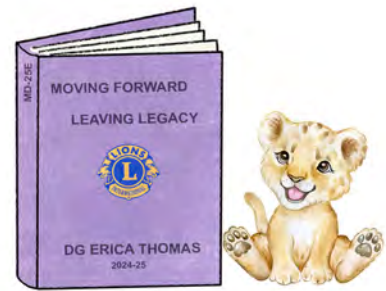

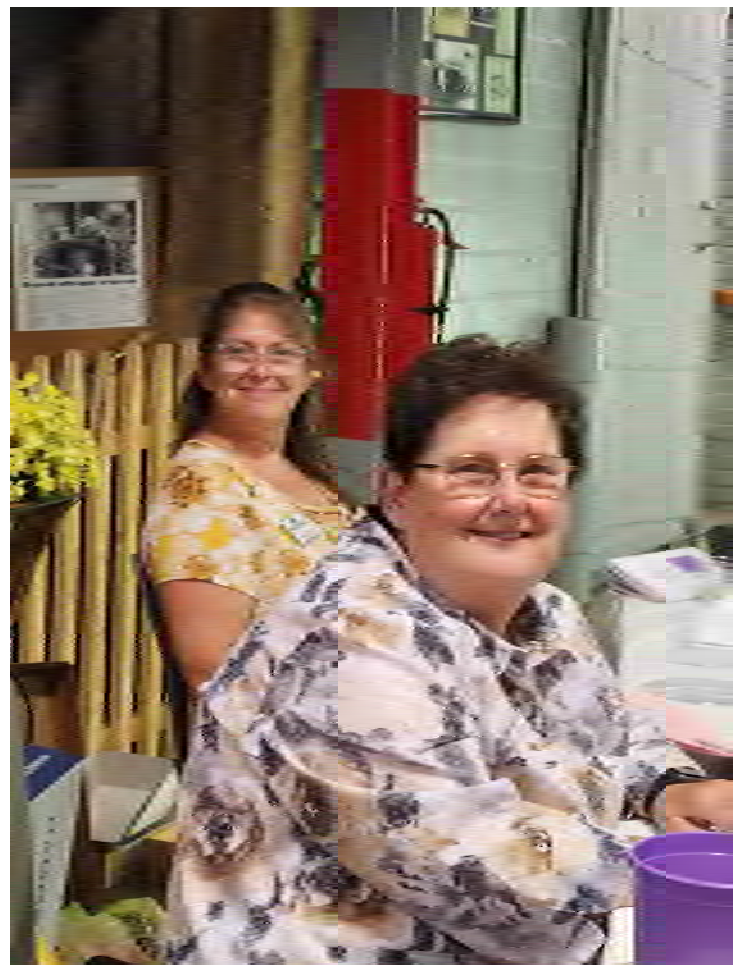

# Past District Governor Corner

Hello Lions,

As I set at the computer to write this article, I realize that we are already one month into Lions year '24-'25. By now many of our clubs have had our summer fundraiser and hopefully most of the members are back from vacation. Yet, with the lazy part of summer, August, still ahead of us, many clubs are wondering what to do right now. With that thought in mind, here are 5 things each club can do to make the rest of this year successful.

**#1. HAVE THE CLUB MEMBERS IDENTIFY WHAT ONE THING THAT IS MOST IMPORTANT TO THE MEMBERS OF THE CLUB TO ACCOMPLISH THIS YEAR.** Yes, most of us know about SMART goals and we can turn the member's input into one, but first the club leaders should **JUST GET THE CLUB MEMBERS TO SAY OUT LOUD WHAT IS IMPORTANT FOR THE CLUB TO ACCOMPLISH IN 2024-2025.** Then the President and executive officers can make the SMART goal and action planS for accomplishing the most important item to club members. But without knowing what the members want to accomplish, the club leaders will have a more difficult time engaging the members in activities for the club.

**#2. DEVELOP A SENSE OF PURPOSE IN THE CLUB MEMBERS OR YOUR TEAM THAT MAKES THE OBJECTIVE LARGER THAN YOURSELF.** Knowing that what you are doing as a club will have an impact on someone or for someone is a purpose that will last long after the project. Being part of an INTERNATIONAL organization, a STATE organization, and active in your community gives each member the chance to make a lasting impact that will change the future for a person. If the club increases donations to LCIF and the state projects, that will have the impact of a lifetime for some adult or child. Realizing that our LICF foundation and our state projects change lives with the contributions they make to help individuals is a easy first step in developing the realization that each club member is an important part of an organization that serves a purpose larger then ourselves.

