

DISTRICT GOVERNOR COLUMN



How Do We Show

In several exit interviews with those who have left Lions three things kept coming up. One was that Lions had not meet their needs, another was they just didn't have time, but the most common reason for leaving was the lack of recognition for what they had done.

Now they were not looking for some big or fancy gift or plaque but they often said they go no thanks or positive reinforcement for their service. And I must say many clubs often forget to brag on those who have done a good job.

Now there are two basic categories of recognition for people. The first is formal and the second is informal. The formal would be like a Melvin Jones Fellowship, Lion of the Year, and certificate of appreciation. Under the informal just a simple thanks for a good job, mention in the club news letter or press release to the local paper. Some clubs set aside a few minutes every so often to brag on those who have served on committees or volunteered to help with a project. Others have an award night once a year to recognize those who have served as club and or district officers for the year along with the various committee members and those who donated funds and service to the club.

There are many ways to recognize a member for their service but when we do it must be to the point and sincere. By to the point we mean about the one being recognized and not all about the project or service. As far as sincere it must be heartfelt and meaningful. For example, many years back while working with a Cub Scout pack we presented a parent with "The Xerox" award for making copies for us. Years later hanging in her office next to her law degree was the award.

Only recently I presented a fellow Lion a centennial mug for agreeing to serve one more year as club president. These were simple acts of recognition but they went a long ways in the hearts of those involved.

So, now I am asking how does your club recognize the work your members do. Do you have any plans or even thoughts about recognition?

HELPS LOCAL LIONS PROVIDE LOCAL SERVICE WITH A GLOBAL IMPACT

The last Lions year found 40 (73%) of 25B's clubs &/or Lions donating to our Foundation. The total amount donated was \$24,425. This was the second largest amount donated by MD 25's seven districts. It was the highest amount per club or per member in MD25! Just think what we could do if 100% of our active clubs donated.

Twelve 25B Lions received Melvin Jones Fellowships and another 6 received Progressive MJF's. Most of those were the result of club donations of \$1000 to honor a member. Several were personal contributions (it is ok for Lions to make personal donations to our Foundation). In addition the following 25B Lions received Progressive Melvin Jones Fellowships: Joe Frymier (Angola); Wayne Madden (Auburn LC); Bev Fiandt, Dave Fiandt and Tom Kleber (Central); and Dick Dodge (Pleasant Lake). Thanks to those clubs and those Lions who stepped to the plate in support of our Foundation.

Indiana Lions Foundation Needs Your Help Please volunteer to work at the Indiana State Fair

The Indiana Lions Foundation provides ticket sellers and ticket scanners at four gates at the Indiana State Fair. **The fair runs Friday August 5th—Sunday, August 21st.** Over 600 shifts need to be filled over this 17 day period. This is the single largest fundraiser for the Foundation and the money is used to provide Foundation Grants to individual clubs.

Working at the State Fair as a ticket seller or scanner is much easier than it has been in the past. The computer terminals worked very well last year and selling tickets requires pushing only three buttons. Scanning tickets requires only that the worker hold the hand held scanner over the bar-coded ticket and press the trigger.

Most positions are sitting and two of the four gates have air conditioned booths for the ticket sellers. Only the Tunnel Gate may require standing, although that is not normally a busy gate.

Two shifts are available to work. The morning shift is 7:30 a.m.—3:00 p.m.. The afternoon shift is 1:30 p.m..—9:00/9:30 p.m..

In return for working the Indiana Lions Foundation is offering W.P. Woods Fellowship credits for workers—one credit for the morning shift and two credits for the afternoon shift. It takes 10 credits to earn a regular W.P. Woods and 12 credits for the Centennial Plate. Bring a car load of Lions and friends and join us at the Fair this year.

Every year Lions Clubs International sponsors the International Convention for all Lions worldwide, and several regional forums, ours being the USA/Canada Forum.

Attending an International Convention or Forum provides members with a wonderful opportunity to rekindle their dedication to those in need; meet Lions from all over the world; learn new tips and techniques for being the best Lion one can be; and obtain valuable resource materials. Plus, it's great FUN!

