

### A Message from Cancer Control Project

#### **Cancer Control Project Expanding to Address Childhood Cancer**



For more than 75 years, Indiana Lions have supported cancer treatment, research, and education through our partnership between the Lions Cancer Control Fund of Indiana, Inc. and the Department of Radiation Oncology at the Indiana University Medical Center campus in Indianapolis. The department serves cancer patients of all ages, but the vast majority of the patients are adults.

In order to better serve pediatric cancer patients in Indiana, the Board of Trustees of the Lions Cancer Control Fund of Indiana, Inc. has voted unanimously to establish a partnership with the pediatric

oncology programs at Riley Hospital for Children. We will kick off this partnership with a \$25,000 commitment to support ongoing research by Dr. Jennifer Belsky and her team at Riley to address severe neuropathy experienced by more than 50 percent of the children undergoing chemotherapy.



We look forward to this new partnership with Riley Hospital for Children, even as we continue our longstanding relationship with the Department of Radiation Oncology.

#### A Message from Indiana Disaster Assistance Committee

Lions of Indiana are a part of a disaster relief network of volunteer organizations in Indiana. The purpose of this network is to coordinate disaster relief efforts and avoid duplication. Through that network earlier today, I learned in my role as chairman of our Lions of Indiana Disaster Assistance Committee that the Morgan County Emergency Management Agency is requesting relief supplies such as roof tarps for damaged homes. The exact location was not specified. I also learned that there may be needs in Owen County but received no specifies. I am sending this request to club secretaries in Owen and Morgan counties to 1) determine from clubs more precisely what the needs may be, 2) to determine how many people have been impacted by these recent storms and 3) to determine if our District Governor should submit an LCIF disaster assistance grant request for District C. LCIF disaster assistance grants are available only if more than 100 people have been impacted across the district.

Bolstered by over four decades of professional experience Dr. Charles Barron Roth has cultivated a career of excellence as a collegiate educator. Specializing in agriculture studies, he served as a professor of agronomy at Purdue University from 1968 to 2001. Having since retired from working in the field, he maintains the honorary title of professor emeritus at the university. Much of his work in the field pertained to teaching and researching soil chemistry and mineralogy. Dr. Roth became a professor after completing postdoctoral coursework at the university and being offered a formal position within his department, to which he gladly agreed.

Prior to embarking on his vocational journey, Dr. Roth pursued his own education, beginning with his time at the University of Missouri, where he earned a bachelor's degree in agricultural chemistry and a master's degree in soils. He subsequently continued his studies at the University of Wisconsin and achieved a PhD. He has published over 50 publications pertaining to his research in the filed of agronomy.


Along with his professional career, Dr. Roth has remained active in his volunteer efforts, serving as chair of the State Vision Services Committee of the Lions Club of Indiana. This committee has been responsible for vision screening over 65,000 Indiana children this year.

Dr. Roth was largely influenced to pursue a career as an educator by his father, who previously served with the research staff and taught agriculture classes at the University of Missouri. In his retirement, Dr. Roth has taken to woodworking in addition to regularly volunteering at his local United Methodist Church. In light of his fulfilling career, he largely attributes his success to his outward focus and desire to constantly more forward. To this end, Dr. Roth is especially proud to have made a lasting impact on the lives of many of his former students.
