The Lions of Indiana State Office Building located at 8780 Purdue Road in Indianapolis has been sold and we have vacated those

The Lions of Indiana office is now located at 9002 Vincennes Circle, Suite 110, Indianapolis. This is one mile west of 8780 Purdue Road in the Fortune Park office complex. This building is the national headquarters of the Alpha Sigma Alpha Sorority, a beautiful facility that will meet our office and gathering needs extremely well for the foreseeable future. The sorority leadership and staff have been extraordinarily welcoming to us as their one and only tenant.

The District F Eyeglass Recycling office will remain as a tenant at 8780 Purdue Road under the direction of PDG Ed Harper. Used eyeglasses may be dropped off there as in the past.

All Lions are encouraged to visit the new office during regular office hours from 10 a.m. until 3 p.m. Monday through Thursday. Lions will access the building via the side entrance door marked with a Lions decal by activating the call button. State Secretary Lion Ann Ninness will respond and greet you at the door. One of the transitional challenges for us is the closing of the brick plaza at 8780 Purdue Road, which contains about 400 engraved pavers that have been purchased as a fundraising project of the Indiana Lions Foundation. The Foundation plans to commission a display in the new office suite containing all

of the names of Lions, clubs, memorial tributes, and state projects who have purchased pavers over the years. The Foundation is working with a local awards firm on designing this display. If you have purchased a paver in previous years and want to have that paver given to you, please text Lion John Wilkins at

(317) 408-7515 or by email at jw6222@ earthlnk.net and specify the name on the paver you wish to have retrieved.

It is anticipated that the paver contractor will complete the work in November and will store our pavers until March, so please make this known to Lion John prior to that date. Unclaimed pavers will be re-purposed in various Lions venues after that date.

Greetings Lions. I know we have excellent clubs across the state. It's time to let everyone know. Some very important information regarding the Club Excellence Award has been released by LCI. Please read are three service activities that need to be completed. Applications will not be necessary for the 2025-2026 award cycle. Awards will be distributed by Lions International to clubs that meet the updated criteria and eligibility requirements. You will find these listed below.

Membership

- Induct a minimum of two or 20% new members. whichever is greater (not including transfer, reinstated or charter members). Eligibility is determined based on the club's membership count on June 30th of the previous Lion year.
- Or sponsor a new Lions club.

Service

four service activities to Lions International. Three of these activities must show participation in each of the three International Weeks of Service (lionsclubs.org/ node/18511)

Leadership

- · Report newly elected club officers in Lion Portal by May 15 of the current Lion year.
- A minimum of 10% of the club's members complete any three courses in the Lions Learning Center (lionportal.org).
- The club president for carefully and notice there the current Lion year must not have served more than two consecutive terms.
 - A minimum of two or more club officers (president, vice president, secretary or treasurer. Of which, one must be the club president) complete Club Officer Training (online with the Lions Learning Center or in-person as reported by a GLT coordinator in Learn) between May 1 – December

· Contributed to LCIF a minimum of the club's membership total June 30th of the previous Lion year, multiplied by US\$20 (lionsclubs.org/ node/13261).

One more thing. We talk a lot about attracting younger Lions, and last weekend one of our young members made a point worth repeating: people his age want genuine connection with peers. Lions Clubs can offer exactly that – but only if we communicate it clearly. Many young adults don't even realize they're welcome to join. They aren't avoiding service; they just want to serve in ways that matter to them. When we align opportunities with their passions, they show up enthusiastically.

Thank you for the exceptional work so far. Now let's push harder. Let's retain the Lions we have, break the cycle of January losses, and keep building toward a stronger, growing membership.

Noblesville welcomes **Indy Honor Flight**

welcomed Ed and Sherry Sweetland from Indy Honor Flight (IHF) on Sept. 10.

Veteran and Lion John Grimes participated in IHF's 45th trip to Washington, D.C., earlier this year. The program has a two- to threeyear waiting list, but applicants are prioritized based on age and health status. The purpose of IHF is to celebrate veteran service through a trip to see the memorials built in their honor. The program is 100 percent free for veterans.

There are four hubs in Indiana and 128 across the U.S. The first flight out of Indy was Sept. 12, 2012. Since then, over 3,800 veterans have flown on 46 flights.

Veterans who wish to apply must have a DD-214 and fill out an application.

The Noblesville Lions Each veteran needs a guardian to travel with them who donates \$500 to the cost of the flight. They always fly on Saturday. Each flight includes 86 veterans, 86 guardians, four paramedics, and 10 staff. They visit Arlington Cemetery for the Changing of the Guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, the World War II memorial, and the Vietnam wall. If time permits, they also visit the Air Force Museum and the Iwo Jima memorial. After the flight, the IHF volunteers plan monthly meals and an annual reunion for all who have flown.

> Veterans who have participated are encouraged to recruit other veterans. The organization is run solely on donations and has no paid employees.