**#3 DO SOMETHING.** Each club in each community **MUST HAVE A PURPOSE.** In the first step we identified what the most important purpose of the club for the year 2024-2025 is. **NOW DO SOMETHING TO ACCOMPLISH THAT PURPOSE.** While there will be steps of planning such as developing a particular SMART goal and then determining the OBJECTIVES and TASKS to reach the goal, don't get stuck in the planning sessions. Planning by itself will not **GET THE GOAL DONE.** Take concrete steps to complete the task that leads to the completion of the objective that will get the goal accomplished. Now is the time to **GET BUSY DOING SOMETHING** toward the **ONE THING THAT IS MOST IMPORTANT TO THE MEMBERS OF THE CLUB TO ACCOMPLISH** this year. As a retired judge I practiced in front of use to say before court: "Let's go do something even if it is wrong and then we will figure out how to correct it." Just go do something to reach the goal.

**#4 DON'T OVER CONTROL.** Once the goal is set, get the members involved in the action plan and **LET THEM DO IT.** Presidents, let the VPs take charge and grow with the process. Make sure that mentors (that is members with lots of experience) work with newer members and let them own the process of reaching their objective for the goal. They may do it right from the start, or they may not, but working together and learning from each other is just as important as to the correct outcome the first time. If you get working on the goal now, you have time to recover from any mistakes and still have a sense of accomplishment before June, 2025.

**#5 RECOGNIZE AND CELEBRATE.** When someone or a committee or a team or the whole club accomplishes a step along the way, recognize and celebrate the accomplishment. Each accomplishment is something that you can check off the action plan and is an reason to celebrate that one more thing is done and finished. Realize you are one step closer to what it is the club wants to accomplish and recognize those who have made that possible. When the final goal is met, have a party to recognize everyone, everything and every step of the way for the realization of the goal. Remember, you can never say "Thank You" enough to a person for the work they have done. A team always celebrates its championships; your club reaching its goal is the championship you are looking for. So recognize the members who conquer each task and celebrate the achievement of the goal.

Try these 5 steps in the next month and see if they can give your club a blueprint on the activities to do in the next 10 months of Lions Year 2024-2025

# Reading Action Chair Debbie Ellis with help from Brandy Gentry

Lions have taken up the challenge of promoting reading worldwide.

It is important work, aimed at helping lift millions of people out of hardship. Learning to read lets people acquire the skills and knowledge they need “to overcome poverty, disease and other social ills,” said Past International President Wayne A. Madden, who served from 2012 to 2013. Literacy, he said, is “a gift Lions can give to children and adults around the world.”

Globally, nearly 1 billion adults cannot read and write. The issue isn’t just a challenge for developing regions, either. In the United States, 21 million people can’t read, and millions more have reading skills so limited that they have difficulty with common tasks such as reading signs or workplace instructions.

The Reading Action Program, launched in 2012, is a 10-year Lions commitment to focus on strengthening global literacy. The program calls for Lions to organize service projects and activities that underscore the importance of reading.

Lions clubs around the world have responded with a broad variety of community-based, person-to-person efforts. Some have helped develop after-school reading programs. Others have volunteered to read to children at local libraries, work as reading tutors or donate books and computers. In future editions of the newsletter, we will address different issues our youth is encountering, and identifying potential solutions to address these important issues. Dyslexia, which affects 1 in 5 individuals, requires structured literacy to develop reading skills. Brandy and Chris Gentry (members of the Sullivan County Lions Club) encountered a scarcity of qualified tutors and teachers in their area when they discovered their son’s dyslexia. Orton Gillingham or Lindamood Bell instruction was deemed essential for their son’s reading success. Even though their son attended a school with skilled teachers, including Brandy, who later received Orton Gillingham training to support her son and other students, the training was essential in addressing this illness. Despite the significance of this training, many teachers lack access to it due to high costs. God made a way and Brandy’s path found Jen Knopf from The Reed Charitable Foundation in Orlando, Florida on Facebook. Jen has a similar story as Brandy’s and she was able to create The Reed Foundation to spread the mission of structured literacy, dyslexia, and provide training to teachers in Orton Gillingham. Brandy worked with the foundation to bring its training to Sullivan, resulting in the successful training of K-8 teachers and aides in the Southwest School Corporation. Together, they’re making a positive impact in their local community, one trained teacher at a time. Currently, Brandy serves as a literacy cadre coach at Sullivan, promoting structured literacy training to her colleagues and supporting nearby schools in their implementation of Orton Gillingham and science of reading.

# Lions Check Vision at 2024 4H Fair

24 Members of the four Lawrence County Lions Clubs (Bedford, Bedford Noon, Mitchell, and Fayetteville Community) conducted vision screening at the Lawrence County 4H Fair from July 6, 2024 to July 13, 2024 and screened 45 adults for far and near vision and field of vision with 15 being referred with problems to seek additional follow up professional exams.

