State Fair gate captains and their spouses and friends were the guests of honor at the luncheon and were invited to provide their suggestions on how to make our annual manning of State Fair entry gates an even better experience for them and our volunteers. PDG Don Cooper unveiled the 2025 State Fair volunteer pin, which

Trustees and guests met for a delight- he designed. This pin is spectacular and will be a much sought-after souvenir item next year!

Prior to the luncheon, the trustees met to review various committee reports including our financial health, which remains very solid. PCC Sue Topf is accepting applications from those with State Fair credits for the purpose of receiving a \$200 unrestricted grant to any club, any of the five state projects, LCIF or the Indiana Lions Foundation. A minimum of 10 credits is required for these unrestricted grants.

The Foundation approved four matching grants:

- The Williamsburg club will receive \$1,000 towards a \$2,000 project for the purchase of books for every student at a local elementary school.
- The Worthington club will receive a \$1,000 grant toward a \$9,100 project to place memorial wreaths on the graves of over 600 veterans in their local cemetery.
- The Sullivan County club will receive a \$1,000 grant towards the funding of a \$7,700 dyslexia training initiative for teachers in Sullivan County elementary schools.
- The Whiting club will receive a \$1,000 grant towards a \$6,168 storywalk project in the Whiting city park.

LCIF is there when people are in need

What a year LCIF has had so far. In late September 2024, families were plunged into darkness when Hurricane Helene tore through the southeastern United States. This storm was the deadliest to strike the U.S. mainland since Hurricane Katrina in 2005, causing severe destruction and heartbreak.

Knowing these victims had a long and painful road to recovery ahead of them, LCIF approved 14 grants totaling \$380,000 in response to Hurricane Helene. This includes 12 Emergency Grants of \$15,000 each across Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Tennessee, plus two Major Catastrophe Grants of \$100,000 each awarded to North Carolina and Florida. These grants helped Lions provide things like water, food, cleaning supplies, toiletries, flashlights, and linens.

The essential supplies and physical assistance go a long way in rebuilding the community, but for many, emotional support can be just as effective. District 35-I District Governor Patty Jean Strong says, "It's not just about the material goods because those things are transient. They need humanity and empathy, and that's what we LIONS give."

Several destructive wildfires that swept through the Los Angeles area of California are devastating entire communities. More than 28 people have died, and more than 180,000 people have been evacuated. The fires have burned over 50,000 acres and destroyed more than 16,000 structures, including homes, displacing countless families.

When a humanitarian crisis of this magnitude strikes, we, as Lions, are ready to help. Right beside us is Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF), our global foundation. LCIF is mobilizing funds, including two Emergency Grants awarded and disbursed for \$15,000 each for immediate relief supplies and a \$100,000 Major Catastrophe Grant, to empower Lions in California to help their communities recover. Lions in California continue to de-

These are two examples of what and where your donations can assist those struggling with these disasters. We can no longer say, "All of our donations go overseas." \$510,000 has gone to the east coast and west coast of the CA 1. It is also why we fundraise!

Application forms should be completed and verified by your District Governor and sent to LCI prior to the deadline. There's plenty of time to accomplish the requirements prior to our Indiana State Convention. Let's all strive to achieve Club Excellence and Make our Mark!

guage. **September:** We have sponsored the Apple Butter Festival the third weekend of September for almost 50 years. It was originally organized to promote the businesses around the town's square and draws thousands to the two-day festival. With almost 150 booths/sellers it takes a lot of organization on Lion Tyler Hammond's part. PCC Jim Query and Lion Mom (Charlotte) run

nize an hour-long parade through the downtown. 2nd VDG Tom Schultz takes photographs and helps out President Marj Schultz at heart! As Santa explained the Inflatable Zone, where to the child that he needed ty, fries, hot dogs, and fried kids can enjoy jumping and to know several languages sliding all day or weekend for a set fee. And, all Spencer Lions also sell their famous apple butter products, made by Dillman Farms in

Bloomington, Ind. **October:** This month we look forward to Sight Night. Lion Anita Kay orders over 1,200 Trick or Treat bags that we distribute to all K-6 grade students in the county elementary schools. Each child is then told to come to the Spencer Lions Club building where we hand out candy, toys, and illuminated bracelets to keep the children safe and collect eyeglasses to recycle. We also assist the local schools with eye screenings during this month.

November: We usually choose a family and supply a couple tablesful of groceries for the holiday. Lion Linda Davis does a marvelous job coordinating this event. And then we make great plans for December!

December: For the past 75 years, the Spencer Lions have made sure that Santa is available to greet the children the first Saturday of December. He would arrive at the courthouse on a fire truck and spend hours listening to children as they whispered wishes into his ear. PDG Jim Query spent almost 40 years wearing the red suit. His favorite story was a little girl from Guatemala who came with her mother from IU to tour the "local holiday customs." The mother explained that her five-year-old daughter did not speak English so she wouldn't be able to speak to Santa. The mother was amazed when Santa be-

gan singing "Jingle Bells"

Lion Charlotte has been with the program the entire 20-year

June: Arrangements are made for incoming officers' induction ceremony during the annual Tail Twister's Party to which family is invited. Final arrangements are made for the fish stand at the pair next month.

We also sponsor Little League basketball, football baseball and softball programs. We gave money for new uniforms for the middle school and challenged other groups to match our donation. We have worked concession stands for high school football games.

We have had seven district governors (two council chairs), various project chairs, trustees, cabinet secretaries and treasurers, and zone chairs from our club (with two more district governors in line). We've sponsored circuses, mowed cemeteries, and bought eyeglasses for kids.







CLUB DELEGATE FORMULA. Each chartered club in good standing in Lions Clubs International and its district (single or sub- and multiple) shall be entitled in each annual convention of its district (single or sub- and multiple) to one (1) delegate and one (1) alternate for each ten (10) members, who have been enrolled for at least one year and a day in the club or major fraction thereof, of said club as shown by the records of the international office on the first day of the month last preceding that month during which the convention is held. The major fraction referred to in this section shall be five (5) or more members. Each certified delegate present in person shall be entitled to cast one (1) vote only for each office to be filled by, and one (1) vote only on each question submitted to, the respective convention. Unless otherwise specified herein, the affirmative vote of a majority of the delegates voting on any question shall be the act of the convention. All eligible delegates must be members in good standing of a club in good standing in this district. 5 Delinquent dues may be paid and good standing acquired up to fifteen (15) days prior to the close of credential certification, as such closing time shall be established by the rules of the respective convention.

- Fried Rabbit
- 1 cut-up rabbit
- 1 onion • 1 carrot
- 1 stalk celery
- 2 Tablespoons of flour • ½ cup condensed milk
- 1 egg
- ½ box crackers

Soak rabbit in salt water in the refrigerator overnight. (In our case, most of the day.)

Simmer in water, to cover rabbit, and containing the onion, carrot, and celery for 30 minutes.

Remove the rabbit and drain on paper towel. Mix flour, milk and egg together. With a rolling pin, roll crackers into crumbs. Dip rabbit in egg mixture and roll well in cracker crumbs. Fry until golden brown in shortening or oil.
