Indiana goes to the Forum

On September 18, Lions from Indiana gathered with approximately 1,700 other Lions at this year's USA/Canada Leadership Forum in Atlantic City. During the three days of the Forum, Lions participated in a two-hour Speed Learning event with over 400 Lions, attended seminars on over 100 topics, and had a great chance to catch up with old friends and make new ones. More than 700 Lions participated in a Strides Walk for Diabetes which donated \$13,000 to a local Diabetes charity. They also heard keynote speeches from International President A.P. Singh, Warren Morris whose walk-off home run won the 1996 National Championship for LSU, and Lion BJ Blahnik and Leader Dog Jackson whose inspirational speech on dealing with going blind in his early 20's and learning to see the good touched everyone there.

Three of the seminars were led by or included our Indiana Lions. PDG Charlie Short presented the seminar "Starting a Specialty Club for Targeted Audiences", Lion Jeff Kozicki presented the seminar "All You Need Is Love: Understanding Lionism Through the Music of the Beatles", and IPCC Julia Kozicki was a panelist for the seminar "How the Council Chair move the GAT to Action" along with the IPCCs from New York and California. These seminars were all well attended and well received.

During the Forum, three Lions from Indiana received degrees from Lions University. This program provides "Year-Round Training from the USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum". The University offers

Club Officers must be reported by May 15 of the current year and a minimum of two or more club officers (president, vice president, secretary or treasurer, (of which, one must be the club president) must complete Club Officer Training online with the Lions Learning Center or in person as reported by a GLT coordinator in Learn) between May 1- December 31.

The club president also must consecutive terms; and a minimum of 10% of the club's members must complete any three courses in the Lions Learning

Finally, donate the equivalent of \$20 per club member to LCIF.

With a little planning none of these requirements are difficult. Let's just do it one step at a time and try to Lead by Example when you can.

The good news: as of September 20, Indiana is up 15 Lions for the year. The challenge: we're still behind where we need to be if we want to see real growth in 2026. Right now, Indiana has 7,823 Lions. A year ago, we had 7,987 - 124 more than today. That means despite some positive gains, we're still losing ground.

money for a match for an LCIF is a significant asset. Recently, one district learned they had \$9.000 in DCG monies. They decided to ask for \$6,000 to buy a trailer to deliver tornado supplies. The LCIF Grants department advised instead to apply for an Emergency \$15,000 Preparedness grant. Buy the trailer, and have it painted with Lions Logos. Then take rest of the money and purchase supplies to put

The ability to use DCG in the trailer. Sounded good, but the match for \$15,000 was \$3,750 which they did not have. The LCIF Grants dept suggested taking \$3750 from the \$9000 DCG fund. Money is still left in the DCG fund for another project or to continue accumulating; and the district will soon be ready for the next disaster response.



Addressing suicide among Veterans: causes, numbers & paths to hope

Mental Health Awareness week is October 4-12. It's a good time to remember those who gave so much for their Country during times of conflict, often return home "changed" and sometimes struggle greatly until their only solution is to end their life.

Mental Health Awareness Week Spotlight

During Mental Health Awareness Week, our attention turns to a crisis that too often goes unseen: suicide among military veterans. These individuals, having faced unimaginable hardships in service to their country, often return home carrying invisible wounds. For some, the burden proves overwhelming, leading them to consider or attempt suicide – a tragic outcome that communities across the nation are striving to prevent.

Understanding the Causes

Veteran suicide is a complex issue, driven by factors both internal and external. After deployment, many veterans experience post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), depression, anxiety, and other mental health challenges. Exposure to combat, loss of comrades, and the transition from military to civilian life can create feelings of isolation, hopelessness, and a lack of purpose.

Physical injuries, chronic pain, and traumatic brain injuries add further layers of distress. Additionally, some veterans struggle with substance abuse as a coping mechanism. Social factors such as difficulty finding employment, strained relationships, and lack of a support system - can amplify feelings of despair. Stigma surrounding mental health care may also prevent veterans from seeking the help they need, increasing risk.

Numbers That Demand Attention

Statistics highlight the urgency of this crisis. According to recent data from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA), approximately 17 veterans die by suicide every day. Veterans

account for about 13.5% of all suicides in the United States, despite representing less than 8% of the adult population.

Rates are even higher among certain groups, including younger veterans (ages 18-34), those with recent deployments, and individuals experiencing homelessness. Firearm use is prevalent in veteran suicides, accounting for nearly 70% of these deaths, underscoring the need for targeted interventions.

Efforts to Reduce Veteran Suicide

Awareness, prevention, and support are at the heart of efforts to address veteran suicide. The VA and various organizations have launched initiatives to improve access to mental health care, reduce stigma, and offer support through community outreach.

