Our Lions year is rapidly drawing to a close and with it the completion of my first term as your district governor. It has been a very enjoyable time serving. I have been to each of your clubs at least one time and have been amazed at the things the Lions are doing in District 25B. Notice I did say "my first term" in the opening sentence. 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If your club has not yet made a donation to LCIF, please do so soon. So I again thank all of you that have stepped up in some way.

Have you ever been to the Indiana School for the Blind and Visually Impaired? If not, then there is an excellent opportunity for you to go for the first time on Saturday, May 20. This is the date for the annual Spring Work Day at the school. We will be doing a variety of jobs including weeding flowerbeds, mulching, washing windows, and other general upkeep type of chores. Donuts are provided in the morning and lunch is also provided. If you are interested in a tour of the school after we finish working, then that can be arranged as well. Work is usually completed by 2:00. So get a carload of your Lions members together and plan on attending. Registration begins at 8:30 and work begins at 9:00. So following in the steps of our previous leaders I challenge the District to "Build for the Future" by way of "Service to Others."

Look beyond what might not have succeeded in prior years, and give their enthusiasm a chance to surprise even THEM at how great their idea can become. Remember, we're here to serve...let them."

LCIF IS OUR FOUNDATION

Your club has no more money in its charities account and can not afford a donation this year. If that is the case, at your next meeting, ask your members "if you could save one child from dying from measles for \$1; how many would you be willing to save"? Pass the hat, deposit whatever you are able to collect in your charities account and write a check to LCIF, OUR Foundation.
