Approximately 60 Lions from throughout the state of Indiana attended a day-long membership growth seminar in Shipshewana, Indiana on Sunday, November 1. The seminar was organized by the Indiana Lions and was held in conjunction with the second meeting of the 2015-2016 Council of Governors. PDG Ronnie Martin of Freeport, Texas, Lead New Club Development Consultant for Lions Clubs International, spoke about building new clubs and "re-membering" existing clubs which are struggling to retain members.

PDG Martin's presentation was well-received by the attendees. When asked to comment on the seminar, IPDG Marty Juel replied, in part:

Ron is not afraid to 'rattle the cages' with his approach to the 'traditional' club extension protocols of the past. He has a unique style in his program, but over time he has shown that it works in not only starting new clubs, but to make sure they continue to be successful in the first several years. This is as important as getting the first 20 members. Keeping the original members and helping them increase both the membership and enthusiasm is a lesson we should use for existing clubs, whether they are in a membership slump or not.

After the seminar, DG Vic Fischer and District GMT Coordinator PDG Paul Russell met with PDG Martin to schedule a New Club Development Workshop in District 25-G in February 2016.

Don't Be Limited By a Negative Attitude

A college student arrives late for her first day of an advanced math class. On the board is a complicated equation with "Extra Credit" written above it. The student carefully copies the problem down. As the semester comes close to the end the student comes to the professor's office. "I have finished the extra credit problem" the student says as she sits down. "I doubt it" replies the professor. The professor carefully examines the pages of complicated mathematical equations and work. He quickly picks up his phone and makes some calls. Soon several other professors are in the office and reviewing the work. "She has solved it" one finally exclaims. The student confused asked "so what is the big deal about some extra credit?" Her professor slowly looks up and says "over the last 15 years I have written this problem on the board and explained to my class that I don't give extra credit except for this problem. Until today it has been the classic example of the "unsolvable problem" but you, young lady, have proven that wrong because you have solved it!" "If I would have known it was unsolvable I wouldn't have worked so hard on it" the young student replied.

"It can't be done!" How many times have we heard or spoken those words. We have determined that the task cannot be accomplished and there is no reason to try. But like the young college student – not knowing it "can't be done" – allows the seemingly impossible to be accomplished. The Lion Centennial motto is "Where there is a problem – there is a Lion". Problems are many – hunger, literacy, vision, disease and environmental along with internal issues of membership and growth. If we start with the attitude of defeat before we even start – the outcome is almost certain. Consider reaching out to other organization or other clubs and working on issues together. From the Desk of Cabinet Secretary PDG Ann Haffner

Administrative and Project Funds

How are your club's finances set up? Do you have two funds—an administrative fund and a project or activities fund—as required by Lions Clubs International?

ADMINISTRATIVE FUNDS are used for the day to day operations of the club — printing and mailing newsletters, stationery and postage for the president, secretary and treasurer, meals for guests, sending delegates to conventions and district meetings, paying dues, etc.

Monies in this fund can be generated through dues collection, donations from club members, tail twisting, and fundraising events such as a 50/50 raffle or silent or live auction held at club meetings. Raising funds for the administrative funds can be fun and entertaining. Be creative!

The **PROJECT OR ACTIVITIES FUND** is for money received from the general public through fundraising events and donations. This money can only be spent on service projects. It cannot be used for the general operation of a Lions club or for paying district, state, or international dues. Some Lions have the misconception that 10% of the net proceeds from a public fundraiser can be used for administrative expenses. **That is not true!**

It is permissible, but not necessary, for a club to have two separate bank accounts. All funds may be deposited in and drawn from one account as long as the club treasurer keeps accurate and separate records for each fund.

Each club should have a current copy of the Standard Form, Lions Club Constitution and By-Laws. From the LCI website www.lionsclubs.org click on "Member Center," then "Resources," then "Publications and Forms," then "Legal," and finally "Constitution—Lions Club Constitution and By-Laws (Revised 7/15) (la2.pdf)." Each club was chartered by and is under the jurisdiction of The International Association of Lions Clubs and must abide by that Constitution and By-Laws, which states:

Article VIII – Board of Directors, Section 3, (g) "It shall not authorize, nor permit, the expenditure, for any administrative purpose, of the net income of projects or activities of this club by which funds are raised from the public."

