club, you really do mighty things. Thank you for your strong community involvement. I was very impressed that they were they only club in the zone who was working on a membership plan. Keep up the great work!! **Dorchester & District Lions Club** – They sponsored free wagon rides at the Dorchester fair and their float came in first place. They provided support for donors at the blood donor clinic. Holiday Homes Tour was a big success raising over \$4700. They hosted a Diabetes themed meeting for national diabetes awareness month. Provided parking and assistance for Thames Centre Festival of Lights. They sold beautiful Christmas Trees and have been doing it for 55 years. Their Lion Mascot was in the Hyde Park Lions Santa Claus Parade. They provided a Santa for the seniors Christmas luncheon. They participated in the Salvation Army kettle Drive. They donated Christmas treats to VON. They served Christmas lunch to 450 students and staff at Northdale Ps. They collected 342 Pairs of socks for the Salvation Army Centre of Hope. As you can see my clubs have been very active in their communities. Not only raising funds but also getting out there and doing service in their communities. I am very proud of all of the hard work and dedication to their community. Keep up the great work.

Zone 6---Zone Chair Lion Frank Van Kempen

Arkona Lions has increased to 15 members. At November meeting Dist. Gov. Barb made her official visit and inducted 4 new members. They have made several improvements to their Arkona Native Artifacts Museum and

will be replacing the display cabinets and have a local artist recreate 4 wall murals. They have expanded the parking lot at their senior's apartment complex adding 12 new parking spots. A new furnace and AC unit has been installed in their medical centre along with a backup generator.

Bluewater Lions presently have 13 members. They work bingos at the Sarnia bingo hall. Since October they have made donations of \$4,875 to several organizations. They have also donated \$1,105 to LCIF. Bluewater Lions Club of Sarnia has decided to fold in June of 2020.

Petrolia Lions presently have 59 members. They are now doing bingos at the Bingo hall in Sarnia. They remain very active in their community with events such as serving food at 2 different business's at their open house, held a Breakfast with Santa, served chili to 135 youths and 20 escorts of a marching band, participated with several local groups in the chili cook off, served 250 cups of hot chocolate to those who took part in their local Christmas parade and they also participated in the parade. They gave out 2 English awards and 2 bursaries at the high school. They placed a Lions bench on Petrolia Line at the west end of town and sold tickets for cash prizes to raise money for the Christmas for Everyone Campaign. Since October they have donated \$21,000 which \$7,000 of that was raised for Christmas for Everyone which was donated to the Petrolia Food Bank. Lion Carol Stankevich was presented with the Melvin Jones Award. **Sarnia Lions** They held their annual Christmas dinner for the visually impaired with 160 people in attendance. They sold Christmas Cakes, Cookies and Peanuts which were up substantially which made it a successful event. They will be selling crocuses in a couple of weeks. They are in the process of making plans to further enhance their Lions Park in Sarnia. Since October they have donated over \$5,200. On a sad note, they have lost 2 Lions member this year. Graham Garner (48 year member) passed away.

Wyoming Lions currently have 56 members. They continue to hold OLG Bingos in Sarnia and meat bingos at their hall on the 1st Wednesday of each month. They had their annual Christmas Tree Sales event netting approximately \$2,700. They had a chicken dinner in January. They will be having a pancake supper (Feb 15), rabbit dinner (Mar 7), Community Breakfast (Good Friday, Apr 10), and the Spring Fish Fry (Apr 17). They have now completed a major pledge of \$44,000 in support of Wyoming Minor Baseball's project to upgrade Canton Park. Since October they have earned \$14,794 in various fundraisers and made \$23,534 in donations.

Petrolia Leo's – presently have 12 members. Since the last zone meeting they have held a Halloween youth dance, cleaned trash from 2 town parks,

invaded the local grocery store where they prepared bags for their 20th "Stuff the Bus" food drive and then worked at the grocery store with the cashiers selling bags and soliciting donations. After a very successful food drive they raised \$15,000 in food and cash donations for the Christmas for Everyone food bank. They also joined the Petrolia Lions and assisted with the Breakfast with Santa, took part in the Christmas Parade and they joined Petrolia Lions for the Christmas Dinner where they did a bit of entertaining.

Zone 7--Zone Chair Lion Mary Hamilton

Zone 7 has 6 clubs and 193 members. Since the last zone meeting, the clubs have made monetary donations to 34 different groups or organizations, 9 of which are Lions organizations.

The other 23 organizations are Lions-sponsored, such as Diabetes Canada, or local, such as the Women's Rural Resource Centre. This does not include time spent on activities such as manning the Salvation Army kettles, putting a float in the Santa Claus parade, manning Bingos, canvassing, or manning food booths for various local activities, to name a few of the activities.

I have completed my club visits, some of which were done with the DG, and held one Zone Meeting in November. The second one is scheduled for Tuesday, January 28.

The Zone project is being finalized. Our zone will be supporting the initiative between Medic