The annual International Convention, held in late June or early July, is much more than business meetings, although that is ONE important purpose.

Even before the Convention convenes, District Governor's School prepares new District Governors for the various aspects of their position, including being an effective liason between the clubs in their local district and International.

General Sessions include wide variety each year. Major speakers from the International President to other respected people, such as Helen Keller, Mother Teresa, and even a sitting American President, Ronald Reagen, have given Lions something about which to think.

The Flag Ceremony, where the 200 plus member flags are formally presented one-at-a-time with background video about each country, is an audience favorite. When the International Convention was held in Indianapolis, Indiana Lions were lucky to participate in carrying a flag.

The Peace Poster Contest Winner receives recognition and shares their fresh view on securing peace with all peoples of the world.

Each delegation has their time in the spotlight during the fourhour Parade of Nations, celebrating Lions diversity and unity. (Usually we are lucky and there are no thunder and lightning storms to stop the parade as there was in Indianapolis.)

Special entertainment comes in two forms: the Host Country Festival of Talent and an internationally well-known talent, such as Debbie Reynolds, Scott Hamilton's ice show, and even the Flying Wallendas. Continued From Previous Page Membership Minute

Of course, there is campaigning for office or for changes in the Constitution or By-Laws, with CLUB DELEGATES voting later .in the week. Newly elected officers begin their terms near the end of the Convention. For instance, the International Board of Directors goes into session as soon as the Convention is adjourned.

STEP UP TO LEADERSHIP

The story is told of how a great kingdom that was conquered by a very small and untrained force. It happened even though the country had a very large and well trained military, an advanced society and a well organized government. So what was lacking, it was the lack of solid leadership. You see, as the story goes, the top level of leadership was missing.

So, now you're asking why I bring this story up. Well, it seems that in many clubs there is a serious lack of leadership. Sometimes it appears as the unfilled leadership offices, other times as poorly motivated leaders or even as untrained leaders. Let us look at each of these and their possible cures.

First let us look at the open leadership positions. Lions Clubs International (LCI) provides a model diagram of how a club should be set up. But it is just a model. Each club is allowed to organize themselves as they see fit. In the model leaders progress up the ladder from lion tamer to treasurer to secretary to first vice president to president to board member. A lion tamer learns what property the club has and how things are to be set up for each meeting. Then as treasurer they learn the club budget, fund raisers and project cost and the dues system. As the secretary they learn the history of the club, the different committees and how they work and how important keeping the club informed as well as what reports that need to be sent to district, state and LCI. Then comes the first vice president who now has a good foundation but now has a year to learn what it takes to guide the club. After that year they serve as "the leader" of the club. As president he guides the club through a year of projects, fund raising, and growth. But their time of service to the club does not end. For now there is time to serve on the board of directors.

Yes there are those that will accept a leadership position with little or no interest in fulfilling the duties of the office. I have seen those that take an office because they think it will look good on a resume or for a feeling of self importance. Others accept a position because they just can't say no. If this happens then it is up to the club and the other officers to motivate and inspire these people to perform.

Now to address those who lack training, there is hope. As outlined briefly above one of the reasons for progression up the ladder of leadership is to gain training and experience. But there is more training

offered. The Multiple District (State) and the District both offer officer training at various times during the year. There is training given at the Zone meetings also. Then there is online training and webinars offered by LCI along with such forums as the USA/Canada Forum and the Indiana Lions Conference. Then there are several Lions in the district and state that will come to your club to provide whatever training you may require.

I know that many Lions feel that once they have served their club that is it, but, it takes many more leaders to keep the Lions going and growing. At the District level there is the need for various committee members and chairs, Zone Chairs, second and first Vice District Governors and District Governor. Each of these offices has a progression laid out by LCI. For example to be a Zone Chair one must first have served as a Club President. And for one to serve as a Second Vice District Governor one must serve first as a Zone Chair.

Having spent all this time going over Club and District leadership I think we now come to a couple of questions each needs to ask. Do I want Lions to continue to serve my community? Could this service disappear if the Lions do not have good leadership? How can I help our current leadership? And finally, Why haven't I stepped up and filled that need for leadership?
