Experience Service Together - Hawaiian Style

As most of you know, this year's Lions International Convention was held in Honolulu Hawaii with over 18,000 people from all over the globe in attendance. Many lions in our district asked me to "bring something back" from this adventure. So here are a few tidbits from the trip you may find interesting that Lion Diane and I discovered. Even though this was a working trip of sorts for the DGE's, getting the opportunity to experience Lionism from different world views really broadens a person's perspective. Let's take a little trip shall we? First stop, the British Islands. We were invited to the British hospitality event one evening. These Lions really know how to put on a party. White coats and bagpipers, wonderful deserts and all the trimmings. What made this event so special was the fact that the language of Lions is universal and that we all understood it. As one "chap" put it, we all are dealing with many of the same

challenges you are in the "colonies". Declining membership and finding people to take on leadership rolls top the list. One solution being implemented over the pond is having clubs join forces and performing service projects together. Increasing the fun factor, as they put it, has increased the energy levels by Lions accomplishing things they otherwise would not have been able to do by themselves. Hmmmm, sounds vaguely familiar doesn't it? Experiencing service together. Yep, we are not alone on that one! We have it covered with our district wide projects.

I looked over in horror at her and asked politely if she was kidding. She wasn't.....Awkward came to mind but we managed to get past that little problem.

These are just two of several hundred experiences we brought home to share with everyone. What Lion Diane and I did discover is our way of life and language we speak as Lions is universal throughout the world. Yes we may face similar trials and tribulations but they definitely can be overcome if we work as a unified team. I am absolutely, positively certain that the drive and compassion we possess in our district will carry us on into the future as we Experience the Service Together.

Lionism at Its Best in 25-G

The 1980s were an exciting time in Indiana Lionism. Several Lions were devoting a lot of time to Lions activities. The Indiana Lions Foundation, the new Indiana Lions State Office Building and the Indiana Lions Mid-Winter Leadership Conference had all come into existence.

At the same time a Lion in the little town of Urbana began to expand the scope of his activities. His efforts in Lionism would attract others to join with him and eventually lead to projects in other parts of the world and a term for him as an International Director on the Lions governing board.

Lion Jim Cameron had no idea in the beginning of his membership in the Urbana Lions Club that it would lead to big projects. The Urbana Lions joked about his big potato sale at the local hardware of a Lion member.

But Lion Jim had two qualities which would propel his career in Lionism. He wasn't afraid to tackle big projects and he was quick to ask others for their assistance.

Business contacts with people in Mexico and Central America made him aware of the dire need of vision and medical care for a large number of the people in those areas.

Over a period of years he led many eye-glass missions and delivered many emergency vehicles to those areas. Later on he led a mission to Africa and one to Romania which took thousands of dollars worth of equipment to a poor school there.

PID Jim Cameron was also responsible for establishing the Indiana Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center at Upland and beginning the eyeglass recycling program in the state prisons.

He also assisted in the 1980s membership recruitment drives which resulted in the formation of many new Indiana Lions Clubs.

From the Desk of Cabinet Secretary PDG Ann Haffner

FORM 990-N All Lions Clubs who have annual gross receipts of \$50,000 or less do not have to file IRS Form 990 or Form 990-EZ but must file Form 990-N (e-Postcard) by November 15 of each year. You'll need your club's EIN (employer identification number.)

If you do not file your e-Postcard on time, the IRS may (or may not) send you a reminder notice. There is no penalty assessment for late filing, but an organization that fails to file required e-Postcards (or Form 990 or 990-EZ) for three consecutive years will automatically lose its tax exempt status. The revocation of the organization's tax exempt status will not take place until the filing due date of the third year. **DO NOT LET THIS HAPPEN** as it's extremely complicated and costly to regain your club's tax exempt status.

When filing Form 990-N (E-Postcard) online you may be asked to give your e-mail address and a credit card number to pay for a lifetime filing fee of \$10. If your club does not have a credit card you will need to use a personal credit card and have your club reimburse you. I do this when I file our club's annual Business Entity Report with the Indiana Secretary of State as it is cheaper to file online than by mail. For complete information about Form 990-N go to www.irs.gov/efo.

CLUB SECRETARIES, NOW IS THE TIME! Some of our club secretaries have work to do. A number of Officer Report Forms (formerly known as PU 101s) filed online were incomplete—missing phone numbers and/or e-mail addresses. A few had inaccurate information. Several did not list a Membership Chairperson. A club's active membership program is its key to the future!

Reporting officers for the new Lions year online is probably the major cause for inaccuracies and omissions since we simply click on the member's name and his/her information transfers to the report.

However, as club secretaries we have a responsibility. We must go into the MyLCI website and check information recorded there for each of our members, not just for the officers we report. Information cannot be added or changed if a member's birth year is not recorded. We may need to ask our Lions for that information if it is not in club records.

Not only is accurate information needed by our district officers and LCI, it determines whether or not your members receive the HOOSIER LION and LION magazine. Our Lions deserve a little of our time to insure that their information is properly and completely recorded.

