VICE DISTRICT GOVERNOR'S PAGE

In my last article to the Lions of 25B, I talked about my visit to Leader Dog in Rochester, Michigan. In this article, and future ones as well, I will be highlighting some of our other state projects.

We have a complete slate of trustees for all the state projects except Speech and Hearing. Currently, Lion Paul Row and myself are trustees. We need one more to fill this committee. If after reading what this you would like to get involved with Speech and Hearing, please contact either Paul or me.

The Indiana Lions Speech and Hearing became a state project in 1981. There are many different focuses of this committee. One of those is the loaner hearing aid program. We have partnered with Riley Hospital to provide used hearing aids as loaners to those that cannot afford hearing aids. There still is some cost to the individual, usually between \$300 and \$500. So if you know of a low-income person who is need, please contact one of the trustees. Also, if you can get any used hearing aids to donate, please let us know as well.

Another program is providing scholarships and grants through the McKinney Outreach Program. The McKinney University program was established in August 2003, the purpose of this project is to provide funds to the four state universities with Audiology and/or Speech Pathology programs. In return, the universities agreed to accept free diagnostic referrals in Speech and or Hearing (as available) and to provide ear molds and fittings for the loaner aid bank at a reduced cost. The four State Universities are Ball State, Indiana State, Indiana University, and Purdue University. They currently receive \$4,000 yearly to be allocated as follows: a minimum of \$500 in each of three (3) areas; research, scholarship and materials/ equipment. The remaining \$2,500 can be spent in any portion of the 3 areas at the discretion of the department head or their representative.

Finally, by giving to this state project, you or your club

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can receive a Miyamoto Fellowship. Dr. Richard T. Miyamoto is Chairman of the Department of Otolaryngology – Head and Neck Surgery at the Indiana University School of Medicine. At Riley Hospital for Children, he is Medical Director of Audiology and Speech- Language Pathology. In the 1980's, a grant from Speech and Hearing was provided to Riley Hospital and Dr. Miyamoto to expand the use of cochlear implants for children. Dr. Miyamoto's pioneering work has been recognized around the world, and he continues his close relationship with the Lions of Indiana. A handsome plaque has been designed to honor the recipients of the Miyamoto Fellowship. For a \$500 donation to Indiana Lions Speech and Hearing, Inc. within a two year period, one plaque may be ordered in the recipient's name to be presented by the donor Lion or Lions Club.

In the first quarter of the Lions year (7/1-9/30) 25B donations to LCIF exceeded \$8000! This is the largest first quarter total that I recall, and by a large margin! Most of that amount was from individual Lions and clubs with the donations earmarked for "Disaster Relief".
