Tips and Hints for Great Vision Screening For when using Charts November 2017

Dear Lions Vision Screeners!

You are all doing an amazing job! I wanted to share with you a couple chart skills "tune-ups" to improve the accuracy of our screenings.

As have commonly used blue masking tape a"stop" to the 20/30 line far acuity charts. This for on our was a field-expedient Good-Lite 110 chart sets that we started with four vears ago. chart set did not have an included chart designed with a "target line" for 20/30.

Now that many of us have the newer, recommended Good-Lite 120 chart set, we don't have to do that. So let's update how we use the far chart for the grades we screen:

First Grade: Use the Far acuity threshold chart (the one with DRZKO 20/100 line and two descending charts for right and left eye) to screen. If you use 110 charts, remove the blue tape "stop". All first graders should be asked "read to me the smallest line that you can read, one letter at a time" after occluding. Three of the five letters read accurately will pass that line. Record that number.

Why do this? First graders are provided a limited eye exam known as the Modified Clinical Test. If we provide the actual acuity line they read, it helps the eye care pros do a better, faster, easier MCT on them.

Third, Fifth and Eighth Grades: one may use the target line chart with the RVZOS 20/100 line at the top. Present the chart with your hand over both boxed lines. Once they have covered their left eye, drop your hand to show the NCKHD line. Then raise it after they switch eyes and present the ZHCSR line. That's it. If the student can't read the target line, switch to the threshold chart you use for First grade and have them read the smallest line they can until they can't read three of the five letters accurately. For what it's worth, it is almost as fast to use the unobstructed threshold far chart with the 3/5/8 kids, as it is to use the target line chart. It's usually a difference of less than five seconds per student. If an operator prefers to do this, seat them between others using the target line to vary presentations.

Bottom line: use the blue tape on the floor for position, not the charts.

Asking a child to read the line backwards is a good way to prevent overheard info from another screening lane. This is more effective with kids in the higher grades, and not First Graders.

The longer the child stands and doesn't engage the line, they start to grab for clues like a struggling swimmer grabs for a hold on the dock.

So don't let them drown, but don't let them freeload on the other swimmers either. Ask them to read it backwards and get their little sneaky head back into the chart and off distractions.

I hope you find this little note helpful. We should always try to be better in what we do. This note and other ones in the future are offered in that spirit. Dr. Neely has reviewed this letter for its content and sends his continued congratulations on your achievements.

Zionsville Lions Club Makes Diabetes a Special Focus (Press Release to Local Newspapers)

Diabetes is the sixth leading cause of death worldwide, killing one person every six seconds and over 5,000,000 people annually—plenty of reasons for Lions Club International (LCI) to make it a new special and ongoing area of focus. LCI is meeting this global health emergency head on by raising awareness of diabetes, expanding access to care through screening and treatment programs, and improving quality of life for sufferers through special camps and recreational programs.

Approximately 750,000 people in Indiana alone have diabetes; that's enough people to fill Lucas Oil Stadium more than 10 times over. Regretfully, up to one-half of those with diabetes do not even know they have it. So, Zionsville Lions Club (ZLC) is doing its part to combat the rising diabetes epidemic in this community by choosing November, National Diabetes Awareness Month, to kick off a ZLC Diabetes Group. The group, led by Zionsville Lions Club member Mel Prince, MD, (see photo to right) retired senior medical director in diabetes for Eli Lilly & Company, will support LCI's goal to raise awareness and improve education efforts around diabetes.

"The Zionsville Lions Club has a number of members, several who are dedicated health professionals or who are living with diabetes, that are passionate about educating the public on the risks of diabetes and the importance of a healthy diet and exercise," said Prince. "We



look forward to implementing activities in support of LCI's diabetes mission over the coming months, and to finding ways to utilize Lions Park in that endeavor."

Add to this equation the fact that 86 million Americans have pre-diabetes (among them 1.9 million Hoosiers) and 90 percent don't even know it, and the urgency around getting the word out becomes even more apparent.

"We encourage everyone to take a diabetes risk assessment test, to see their physician if the test indicates a risk of diabetes, and to urge friends and loved ones to take the assessment test as well," Prince said.

To coincide with National Diabetes Awareness Month, the <u>Plainfield Lions Club and IU Health Hospital West</u> are co-sponsoring a diabetes awareness community educational program and free diabetes screening at the <u>Plainfield Public Library</u>, 1120 Stafford Road, Plainfield, IN on <u>Wednesday, November 29th at 6:00pm</u>. Members of the community are invited join them for this free event to hear Chris Reinhold, Indiana Lions State Diabetes Committee Chair speak on diabetes. Chris is also on the speaker's bureau of the American Diabetes Association. Topics to be covered during Chris' presentation include: Prevalence, Risk Assessment, Types of Diabetes, Symptoms, Complications and Prevention. In addition, volunteers from IU Health West Hospital will be providing free A1c diabetes screenings. Theses screenings measure three month-average blood sugar with a finger prick that could alert you to an elevated risk for diabetes before serious symptoms begin. Results are confidential and available immediately. The Plainfield Lions Club supports several service projects both locally, statewide, and internationally and we are looking for service-minded individuals interested in making a difference in their community. GREAT PARTNERSHIPS YIELD GREAT RESULTS

In April, the <u>Lafayette Lions Club</u> visited <u>Right Steps Child Development Centers</u> to conduct vision screenings on children ages two and up. At Right Steps Dennis Burton, we had 39 children participate in vision screening with a total of 10 referrals given to children who showed various vision concerns. All parents received a letter of passing or of referral after the screenings were reviewed.

At Dennis Burton, two of the children that were referred are now seeing more clearly with the help of glasses! In fact, one referral led to an entire family seeing a local eye doctor and they are all seeing more clearly! Another referral led to glasses for a child who was headed to Kindergarten, so they will definitely help in her future learning success!

JaMaya was referred at the end of the Early Education Matching Grant and went through with the referral to Lens Crafters to get her new glasses. She came back for a visit and modeled them for the Right Steps staff! JaMaya was enrolled as an infant and was with us until she left the EEMG program in May. This bright little girl recently started Kindergarten I August. We are excited to continue our partnership with the Lafayette Lions Club and Lens Crafters to provide our families with the benefit of good eye health!

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS (LIONS ALERT)

I just want to let you know where I am so far. I met with one of the Marion County Emergency Managers to discuss development of a Memorandum of Understanding that can be used by the County Emergency Managers and local Lions Clubs. I believe that local Clubs who desire it should be part of their particular county's emergency plan. To that end, I ask that the District Committee Chairs work closely with their Governors to spread the following message:

A nationally recognized program called Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) is available to Lions at no charge. I strongly recommend that interested Lions take this training and then get registered in their county with Emergency Management. I will have more information on the way to you soon regarding County Emergency Management contacts and CERT training. I have secured a strong commitment that CERT instructors will travel anywhere around the state to train Lions. Since winter is coming soon, the emphasis right now is Influenza Immunization and Cold Weather Preparedness.


