Helping Lions Serve

Let us look at a restaurant: everyone might like to be a server, waiting on people with delicious food. But what if no one had rented the building, fired the cook and cook's helpers, ordered the food to come in the time frame that it was needed, paid everyone and the taxes, put up a sign saying to eat here? There would be little or nothing to serve.

This month my home club, Battle Ground Lions Club, will be packing bags of food weekly for 24 students at the local elementary school to take home to their families. What did it take to get to that result?

First there had to be an organized group with leadership. Simple reports and tax returns continue to be timely filed. Being a chartered club of LCI gives us liability insurance coverage.

The club has to meet or otherwise conduct its business. At one meeting we discussed the backpack program, related the benefits and the costs in volunteer time and dollars. (We share this project with the Lafayette Breakfast Optimists.) This is a continuation of a project from last year, so many details were already known to the club members. In a year of decreased fundraising activities, cost had to be evaluated. Members were polled to see their willingness to help with their time. The group agreed to continue the project. The club secretary made a note of the action in the minutes. The minutes showed that the club treasurer had been authorized to spend the necessary funds. (Each backpack of food costs \$6.50 per child, per week.) The chairperson of the project contacted Food Finders with the club's commitment to this project. He contacted other community members who have contributed in the past for this project. Times were set for volunteers to help with unloading the food truck and then weekly stuff bags with that week's food. The school principal and counselor determine which children receive the food and distribute the food on Fridays.

So, will you join me in "Helping Lions Serve" by stepping up to help as a part of the Lions that make service possible? Please consider serving as a club officer or a zone chair or serving on a district committee. This is the time of year when those roles get filled for the new Lion's year starting July 1, 2021. Do not wait to be asked. Step up. I am asking you. Call me at 1.765.4140 or email me Lionjimroth@gmail.com. I will help you find a way to serve as zone chair or on a committee (as chair or member). You cannot say you were never asked. CALL ME NOW.



Like MJFs, donors can recognize another individual with PMJF donations. This PMJF presentation should also be presented during a local Lions meeting or a district meeting, or during the Indiana Lions State Convention.

In closing, the Melvin Jones Fellowship Program is a generous way to show commitment to the humanitarian work of LCIF.







Lions Dues and You

Lions Clubs International supports clubs and members around the world so we can advance our global mission of service together. Our international support and the work of Lions Clubs International is fueled by the international dues of our incredible members.

In recent years, it has become increasingly clear that the services Lions Clubs International has been able to provide to members with the available budget is no longer in line with what Lions need and expect.

The International Board of Directors voted in October 2019 to approve an international dues adjustment resolution that would be voted on at the 2020 International Convention, but it was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. *The board recently approved a new dues adjustment model that will be voted on at the 2021 International Convention.*

The Board of Directors undertook an extensive review of Lions Clubs International's financials, including the implementation of substantial budget reductions. After much consideration, the board proposed to adjust dues by \$7 over a three-year period.

Under the proposal, international dues would be adjusted according to the following schedule:

- \$3 increase on July 1, 2022
- \$2 increase on July 1, 2023
- \$2 increase on July 1, 2024

Why an international dues adjustment is needed

We realize the association has been reluctant to adjust dues over the years, and we have not adjusted international dues since 2011. The proposed adjustment will help cover our costs and allow us to suitably serve our members' needs. With that said, the Board of Directors did not take this issue lightly, nor are we minimizing the value of each dollar that our members contribute.

As we consider this dues adjustment, it is essential that we keep in mind that our global efforts and initiatives support more than 1.4 million members in 50,000 clubs around the world. Through the support of staff, we are able to serve globally on the level that we do, keeping members and clubs fully supported with service resources, training events and software, club operational support, international meetings, language services, technology, Foundation support, leadership support, and everything else we have come to expect as Lions.

A dues adjustment will allow Lions Clubs International to provide improved support to Lions and to continue to invest in improving programs and digital products such as our website and MyLion. It will also allow us to invest in new programs such as the Learning Management System (LMS), development of new curriculum such as digital literacy, training videos, global advertising, marketing automation, digital and video storytelling and others tools and initiatives that will enhance our impact, our brand and our membership.

Why your help is needed

Essentially, we have to decide whether or not we want Lions Clubs International to continue to grow and thrive. Lions is more than a way of life. It's also an investment of money, time, energy and passion. As with any good investment, the more we put in, the more returns we see.

We need our members to understand why this adjustment is needed. We have developed an <u>international dues adjustment</u> <u>FAQ and PPT</u> to help you. If you have any questions on the dues adjustment resolution, please contact LCI Executive Administrator PIP Frank Moore.

I hope that you will see this adjustment as we do: as an investment in the future of Lions. Through your support, we can ensure that Lions are positioned for success in the future.

Domain Names - Get One and Keep It!

The Information and Technology Committee for the Indiana Lions is composed of a representative from each district. Regularly, the committee will provide information regarding all things technical that will help you remain safe, secure, and knowledgeable about the devices and platforms you use.

The following is the second of three parts on - Domain Names - Get One and Keep It!

Part #2 - Setting up Your Domain Registrar Account

Now that your club or district has selected and purchased a domain name, it's important to set up the domain name and account correctly. When setting up an account with a registrar and registering your domain name, you will need to provide three points of contact: Owner, Admin, and Technical.

You should always list your Lions club/district under the Owner section (this is very important as it identifies with the registrar who actually OWNS that domain name). Never change that or give it to someone else who may manage your website - it is the key to your account and you need control of it.

The Admin point of contact is primarily the contact that the registrar will use to contact you in the event of an outdated credit card or other billing or administrative issue.

The Technical contact is exactly what it sounds like, the person who can be contacted with technical questions. You may choose to put your club or district IT Chairperson as the technical contact for your domain name.

You should also set up your account for automatic renewal so that each year when the domain name is set to renew, it will automatically be charged and renewed with no down time for your website. Make it a part of your annual procedures to log into your account and make sure that all three contacts are accurate and up to date. Someone on that list may have left the organization, changed their email or phone number, etc. and it's important to keep those contact names and information current. In addition, be sure to write down the login information for your registrar account and keep that information in a secure place and known to your club/district officers.


Now it's time to make your domain name work for your club/district. We'll cover that issue in Part #3 of the series in a future newsletter.