Section 3, (i) "It shall maintain at least two (2) separate funds governed by generally accepted accounting practices. The first fund to record administrative monies such as dues, tail twisting fines and other internally raised club funds. A second fund shall be established to record activity or public funds raised by asking support from the public. Disbursement from such funds shall be in strict compliance with Section (g) of this article."

Lionism at Its Best in 25-G

Becoming a Great Lion

A Lion asked me the other day, "What does it take to be a Great Lion?" I laughed and asked him, "Do you really want to know?" "Yes," he said. I then spent the next half hour explaining it to him.

Ninety percent of people live day to day without thinking each day what they could do to make tomorrow better than today. And they approach Lionism in the same way.

They attend the meetings and they work the projects and pay their dues. They may even become officers in the club or be in charge of one of the activities of the club. But they don't do anything that will make their club and the district stronger in the future.

His response was to ask if I could give him some examples of the development of great Lions and I gave him the following examples.

Example #1

A great Lion looks for ways to improve the abilities of his or her club to expand or improve their membership and service. The best example during the past two years has been the formation of the Argos Leo Club.

A mention in a seminar at our district convention 2 years ago that forming a Leo club could be very helpful for any Lions club was heard by over 20 Lions. Only one of them took the suggestion to heart.

Lion Alan Earl and a dedicated group of Argos Lions took all the steps necessary to start a Leo club and were rewarded by 39 participating teenagers.

It is 2 years later and they now have 60 members in their Leo club. In addition, a graduating senior joined their Lions club as did one parent of a Leo member.

I had the pleasure of hearing Lion Alan and two other Lions working with the Argos Leo Club give a program for the Lakeville Lions. Their willingness to share with other clubs the steps in forming a Leo club and the benefits it brings to a Lions club is how Lionism can stay alive and continue. Efforts like this can lead to a bright future for Lionism.

Example #2

Over 20 years ago PID Jim Cameron wanted eyeglass collection boxes made of wood. The reason was banks and upscale businesses didn't like LCI's cardboard containers because they were not nice enough looking for their businesses. They also did not stay clean and looked shabby over time.


PID Cameron had no money for the project, but we found a source of free plywood. The only remaining problem was getting them made.


Lion Dave Rogers volunteered to make them and produced beautiful boxes. Over the past 20 years Lion Dave, Lion Ken Mohlke of District A (now deceased) and a few Lions in District F have made over 3000 of these eyeglass collection boxes for Indiana Lions Clubs.

It is dedication of Lions like these two examples that will keep Lionism growing and improving its service to humanity year after year.

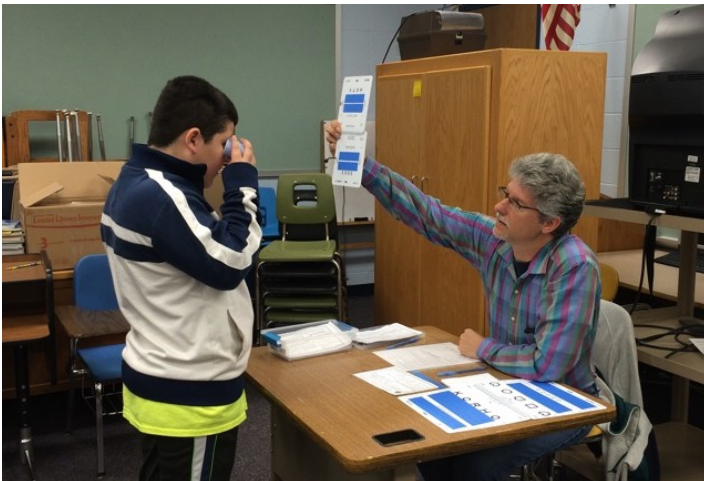

shewanna.

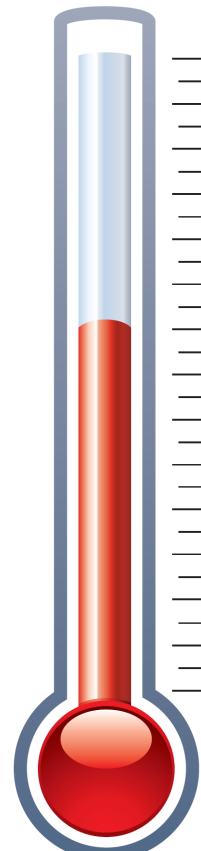
