Club Presidents, Secretaries and Treasurers,

There have been a few questions on the payment of dues recently, so I thought I would address some of the most asked questions in the District Newsletter.

- Invoices for Lions Clubs International Dues are sent to the club treasurer July 1 and January 1. These can be paid per the instructions on the invoice, either on line or by mail. Mail to the address given in Carol Stream, Illinois. The club treasurer will also receive an interim invoice for any supplies purchased by the club from the Lions Store at Oak Brook and a prorated dues invoice for any new members as they are added. <u>LCI BILLS DUES FROM THE DATE THE LION IS ENROLLED AT MYLCI</u>. No credits for dropped members are given except in January and July when credit is given for any member dropped from the roster before the 15<sup>th</sup> of that month. This applies to Lions Club International dues only. The State and District do not prorate dues.
- State/District Dues are invoiced as soon as LCI posts the Membership Register Report in January and July (usually about the sixth of the month). Dues are based on the number of members each club has on December 31 and June 30. Both the State and District dues are invoiced by the District on an invoice that is e-mailed to the club treasurer and club secretary (if they both have e-mail addresses in the District Directory). The total of these dues is shown on the invoice and may be paid on one check made payable to <u>Indiana Lions District 25C, Inc</u>. and mailed to: Lion Charlotte Query, CS, 2408
  Shepard Patrick Road, Spencer, IN 47460. Lion Charlotte records these payments and forwards your check to the Cabinet Treasurer who processes the check and sends your club treasurer an electronic receipt. State dues are billed semi-annually at \$7.00 per semi-annual period. District dues are \$2.00 for each semi-annual period.
- The bottom line is each club treasurer should receive two invoices in January and two in July, one from LCI and one from the District. If they do not have these invoices by the 10<sup>th</sup> of those months they should contact the District Treasurer for assistance.
- Donations to the five state projects, Lions Clubs International Foundation and the Indiana Lions Foundation may also be sent to the Cabinet Secretary. You may send one check made payable to Indiana Lions District 25C, Inc. with a transmittal sheet indicating the amount of each of the donations. A check will be sent to each of those entities on a monthly basis. Any checks received that are payable to the individual project or LCIF will be forwarded directly to the project and will not be recorded at the District Level.
- Personal contributions to Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) are encouraged and may be made through the cabinet as outlined above, or sent directly to LCIF. Individual Lions may also make personal contributions on line to LCIF through the Melvin Jones Fellowship Program. Individuals Lions or Friends of Lions may donate and use the credits toward a Melvin Jones Fellowship for themselves or a friend or transfer those credits to their club to use toward a Melvin Jones Fellowship. To transfer credits, please request the form from Karen McKellar at <u>kadica@tds.net</u> as these forms are not available on line. To make a personal donation on line you will need your membership number which can be secured from your club secretary.
- The District does not have the ability to receive payments on line. Unfortunately, the district administrative dues are only \$2.00/year per member so paying a bank fee is not feasible nor is mailing each individual invoice.

## Keeping the Vision: The Power of We

Lions Club International President Dr. Naresh Aggarwal of Delhi, India, has emphasized as his operating theme "the power of we," which encourages Lions to work together to strengthen the impact Lions bring to their communities. The Carmel Lions Club and Zionsville Lions Club, two clubs that serve communities adjacent to each other but are in different districts, have taken President Aggarwal's directive to heart. In October 2017, they began partnering together to provide vision screening (mandated by the Indiana State Legislature) to some 10,000 first, third, fifth and eighth graders in City of Carmel and Boone County (in which Zionsville is located) public and private schools.

Given the sheer size of the task of testing area students' vision acuity, this partnership has proven to be invaluable, with trained volunteers from both clubs (and additional support from Lebanon, Young America, and Logansport Lions) committing to screening a minimum of two days a week. Using eight Optec 5000 screening devices and 10 volunteers per screening, they can screen 300 children in one morning, with each child out of his or her classroom for only about 15 minutes.

"This is so helpful to me," said Kendra Scales, HCA, the school nurse at Eagle Elementary School in Zionsville, echoing the sentiments of many of the nurses at schools they screen. "In previous years I would have done this myself with one machine. [The Lions] get everything done in a couple of hours. Doing it myself would take all day."

This community service goes far beyond offering convenience though. These volunteer vision screeners help catch vision issues in children that might otherwise go unnoticed. Problems with sight can cause blurry vision, eyestrain, and headaches, among other conditions, and may result in learning impairment if students can't see the board or projected words and numbers.

Through one-on-one interaction with the children, volunteer screeners are building trust with the younger generation and are sometimes able to identify vision-impaired children who may be going without glasses because of financial hardship. Another Lions Club program works to provide glasses to individual children when this need arises.

"At a recent screening, an eighth grader was identified who indicated he had worn glasses, but they were broken and his parents were financially unable to replace them," recounts Zionsville Lion volunteer Karen McKellar. "The screening indeed showed that he was probably unable to function in school without glasses. After researching the need within a week, an eye exam was scheduled and a brand new pair of glasses secured for this young man, who was very grateful."

The vision screeners have a new sign that says "Vision screening provided by Carmel Lions Club" on one side and "... Zionsville Lions Club" on the other, so they can flip it to whichever community they are serving on any given day. But it seems clear as Carmel and Zionsville Lions work side by side that "the power of we" is breaking down dividing lines, building generational bridges and strengthening the collective community one vision screening at a time.
