(**All** state projects trustees are very willing to come to your club and explain how your state project support money is spent.)

You would have heard about the **membership**, **leadership**, **and services activities** going on in our district. Lion John Wilkins explained that the Indiana Lions Foundation has plenty of money and they want to spend it. Matching grant applications up to \$1000.00 are easy to write and the grant criteria is not difficult. Call Lion John and he can walk you through it.

We took advantage of the **institutional knowledge and expertise of the PDG group** to ask, "How do we make District C Lions more visible and an acknowledged presence in our communities?" Their recommendations will be discussed next month.

I think some of the best meeting information came after lunch. Lion Ruth Kelly from the Zionsville Club presented a program on their "Stories in the Park" **Reading Action Pro-gram** service project. Last year it attracted over 300 children to a variety of reading activity stations. They partnered with the local library, senior citizens group and others. District Treasurer, Karen McKellar, presented an informative program on how **LCIF** came about, how it operates, and how it uses your LCIF donations. (Thanks to CT Karen's efforts, **District C is a leading district supporter of LCIF projects**.) She explained how District C can take advantage of LCIF financial assistance available in times of great need. CT Karen will be happy to provide any information your club may need.

Lion Worth Donaldson, from the Plainfield Club, took a common question Lions hear, "Where does my dues money go?" and put that answer down in a tri-fold pamphlet that explains where every penny goes. (ALL funds raised or donated by the public goes back to the public. Dues dollars is what supports the administrative activities of the local, district, state and international organizations.) Lion Worth is offering to share his template with any club that asks. Give him a call.

At the same time, Lion Worth, as district environmental chair, one of the Lions International Global Causes, has published a monthly newsletter on various environmental topics.



District Goals 2024-2025

To increase reporting of District 25C clubs Service Activity Report (SAR). As of today, only 42% of District C clubs have reported a service activity. Please report to LCI and the local media what Lions are doing. We are the best kept secret. Let your communities hear your LION roar. District GST chair Cindy Russell can assist you in promoting and reporting service activities.

Attention Club Officers: IRS 990 Annual Tax Filing Reminder

Dear Lion,

Please remember that all Lions clubs, districts and multiple districts with annual gross receipts less than US\$50,000 that are not required to file Forms 990 or 990-EZ must file the e-Postcard (also known as the 990-N). Please be advised this filing relates specifically to the 501(c)(4). If your Lions club, district or multiple district has a foundation, which is a separate legal entity, the appropriate form will need to be filed as well.

Please review the Annual Tax Filing information below. Thank you!

Please note that Lions Clubs International is not authorized to provide guidance regarding your filing. For specific questions, please contact a local tax professional or the IRS.

Lions: Please remember that all Lions clubs, districts and multiple districts that have annual gross receipts of less than US\$50,000 and do not have to file Forms 990 or 990-EZ must file the <u>e-Postcard</u> (also known as 990-N). If your Lions club, district or multiple district has a foundation, which is a separate legal entity, the appropriate form will need to be filed as well.

All filers must register at IRS.gov prior to filing their next Form 990-N. This is a one-time registration if the designated Lion files annually. If the designee changes from a prior year, the new designee must register with the IRS.

Please refer to the following chart regarding annual filing requirements:

2023-2024 Tax Year*	Form to File
Gross receipts normally \$50,000 or less	990-N
Gross receipts greater than \$50,000 and less than \$200,000, and total assets less than \$500,000	990-EZ or 990
Gross receipts \$200,000 or greater or total assets \$500,000 or greater	990

The e-Postcard is due by the 15th day of the fifth month after the close of your tax year. Lions clubs operate on a fiscal year, July 1-June 30, and the e-Postcard is due by <u>November 15</u> each year. Please note that an organization cannot request an extension for filing the Form 990-N.

If you do not file, you risk losing your tax-exempt status. Any Lions club that fails to meet its annual reporting requirement for three consecutive years will automatically lose its tax exempt status. A club may <u>apply</u> for reinstatement of its tax exemption even if it originally fell under a group exemption.

Every club and/or district (single, sub- and multiple) must have an employer identification number (EIN), even if it will not have employees. The EIN is a unique number that identifies the organization to the Internal Revenue Service. To apply for an EIN, you should obtain a Form SS-4 and its instructions from the IRS. You may also apply for an EIN online, by telephone (1-800-829-4933) or by fax (fax number at the location accepting applications from your state). It is important that clubs and districts use the correct EIN for their annual filing.

Please note that Lions Clubs International is not authorized to provide guidance regarding your club's filing. A Message from LCIF, Karen McKellar

Following is information we received this afternoon concerning the aid that has been provided to the southeastern United states by Lions Clubs International Foundation: This indicates that each of the areas have applied for and been awarded the following assistance from Lions Club International Foundation

Good morning/afternoon, Constitutional Area 1 Coordinators,

We are pleased to provide an update on LCIF's support following Hurricane Helene's recent impact in the southeastern United States.

From July 1, 2024, to October 3, 2024, LCIF has awarded a total of 125 disaster relief grants globally, amounting to \$2,018,452.

In response to Hurricane Helene, we are actively collaborating with Lions across multiple states to assess and address the immediate needs on the ground.

