



PRESS Release from Dutton & District LIONS Club! Sunday, June 16, 2019 (Father's Day) *BREEZY's PAD is now Open!*

The Dutton & District LIONS Club were proud to host the 'Official Opening' of **Breezy's Pad,** the new, local Splash Pad that was constructed as a community project, jointly by the Lions and the Municipality of Dutton Dunwich. The total budget for this endeavor was \$150,000; with the Lions pledging \$60,000.

Several other major donors stepped forward with \$10,000 each and have been acknowledged on the Rules Sign.

Local contractors & trades; also provided over \$12,000 of in-kind donations; like excavating; gravel; hydro; etc.

Lions Bob & Rachel Hales greatly added to the project by donating a LION Drinking Fountain; personally, with a value of approximately \$7,500. At the Official Opening it was revealed that the community is within \$10,000 of raising the total budget goal and organizers are confident the Pad will be fully paid for before the Oct. 1, 2019 deadline for fund raising. Our current President Lion Duncan "Dunc" McCallum acted as the General Contractor for the project resulting in the job being completed within budget and ahead of time, even with our extremely wet spring. This Splash Pad is named after Lion Past-President Don 'Breezy" Campbell; who conceived the project and is our oldest Lion, soon to be 90. The Mayor; Lion Bob Purcell, presented 'Breezy" with a Certificate as part of the ceremonies; which read: "The Municipality of Dutton Dunwich hereby recognizes Lion Don 'Breezy' Campbell, Dutton Dunwich Community member for his dedicated volunteer contributions and for

Lion Breezy even threatened to wear a Speedo for the opening; however, we were all relieved when he decided to share the excitement with his wife Shirley and most of their family members.

Breezy; accompanied by Shirley and numerous grand-children; great grand-children & adoring other youngsters hit the top of the Fire Hydrant feature to Officially start the Splash Pad water flowing.

The first Friendship Arch was erected in 1966 on the U.S.- Canada border by the Abbotsford Lions Club of British Columbia, Canada and the Sumas Lions Club of Washington. Since then, hundreds have been placed within towns and cities around the world. The arch stands as a symbol of friendship and commitment between the Lions Club and their community.

In 2015 the Thorndale Lions Club acquired the forms to construct new arches. They are currently available for purchase through the Thorndale Lions and are made by

Ed's Concrete Product Ltd. in Stratford, ON. Each arch is \$3000.00 and includes the concrete base, 2 reflective Lions International logos and the shaking hands. The arch is 6 ft. tall and the base is 4 ft. x 7 ft. It weighs approximately 3000 lbs.





Lions Foundation of Canada trains Dog Guides to assist Canadians with a wide range of disabilities. With seven programs in place, Canadians with disabilities are offered the opportunity to find greater independence, mobility and safety through the help of a Dog Guide.



Depending on the program, Dog Guides are trained to perform a set of basic skills that are useful to all handlers. However, some of their training is also

tailored to meet the specific needs of their future handler. In the final stage of training, the client and Dog Guide train and live together at the Oakville facility for two to four weeks. This helps to ensure that the new working team develops a bond and prepares them for their next step - returning home.






