DG Vic encourages all Lions Clubs and individual Lions in District 25-G to participate in the new Operation SchoolSight project to provide schoolage vision screening, and in the district-wide effort to raise \$15,000 to pay for two suites in the new Canine Development Center at Leaders Dogs for the Blind.

Greetings Fellow Lions,

As we all know, our Lions emblem has two opposing lion heads on it. One lion looking back to remind us of our rich past and accomplishments and the other look toward the future. I took the time to look at what we all wrote for the June 2014 district newsletter. Many, if not all, of the items mentioned are as relevant today as they were a year ago. Important items like a club vision, objectives, milestones, membership growth and development, and new service projects. Everyone has that done riaht?

DG Marty spoke of the new format of our district newsletter and the importance of easy to use multi-media. Helping you get the word out in an effort to support your clubs activities. By the way, this has been very successful and we are going to continue using this format this year. Please send Lion Rose Russell all that you are doing. We all want to know!! Especially events relating to your service projects...Our lions in action. "Bannering".

Now let's look to the future for a minute. Our vision statement is "That the members and clubs of District 25-G will be a Vibrant, good in our communities. Through our service projects we will grow and develop our members while serving our local communities and those around the world." Seems pretty simple don't you think? Growing while serving others. Growing while Experiencing Service Together. You get the picture. So what's out there to get this accomplished you ask? Great Question!! Answer-We have two district wide service projects that we are going to do this year. You may have heard about them. Both have literally been dropped in our laps. The timing is absolutely perfect.

The first – Our district is going to provide at least TWO new kennel suites in support of the Leader Dog Facility renovation. We are the first Lions district in the nation to do this. Yes WE are the tip of the spear on this one. The efforts will be coordinated and conducted by each zone (all 10 of them) throughout the district. All the clubs in each zone working together to raise the awareness of Leader Dog and the funds necessary so we can provide the suites and supporting infrastructure. We are building something together by harnessing the power and energy of our district. Each suite costs \$ 7500.00 and if you break it down that's approximately \$300.00 per club for the two. We will close the project during our final cabinet meeting in 2016.

This project serves three purposes. The first is to unite all our clubs throughout our district in achieving a common goal – Team work.

Second, to support one of our state projects. Did you know that Leader Dog currently produces about 300 dogs a year to help enhance the lives of blind or visually impaired people? The service life of the new suites is around 30 years. Doing the math, all of us in District 25-G will help to contribute 9000 Leader Dogs. We together will be serving a lot of people.

Last but not least, the third objective is to have fun together! Networking, see members from other clubs, enjoying fellowship, being bold and creative in different ways to support this project.

The concept of district projects will stretch beyond this governor's year. In coordination with our 1st and 2nd VDGs we will be using this approach to support our other state projects in the future.

The other major project is the vusuib screening program called Operation School Sight. Brought to us by PDG Charlie Short of District 25-C we have the opportunity to screen 3rd, 5th and 8th grade children as mandated by the state of Indiana.

We also can do high school ages as well if the school nurses desire. This is a simple, easy to use system that any club can participate in with high results. One side benefit is clubs that perform this service may gain membership because people see our Lions in action and want in on the fun. Our boots on the ground!

A little heads up. It's pretty safe to say that clubs will need to work together to provide the necessary manpower as needed depending on the size and scope of the school system. As a district, Lion Rose Russell is our project Leader and we want to track/report the number of students surveyed and the clubs performing these wonderful services. We all want to know how we are doing!! This project will be ongoing like the Dictionary Project. Where there is a need there's a Lion.

As you can see we have a lot of great things to do this Lions year!! Let's hit the ground running and Experience Service Together!! Thank You very much for all that you are doing and keep up the great work!

From the Desk of Cabinet Secretary PDG Ann Haffner

Please share this information with your club's Officers and Board of Directors.

As the Lions of District 25-G begin a new year it is my privilege to again serve as your Cabinet Secretary.

Dues: In July your club will receive your July-December State and District Semi-Annual Dues Statement from CT Lion Rose Russell. You will be billed \$9.00 per member on record at Lions Clubs International on July 1.

In addition, Lions Clubs International will bill your club \$21.50 per member for July-December. For spouses and family members recorded as a Family Unit on MyLCI you will be billed \$10.75.