As of October 3, 2024, we have awarded 8 Emergency grants totaling \$120,000 for districts in Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Tennessee. We are in contact with several more districts and anticipate additional Emergency grants will be issued soon.

Additionally, Major Catastrophe grants of \$100,000 each have been awarded to Multiple District 35 (Florida) and Multiple District 31 (North Carolina).

We recognize the extensive damage across these states and are in continuous communication with Lions from affected areas. We are reviewing new requests daily, and we understand that districts may require further assistance. Our commitment to supporting relief activities remains strong, and we appreciate the dedication of Lions who are actively helping in these devastated communities.

Your interest in sharing the impactful work of YOUR foundation is truly inspiring. We will keep you updated as more requests come in.

A Message from Lion John Wilkins


Hurricane Helene caused massive destruction throughout the southeastern US. Lions have responded in a variety of ways including hundreds of thousands of dollars of LCIF emergency grant funding to many Lions districts in multiple states. In addition to this, many Lions clubs around the country have organized local collection points for relief supplies delivered into the disaster zone. One such effort has been organized in Indiana by the Lapel, Matthews, Upland and Gas City communities. The Lapel club set up a collection and sorting operation, which resulted in a semi-trailer filled with fourteen skids of supplies. These supplies were to be sent to Ashville, but when it was learned that this area had adequate supplies, a new, more pressing needed was identified in the small community of Douglas, Georgia, about 200 miles south of Atlanta. Douglas suffered heavy damage from Helene. Georgia PCC Cathy Williams from the Douglas club contacted LCI headquarters in Oak Brook asking for assistance, which led to a phone call to PDG Charley Short who then forwarded the information to Emergency Preparedness and Disaster Assistance Chair John Wilkins. Lion John contacted PCC Cathy who explained the dire need for supplies in Douglas as the community had exhausted their relief supplies. On Wednesday, October 16th, a semi loaded with supplies collected and organized in Lapel left a freight terminal in Ft. Wayne bound for Douglas. It arrived in Douglas the following day. In addition to these supplies, which will provide a few days of relief, we have identified a list of urgent supplies needed in Douglas. DG John and Lion John have proposed that the fifty clubs comprising District C 'adopt' the Douglas club and community by encouraging clubs and members to order supplies via Amazon, WalMart, Target or other vendors and have these orders shipped directly to a receiving point in Douglas. Needs include diapers, baby formula, baby wipes, Ensure, adult diapers for seniors and non-perishable food items. These items can be shipped directly to:

Lions Quest, our Lions youth skills program for schools and community organizations, held its annual US Coordinators Conference at Oak Brook Lions Headquarters on the 14th and 15th of October. This conference highlighted many new updates to the Lions Quest curriculum and celebrated growing success around the country.

New features and program updates include:

- New sixteen week course modules designed to better fit school semesters
- All-digital content delivery, making edits and improvements easier,
- Improved use of video content within the lessons
- Improved curriculum design to "flow" coursework better,
- Reduced training expenses and expanded LCIF grants for Lions Quest,

Lions Quest programs are expanding across the US. Kentucky Lions have added over forty new Quest programs, with four new clubs created to support them. The presentations on these programs were exciting and inspirational! Many states sent coordinators to the conference for the first time in many years.

Indiana was praised for our programs in Clinton and Carroll County, which reflect both a traditional school-based program and a juvenile justice program respectively. Carroll County's first year juvenile justice program had 42 participants: with only one re-offense. Unexcused absences and tardies dropped to zero. Lions Quest really works to build better kids!

Rules for Redeeming State Fair Credits Announced

A person (Lion or non-Lion) may use their state fair credits in one of three ways as follows:

- Expend 10 of their accumulated credits for a W. P. Woods Fellowship for oneself or to give to another person (Lion or non-Lion) in recognition of their commitment to community service
- Expend 10 of their accumulated credits for a \$200 Community Service Grant for a Lions club located in Indiana. A check for \$200 will be made out to the designated club and mailed to the person using the credits for their presentation to the club in a manner of their choosing.
- 3. Expend 10 of their accumulated credits for a grant to one of the five Indiana Lions state projects, LCIF, one of the seven MD25 districts or the Indiana Lions Foundation. A check for \$200 will be made out to the designated state project, LCIF, district or the Foundation and mailed to the requesting person for their presentation to the receiving organization. A person may wish to present the check to one of their district trustees of the designated state project or perhaps mail the check with a cover letter to the state project with a personal note relating why they are supportive of the work of that state project.

A person (Lion or non-Lion) can transfer their credits to an Indiana club, an MD25 District or to another Lion. Two or more Lions who don't have 10 accumulated credits as individuals could band together and decide to transfer their credits to one person or to a club, who could then amass the required 10 credits to use in one of the three ways stated above. A Lion or non-Lion may wish to transfer their credits to an MD25 District to allow the District Governor to present W. P. Woods fellowships.

In a fiscal year (July 1 to June 30) a person or club may only use 10 of their accumulated credits either for the \$200 Community Service Grant to a club or for a \$200 grant to one of the state projects, LCIF, MD25 district or the Foundation.
