THE POWER OF WE

Last month, I wrote about Dr. Naresh Aggarwal, our new International President, and his theme, "The Power of We." Working together, Lions can accomplish much more than by working alone. He did not limit the theme to just one sentence. The Power of We leads to the Power Action. Working together, our actions can have large effects. School vision screening is a good example of this. The school nurse alone struggles to complete the required vision screening of 1st, 3rd, 5th and 8th grade students. A team of Lions can complete all the screenings in a morning. His third point is The Power of Service. Through our service, we become change agents. As change agents, we can improve the world. An example of Lions changing the world is the reduction of river blindness in Africa and Central America. The graphic on page 5 gives some numbers which are his goals for Lions to increase their giving. My interpretation is that for each 10 members in our club, if we could raise and donate \$20 additional dollars per week, that would be an additional \$145 million dollars in assistance. If each member could do an additional hour of service per week, that would be 73 million hours of additional service. He is challenging us to do more.

I had the pleasure of visiting Leader Dog for the Blind as part of the VDG summer visit. Lions from many areas of the country attended, learned about Leader Dog, toured the facility and took a blindfold walk. For those of you who know that I have raised many Future Leader Dogs, you may be surprised that I was excited to attend. I picked up my last puppy three years ago when the kennel restoration was in its early stages. (The lobby and puppyland had just been demolished.) I had not yet seen the new suites for the dogs in training. The kennel suite area is even better than the pictures! Very nice! Leader Dog strives to continually improve, so there were changes to learn about. Financially, Indiana is a major supporter of Leader Dog, and we should be proud of that. I also had an opportunity to walk blindfolded with a Leader Dog. It was an informative, fun visit.

Now it is time to sign up for the Fall Leadership Conference. As usual, there are a number of interesting workshops and seminars. See your Hoosier Lion for details. I am looking forward to seeing you at the conference and elsewhere around the district.






VDG Isabel is blindfolded and walking with a Leader Dog.



Our master chef, Jeff Zeckel, was pointed out by Jake Doll as our excellent food master! This guy knows how to cater an event!


All proceeds go to community scholarships.
