One of the transitional challenges for us is the closing of the brick plaza at 8780 Purdue Road, which contains about four-hundred etched pavers that have been purchased as a fundraising project of the Indiana Lions Foundation. The Foundation plans to commission a donor wall in the new office suite containing all of the names of Lions, clubs, state projects and others who have purchased pavers over the years.

Reading Action Plan

The Lions Reading Action Program is a global initiative by Lions Clubs International to improve literacy through community-based projects. The program, launched in 2012, encourages Lions clubs to organize service projects like reading to children, donating books and computers, and providing tutoring to help improve literacy skills for both children and adults. It focuses on activities that support early literacy development and helps to provide children with the reading resources they need to succeed in school.

You might also volunteer to read or participate in a reading action program at a nursing home. Reading to residents at nursing homes benefits their mental and emotional health by reducing loneliness, stimulating their minds, and providing social connection. To make it successful, ask residents about their interests, keep sessions short and engaging, read with expression, and encourage discussion to spark memories and conversations.

Benefits of reading at nursing homes

- **Improves cognitive function:** Reading engages the brain, which can help improve memory, focus, and concentration, and may even help delay cognitive decline.
- **Reduces loneliness and anxiety:** Reading aloud creates a shared experience, fostering human connection and providing an opportunity for social engagement. Listening to a calm voice can also be very relaxing and reduce stress.
- **Provides entertainment and escape:** It can offer residents a mental escape and a chance to enjoy a story, which can be especially helpful for those with vision loss or memory issues.
- **Sparks memories:** Reading familiar books or materials like old letters and newspaper clippings can trigger cherished memories and lead to meaningful conversations.

Improves mood and well-being: Reading together can uplift mood, reduce agitation, and increase feelings of purpose and connectedness.

What service activities are your clubs doing right now? Now is a great time to start a reading action program at your community schools, libraries or nursing homes. We Serve!

District 25-E Disaster Response Trailer



He was preceded in death by his son-in-law, Rodney Elliott, brothers Wayne Rice and Earl Rice, his sister Bonnie Christoph, and his grandson Michael Rice. He is survived by his wife, Kathryn, of 70 years, along with their children Julie Elliott (Perry) Nigh, Scott (Marianne) Rice, and Dana (Lisa) Rice, 10 grandchildren, 32 great-grandchildren, and 1 great-great-grandchild due in December.

Gene was a US Army Veteran who served from 1953 to 1955 and spent several months in Korea.

Gene was a lifelong farmer on the Rice Family Farm, which his grandfather purchased in 1917. He did his part to advance the legacy that continues today. His great passion was the Lions Club International, of which he was a member of the Wanatah club for at least 65 years. He served in every office from local to district level and was elected to a 2-year term on the International Board of Directors, serving from 1975 to 1977. It was through this opportunity that he and Kathryn travelled to many countries around the world. Their love for international travel stayed with them throughout life as they visited nearly 60 countries. Gene was also instrumental in developing the Lions eyeglass mission program, which continues to send missions every year to help people in need.

Gene was known throughout the area as the "wedding singer." He sang at hundreds of weddings and funerals spanning six decades.

A special thank you to the staff of Pines Village in Valparaiso for their love and compassion for Gene. Special thanks also to Dunes Hospice for their compassionate care. And a very special thank you to his caregiver, Ms. Sharon Malama, for the incredible love and care she gave Gene during these past 11 months.

A visitation was held on Saturday, November 29th, from 10 a.m. to noon at Salem Church, 302 S. Main St., Wanatah, with a Lions Club service at noon.





