Why File Those Reports?

One of the things that I really take pride in is how the District 25C clubs have stepped up their game filing their club's Monthly Membership Report (MMR) and Service Activity Report (SAR) each month. The clubs in our district are consistently above 95% MMR filing each month, and we are approaching 90% filing of their SAR.

"So why file those reports anyway?" Well the easiest answer is because that is the responsibility of the club secretary and/or the club president. This is a major part of their job descriptions. These reports are important in that we can track where we stand on membership, we can make sure to have the most up to date contact infor-

mation for each member, and we can see what sort of activities the clubs are doing and types of services being provided to our communities.

Many of my goals for District 25C in 2016-17 revolve around the MMR and the SAR filing. When we started putting the emphasis of MMR filing during PDG Charles Roth's year, we went from 60% monthly filing to over 90% filing within the first five months, when all of the clubs filed for the first time.

In IPDG Richard McKellar's year, the emphasis was to maintain the MMR filing and improve our activity filing. In the previous year, the district was in the 40-50% SAR filing range each month, and we slowly crept that number up to the consistent mid-80% range.

The goal this year is 100% MMR filing and 90% SAR filing each month, and I'm thrilled to announce that our clubs achieved this goal for the first time in August. Now the hard part begins by duplicating it again this month and



and maybe even pushing the SAR filing just a little further to 100%.

When our clubs file their activity reports each month, we are helping Lions Clubs International in meeting the Centennial Service Challenge of serving 100-million people worldwide by the end of our centennial year of Lionism. By reporting their eligible activities: 1) Engaging Our Youth, 2) Sharing the Vision, 3) Relieving the Hunger, and 4) Protecting Our Environment, clubs can earn banner patches. In the next few months, I am excited to be able to present a total of 44 of these awards which were earned in 2015-16.

If all goes well, 1VDG Chloe will be delivering well over 50 of these awards next year.

This past month, I was fortunate to be able to attend a Summer Visit at the Leader Dog facility in Rochester Hills, Michigan. Although I knew (I thought) quite a bit about the program, it wasn't until I went to Rochester Hills and listened to the different department heads and toured the facility that I had any idea of the scope of the program. Their annual budget is over \$12 million, with \$4.2 million coming from regular donations, over \$2 million coming from Lions and Lions Clubs alone. The remainder of the (continued on page 4)

Club Excellence Award

One of the highlights extending from the 2015-2016 year is that 23 clubs worked hard and are eligible for the Club Excellence Award. All of the 23 eligible clubs have filed their application with me, and they have been signed and sent on to LCI.

To obtain this award clubs must have completed seven (7) Elements of Success. They are:

- Service Complete three service projects
- Donate to LCIF Expand your club's humanitarian reach
- Membership Development have a net increase of one member
- Communication Complete any of the following
 - Establish or have a club website
 - o Utilize public relations
 - Promote brochures and materials
- Leadership Development attend officer training
- Club Activity meet and submit membership report (MRM), activity report and club officer report
- Maintain a good standing through the end of the year

All of these are doable. Two of the hardest ones are the net increase in membership (that is why you need to work on it all year long), and a contribution to LCIF. Clubs should establish a budget and put in a line item for an LCIF contribution, the easiest way to do it.