Dues are payable within thirty (30) days to both CT Rose and LCI. Checks for International dues should be made out to "International Association of Lions Clubs" and mailed to Lions Clubs International at the Chicago (not Oak Brook) address on the billing statement. District and State dues checks should be made out to "District 25-G" and mailed to CT Lion Rose Russell; PO Box 31; Lakeville, IN 46536.

Your club should be collecting at least \$61.00 in dues per year from each member. Family members enrolled in a Family Unit (except for the Head of Household) should be paying at least \$39.50 per year in dues. (Family members' international dues are \$21.50 per year rather than \$43.00.) Dues must be paid from your club's Administrative Fund, <u>not</u> from your club's Activities (Project) Fund. All money raised from the public must be used for charity.

Monthly Reports: Club Secretaries, it is extremely important for you to file the Monthly Membership Report on MyLCI by the last day of each month. After that it is considered late and may jeopardize your club's chances of earning the Club Excellence Award for 2015-2016. Monthly Activities should also be submitted on MyLCI each month but are not considered late if filed after the last day of the month.

<u>Club Excellence Award</u>: If your club finished positive in membership for this 2014-2015 Lions year, you may be eligible to receive the coveted "Club Excellence Award" if you fulfilled the other requirements. The form can be downloaded from either the LCI or District 25-G website or I can e-mail you a copy. Complete the form and mail it to: PDG Marty Juel; 3204 Village Court; Goshen, IN 46528. If you qualify he will affix his signature and forward it to LCI. **The Club Excellence Award Application for 2015-2016 will soon be available.** Please print a copy and use it as your road map to success for this new Lions year.

Budget: As your club's Board of Directors meets to plan for this new Lions year I encourage you to prepare both an administrative and activities budget of income and expenses to be approved by your club's membership. This will help to insure that your club remains financially sound, provides well defined guidelines for spending, keeps the membership well informed, alleviates unnecessary discussion and disagreement during club meetings, and helps to establish proof that your club is a charitable organization.



Keys to Membership Recruitment

Recruiting new members doesn't have to be chore—it's really just a change in our preconceived perceptions of behavior. While there is a process that must be developed, successful recruitment has to start from within your own club and the pride each member in your club has in being a Lion. Consider the following key elements you should consider as you develop your membership strategy:

- 0 **Teamwork:** All Lions are part of your membership committee, regardless whether they are listed in the committee's structure, or are listed as a club officer.
- 0 **Documentation:** Be sure to document the progress of those individuals who you are following or contacting to introduce them to Lionism. If they've visited your club, be sure to record the dates and document their response and the follow-up you've done.
- 0 **Fun:** Activities that Lions enjoy are also terrific motivators. Be sure to incorporate fun in your recruitment programs. You may consider developing teams and hold competition with rewards for those who are successful in bringing guests, signing new members and other significant steps in your recruiting program.
- 0 **Salesmanship:** Be knowledgeable about your Lions in general and your club in particular. Be prepared to give your 30 second 'elevator sales pitch' when talking with prospects about Lions.
- 0 **Consistency:** Prospects should receive information that is consistent from everyone on your team (remember- that's all members of your club). Disorganization can lead to confusion which can deter interest from prospects.
- 0 **Transparency:** Lions need to be willing to provide information about your club and Lions in general. If you are unfamiliar with something, get assistance from someone who will know the answers to their questions.
- 0 **Fun:** It bears repeating. If members are not having fun, your approach as Lions needs to be reconsidered.

There are a lot of tools out there to help you develop a membership program, many are free from LCI. Go online to <u>lionsclubs.org</u> for additional information.

As an endorsed Legacy Project, the Lions Club project will be listed on the Indiana Bicentennial website http://www.indiana2016.org/. The goal of the Commission is to make Indiana's 200th birthday an event in which Hoosiers in all 92 counties will take great pride

Earlier in the spring, the project was cited as the outstanding activity for Indiana Lions in District 25-G.

To date, the LaPaz Lions have erected 43 cemetery signs throughout Marshall County and have partnered with the Marshall County Museum and Historical Society to produce 6 cemetery brochures providing names, dates, and historical facts of cemeteries in each township.