Crisis intervention resources are vital for those in immediate distress. The Veterans Crisis Line provides confidential support 24/7 for veterans and their loved ones. Anyone in need can call 988 and press 1, chat online, or text 838255. Trained responders – many of whom are veterans themselves – listen, provide guidance, and connect callers with resources tailored to their situation. Community programs also offer peer support, counseling, and resources for employment, housing, and physical health. Public awareness campaigns encourage open conversations about mental health and the importance of seeking help.

Finding Hope Together

While the statistics are sobering, they are not insurmountable. Every effort to reduce suicide among veterans matters - from checking in with a friend to supporting local outreach programs. The path to healing begins with compassion,



Vision testing sits at the heart of Lions because clear sight changes lives. Simple screenings help identify issues like amblyopia, myopia, and astigmatism early, often before children or adults realize something is wrong. Catching problems sooner improves learning and behavior in school.

For families facing

cost or access barriers, Lions-sponsored screenings create a bridge to follow-up care, eyeglasses, and community partners who can help. This commitment traces back to Helen Keller's 1925 challenge that Lions become "knights of the blind," and today it remains one of our most visible, measurable impacts.





District 25G expands vision efforts around the world

District 25G Lions have long been known for their commitment to eyeglass recycling, and their impact is now reaching far beyond local communities. Each year, the district's collection efforts produce a surplus of reading glasses. Rather than let those glasses sit unused, District 25G shares them with organizations that can put them to work—helping people who otherwise might not have access to such a basic, life-changing resource.

One of these partnerships is with the Africa Leadership Coaching Network, which works alongside Africa Inter-Mennonite Mission in Goshen, Indiana, and Africa Enterprise DRC in Kinshasa, Congo. Through this collaboration, reading glasses from northern Indiana are finding their way to Central Africa, specifically the Congo (DRC) and Angola.

Locally, this effort is guided by Charles Buller, who travels to the region to support empowerment programs designed to build

leadership skills and improve living conditions. A major part of that work involves literacy classes with textbooks and other printed materials. But for many in these communities, especially women, poor eyesight makes reading nearly impossible. That's where District 25G's surplus reading glasses step in, providing an essential tool for learning and personal growth.

osity doesn't stop in Africa. Reading glasses are also supplied to Native American reservations in Arizona and Wyoming in cooperation with other Lions and partner organizations that request assistance.

Of course, District 25G's eyeglass mission work has deep roots. Since the early 1980s, the district has been at the forefront of eyeglass recycling and continues to The district's gener- sponsor annual missions to

central Mexico. Each year, more than 20 Lions travel to distribute prescription eyeglasses, serving around 3,000 people over the course of a five-day clinic.

From Mexico to Central Africa to Native American communities here in the U.S., District 25G Lions are proving that something as small as a pair of glasses can open the door to opportunity, learning, and a brighter

Lions at the Indiana State Fair

The Indiana Lions Foundation (ILF) provided manpower to staff six gates at the 2025 Indiana State Fair for the 15-day run of the fair. Between 90 and 95 volunteers were required each day to meet the staffing obligation.

Our day at the Fair began at 5:15 AM and ended between 8:30 PM and 9:00 PM. The day was divided into three shifts. The early morning shift began at 5:15 AM and ended at 9:00 AM. The morning shift began at 7:15 AM and ended at 3:00 PM. The afternoon shift began at 1:30 PM and ended between 8:30 PM and 9:00 PM depending on the day. This is the largest fundraiser for the Indiana Lions Foundation.

In return for volunteering, the Foundation offers State Fair Points to all those who volunteer. One point is earned for the shorter early morning shift and two points are earned for each of the longer morning and afternoon shifts.

How to use the credits

1. Apply for a W.P. Woods Fellow**ship** (12 credits). The application for the Fellowship may be found on the Foundation website. The form may be completed online or printed. When the printed form is completed, email it to PCC Sue Topf at JimandSue1@comcast.net or mail it to her at 9152 Key Lane, Indianapolis, IN 46234.

2. Apply for a Community Service **Grant.** The Grant may be used to donate to individual Clubs, State Projects, each District, ILF, LCIF, or to request money for a special project. Special projects need to be approved by ILF. 10 points are needed for a grant of \$200.00 with an individual limited to using a total of 20 points per year.

Points accumulate if not used in a single year. If points are donated to an individual's club, the club may apply for the grant and use the money for any project (no project approval by ILF necessary). The only restriction is that the grant may not be used for administrative funds. In-

dividuals may also pool points to make a donation and points may be transferred to someone else.


