Governor Paul Scheetz graduated from Pioneer High School, in Royal Center, IN. Shortly after graduation he enlisted in the United States Navy.

He was stationed on various ships as well as numerous shore commands. During his career in the Navy, he quickly rose to the rank of Chief Petty Officer. Retiring after 21 years of service he went back to school and earned a BS degree in Electronics and Computer Technology from ITT Lake Mary Florida. He began a second career as an electronic security technician at the Nevada Test Site. Throughout both careers he was a troubleshooter and repairman helping not only those he worked with but also anyone who needed that extra help.

September of 2015 Governor Scheetz was asked by the President of the Lucerne Lions Club to join their club. In July of 2016 he was elected President of the Lucerne Lions Club, a term he held for five years. During his time as President, the club received a Club Excellence Award. Several Past District Governors urged him to become a Zone Chair for Zone 2 of District C. He served as Zone 2 Chair for five District Governors. In 2023 Paul was elected to serve as a Trustee for the Indiana Lion's Foundation and Holding Corporation. That same year the Past District Governors urged him to run for Second Vice District and he was elected. In 2024 he was elected as the First Vice District Governor and in 2025 elected as the next District Governor

The Governor's goals for this year are: Not to lose any clubs, Strengthen all clubs, Add two new members to each club, Add two new clubs to the district, 100% Service Reporting and 100% Club participation in LCIF. The Governor's Theme is "Many Oars Make Light Work". When we all row in the same direction, it is easier to accomplish our goals.

The Indiana Lions Foundation's Matching Grants Benefit Many Lions Charitable Projects

The Indiana Lions Foundation completed its fiscal year with \$24,652 in matching grants awarded to twenty-five clubs and Camp Woodsmoke as well as a disaster assistance grant awarded to District E. These grants resulted in many benefits to our fellow Hoosiers through the enabling of these clubs in pursuing many charitable projects through the use of their charitable funds supplemented by Foundation matching grants. As a result of this club/Foundation partnership:

1. Children 1) learned to appreciate reading through listening to stories in their public parks, 2) received their own book and 3) accessed new books placed in their library
2. Children learned how to fish
3. Children were screened for vision abnormalities and dyslexia in their schools
4. Children received beds to sleep in when they had no bed and were given food on weekends when no food was available in their home
5. Children were able to attend Camp Woodsmoke with a working infirmary
6. Communities benefited by 1) receiving information through the erection of informational signs, 2) being able to use ADA compliant restroom facilities and 3) being able to use modern plumbing systems and kitchen facilities in their community centers
7. The uninsured were able to receive medical care in a free clinic with updated exam lighting
8. Communities were enhanced with new tree plantings and entertained by Fourth of July fireworks displays
9. First responders benefited by being able to use a working beverage cooker in their firehouse and by being able to have 'blue bags' available to treat autistic victims and traumatized children

Clinton Lions Club

The Clinton Lions Club received a grant of \$3,500 in October 2024 to assist our clubs effort to replace our existing camera that is over ten years old which is used in our Pre School Vision Screening Program. In addition to this grant we also received a \$1,000 matching grant from the Indiana Lions Foundation thanks to the efforts of Lions Past International Director Nick Xinopoulos and Lion John Wilkins, Vice President of the Indiana Lions Foundation. The remaining cost of the camera of \$7,390 will be made up by funds within the clubs budget(\$2,890) for the new Pulse-Optic S-20 Camera System.

This camera will be put into use beginning with the up coming 2025-2026 school year as we visit day care centers and schools with Vermillion, Parke , and Fountain Counties. At the present time we visit ten school corporations and twelve day care centers to provide free vision screening services to the students. With the use of our new camera system we expect theses number to increase as we will be able to expand our services to additional day care centers and schools.

So far three of our club members have been trained on the new system but this number will increase as additional training will be held for other club members, It is very important to identify eye disorders at the earlieset age possible and this camera will allows us to accomplish this task.

We appreciate the grant from the Vermillion County Community Foundation and The Indiana Lions Foundation and all who have partnered with us to improve and expand our Vision Screening Program. Together we will make a difference in our youth who may be experiencing vision problems.