Please remember that online MMRs must be submitted by midnight the last day of the month. Hard copy MMRs must be received at LCI by the 20th of the month. Those received late will be recorded as the following month's report. It is our responsibility as secretaries to file reports by the due dates. Your club cannot earn the Club Excellence Award unless reports are filed by the due dates.

YOU ARE THE LINK! When your club elected and installed you as an officer, they placed a great deal of trust in you. You are the link between them and the district governor, your zone chairperson, District 25-G, and LCI. Through you, information is communicated on a two way avenue. Please take seriously the commitment you made. Your club, DG Vic, District 25-G, and LCI are depending on you. Teamwork and cooperation is the key to our success.

State Fair Volunteer Workers Needed

for the Indiana Lions Foundation as ticket sellers and ticket scanners at the Indiana State Fair, August 7-23 in Indianapolis. This is the Foundation's largest fundraiser and the proceeds are used to provide grants to Lions Clubs throughout the state of Indiana.

If you haven't worked at the Indiana State Fair in a while, you might be pleasantly surprised at the changes that have been implemented in recent years. All jobs can be done while sitting and some are in air-conditioned ticket booths. The checkout process for ticket sellers has been streamlined.

The Foundation is offering 1 W.P. Woods Fellowship credit for working the 1st shift and 2 credits for working the 2nd shift. It takes 10 credits to exchange for a Fellowship and the worker may choose to keep the credits or give them to his/her club. Instead of credits, a worker may choose to have a \$10.00 donation made to his/her club, district, Indiana Lions Foundation or any of the State Projects.

INDIANA LIONS FOUNDATION WEBSITE UP AND RUNNING

The website for the Indiana Lions Foundation is active and we have now moved into the 21st century. Our website has been completely revamped and customized so we can display our information, and users can easily navigate around the website.

Our new website domain name is: indianalionsfoundationmd25.org

We realize it's a lot of letters to try and get into correct order, but we had no other choice but to use this name. If you would like to avoid having to type it every time into your computer's search engine, we suggest you "Bookmark" the page. That way, all you will have to do is go the bookmark and click and the website will appear.

When you look over the website, you may find a very few areas that aren't 100% completely finished. However, we have placed sections into what we think make sense when you want to find something.

You will notice a photograph of our Indiana State Office Building with a photo of Helen Keller and a quote from her. You will also notice the Mission statement of our Foundation along with a "Call to Action" banner. This banner will change periodically as the Lions year goes on. In the spring and summer, our call to attention is the State Fair Workers Sign Up. Later in the year, we will focus on our Brick Paver Project, W. P. Woods Fellowship, and our Indiana Lions Distinguished Lion of the Year.

The Trustees of the Foundation are very excited and proud to have such a modern website. Some changes that have been made are:

1. You can **sign up to work the State Fair ONLINE**. Each day of the Fair, along with each gate the Lions are responsible for can now be signed up immediately. Jobs of sellers and scanners are also marked, and all you have to do is provide what date, shift, gate, and job you would like to work. You can also see who else is scheduled to work that day as well. You will be able to see the number of workers required for the job and if the gate is already filled. This should eliminate the "too many workers for one gate" problem. A reminder letter will be sent to your email address a few days before you are scheduled to work explaining directions, times to work, dress code, etc.

2. **Who We Are Category**: This section has the names of each Trustee and their district they represent. We haven't listed their email addresses or personal information. That information will be found in our "Contact Us" section. Also, we have incorporated our History of the Lions Foundation.

3. **"What We Do" Category**: Very simply, this is our Project area. This section will have our **W.P Woods Fellowship applications** (you can complete the application and pay for it online, even using your credits for working at the Fair, cash, or any combination). The WP Woods section will also have every recipient of the Fellowship. You can even sort as to District, Name, Club, or year received.

Indiana Distinguished Lions of the Year Application is also online and you can fill in the information and hit send and it will go immediately to the correct person within a few seconds.

Brick Paver Project: You may order and pay for a Brick Paver online. As you fill in the information to go on the brick, you will see how the wording will be placed on the brick you order. This section will also accept credit cards.

State Fair Workers: You have your choice of either using the home page "call to action" banner or using the State Fair Ticket Sales category. They work together, so whenever you sign up for one, the other category is also signed. You will also find our **Foundation Grant and Dedicated Grant applications**. You can now complete them online.

Lions License Plates category: We plan to add more information in this category. Right now, once you decide to purchase a Lions license plate, just click the link and it will take you immediately to the Indiana Bureau of Motor Vehicles so you can buy a plate.

Trustee Center: This area is for Foundation Trustees. It requires a username and password to enter the site. It will be where trustees can upload and download information, reports, etc. for the required work needed to be a trustee.

Contact Us: There, you will find a map where the Indiana Lions State Office Building is located, and you can even get driving direction to get there. Also, there is a section whereby you can contact the Foundation if you have questions, comments, or suggestions. Leave us a message and we'll get back to you as soon as possible.

Please go online to our website and see what your Foundation is doing. We definitely did not plan to have our website down for over a year and we're very sorry that it has taken so long, but we feel the wait will be well worth it. This is YOUR Indiana Lions Foundation.


