

Don't forget that there is a liability policy available for most activities, covering the spectators for such things as tripping over an extension cord stepping in a hole in a festival area.

All we have to do is notify lions international where and when the activity is happening. If the individual club would be buying it the insurance the minimum cost would be \$500. And for alot of our clubs that maybe more than the event would bring in. Of course there are exclusions but those can be seen by looking at brochures that the International has available. There is a \$1,000,000 limit for an individual with a maximum for any number of people that might be injured. Coverage can be increased but there will be an extra charge for that. There is also an accident policy available for those Lions and volunteers who are working the activity.

I have always been interested in our history and how this nation came about. When I heard the national anthem sang at a game recently by someone under the influence of alcohol. WATCH OUT FOR DEER WHEN DRIVING

The following information was gleaned from an article in magazine "Outdoor Indiana."

I bet a lot of you have had an encounter with a deer jumping out in front of your car. There are more than 14,000 deer-vehicle collisions in Indiana every year. October is prime time because it is mating season. Peak hours for collisions are dawn and dusk. Be aware and cautious in areas where roads divide farm fields and forest land. Deer will cross roads to get to food.

Tips on how to avoid deer encounters:

- Avoid swerving to keep from hitting a deer. Braking and hitting the deer is safer than swerving off the road or into oncoming traffic.
- When you see one deer, assume there are more. Slow down and look for others along the side of the road.
- Use your high beams at night to illuminate deer eyes.
- If a deer is on or near the road, slow down. Blow your horn continuously to scare away the deer.
- Don't rely on novelties like deer whistles, fences, and reflectors, which are ineffective at deterring deer.
- Observe driving safety laws, always wear a seatbelt, and observe posted speed limits.

No matter what you do, sometimes hitting a deer can't be avoided. If you hit one:

- Move your vehicle to a safe place on the side of the road and turn on your hazard lights.
- Call the police. Don't approach the deer, whether it's alive or appears dead; wounded deer are unpredictable and can be dangerous.
- As with any vehicle accident, follow the responding officer's instructions.

If you want to keep the deer, you can, for personal purposes, with the proper permit. Such documents are issued by DNR conservation officers, district biologists, and local or state police officers. Thanks to Indiana Hunt for Hunger, donating deer meat is also an option.

So, hope this information might be helpful to you this fall when traveling. We know that soon the beautiful fall leaves will attract many people to southern Indiana. Be safe and watch out for those deer!

The following information comes from an article in the Indianapolis Star. The peak season for West Nile Virus is from July through October. It has been reported that mosquitoes with West Nile Virus have been found in 32 Indiana counties.

Humans become infected by West Nile Virus through the bite of a female mosquito. Most people who become infected won't get sick, according to the CDC. About one in five people develop fever and mild symptoms and about 1 in 150 will develop serious illness. People who develop the following symptoms should see a doctor immediately.

High fever, severe headache, neck stiffness, muscle weakness or paralysis, nausea or vomiting, sore joints, or confusion.

According to the Monroe County Health Dept. there is no specific treatment for West Nile Virus and no vaccine for humans. For severe cases, intravenous fluids, airway management, and respiratory support are recommended.

How do we avoid getting West Nile Virus?

Drain any standing water on your property that could be a breeding ground for mosquitoes. Empty and clean birdbaths, flower pots, pet water dishes and any other receptacle that could accumulate water.When working or playing outdoors for any length of time, dress in long sleeves, long pants and wear hats.

Defend against bites by wearing insect repellent with DEET.

Another thing to watch out for in summer is ticks. Check your children and pets for ticks after they have been outdoors. Ticks can also carry disease and should be removed as soon as possible.

Hope you all are enjoying your summer. I know we're all looking forward to the cooler weather of fall.



Lions Check Vision at 2024 4H Fair

24 Members of the four Lawrence County Lions Clubs (Bedford, Bedford Noon, Mitchell, and Fayetteville Community) conducted vision screening at the Lawrence County 4H Fair from July 6, 2024 to July 13, 2024 and screened 45 adults for far and near vision and field of vision with 15 being referred with problems to seek additional follow up professional exams.

We also screened 105 children for far and near vision with 19 being referred to seek additional follow up professional exams. This year Lions screened 45 children age six to two with a KidSight camera referring 4 with problems to seek additional follow up professional exams. The Lions tested 46 people for blood glucose. Information on diabetes diet, management, and recipes were offered. Also eleven pairs of new reading glasses were given free of charge to individuals needing corrective glasses to help improve their near vision. We would like to thank the Lawrence County Fair Board and our 3 community minded sponsors (Day and Carter Mortuary, Brent Maudlin State Farm Insurance, and Williams Wealth LLC) for making this service to our community possible.