We also screened 105 children for far and near vision with 19 being referred to seek additional follow up professional exams. This year Lions screened 45 children age six to two with a KidSight camera referring 4 with problems to seek additional follow up professional exams. The Lions tested 46 people for blood glucose. Information on diabetes diet, management, and recipes were offered. Also eleven pairs of new reading glasses were given free of charge to individuals needing corrective glasses to help improve their near vision. We would like to thank the Lawrence County Fair Board and our 3 community minded sponsors (Day and Carter Mortuary, Brent Maudlin State Farm Insurance, and Williams Wealth LLC) for making this service to our community possible.

## Indiana Lions Foundation Needs Your Help at the Indiana State Fair

Opening Day of the 2024 Indiana State Fair is just one month away. As in previous years, we will be greeting fairgoers, while selling and scanning tickets at Gate 1W on 38th Street and Gate 12 on 42nd Street. This year, we will also be working at 4 new gates at the tunnel exits from the State Fair Infield parking lot.

### Incentives:

Volunteers can earn credits towards a W.P. Woods Fellowship (WPWF), or a nominal cash donation to their Lions Club or favorite Indiana Lions state project.

Early AM Shift: 5:30 am–8:30 am - 1 WPWF credit

AM Shift: 8:00 am–2:30 pm - 1 WPWF credit

PM Shift: 2:00 pm–8:30 pm - 2 WPWF credits

Bring a carload of volunteers (minimum: 5) to work at the State Fair and we will help pay for the gas.

Bring a vanload of volunteers (minimum: 8) to work at the State Fair and we will help pay for the van rental and the gas.

### Dress Code Reminder:

The Indiana State Fair has a dress code for volunteers working at the State Fair.

Khaki/tan or black pants, shorts or skirts. No bluejeans, please.

Lions shirts are acceptable, as are blue State Fair shirts, and plain white t-shirts.

We are asked to wear caps. If you have a Lions cap or a tan State Fair cap from previous years, those are acceptable. If you do not have a cap, we will provide you with an Indiana Lions Foundation cap.

### Check-In / Check-Out Reminder:

Please be sure to check in at the Indiana Lions Foundation booth at the beginning of your shift, and check out at the same place at the end of your shift.

### Directions to Indiana State Fair:

Volunteers for the Indiana Lions Foundation State Fair project should enter the fairgrounds through Gate 10, at the intersection of 42nd Street and Crittenden Avenue in Indianapolis. You should be able to use that intersection as the destination in Google Maps.

An annotated map of the Indiana State Fairgrounds is attached. Gate 10, the parking area, the Foundation's check-in booth, and our gates are highlighted.

If you have any questions about our Indiana State Fair project, please call me or send me an email message.

There are a couple of changes for this year.

- Last year, the Fair was closed on Monday and Tuesday each week; this year it will be closed only on Monday.
- Automobile entrance to infield parking will be handled differently this year. In prior years, cashiers collected money for auto parking fees and entrance fees on the access roads. This year, only auto parking fees will be charged at the access roads. Four new gates are being created on the infield, and Lions will sell and scan tickets at these new gates. On the website sign-in sheets they are designated as NW, SW, NE and SE gates.

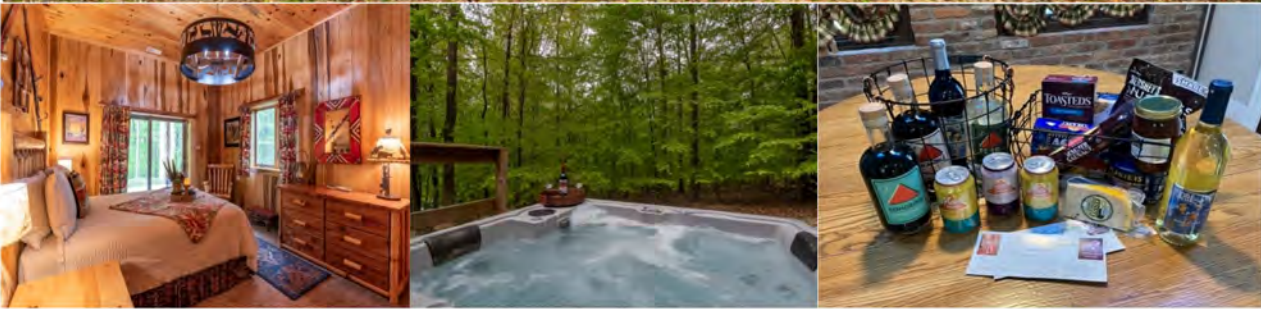
