Operation Kidsight and Westville Lions Do Vision Screenings

Westville Lions Marybeth Slont and Debi Ingram assisted Karlene Roe Operation Kidsight Coordinator for Preschool and Kindergarten students at Westville Elementary school for vision screenings on Monday, October 28, 2024. A total of 66 students were screened. 8 of those students received a referral to see an optometrist. 2 of those 8 are already under a doctors care. Operation Kidsight uses the PlusOptix screening system. The volunteer takes a digital "camera" measurement of the child's eyes from a comfortable distance of 3 to 4 feet. A pass/referral set by the American Association of Pediatric Opthalamology and Strabismus as modified by Dr. Daniel Neely a pediatric Opthalmologist at the Indiana School of Medicine, Riley Children's Hospital and the Midwest Eye Institute. This camera is used for ages 18 months to 6 years of age. It always makes the lions feel good when they can catch a vision problem early especially so early in the school year. These three Lions will be joined with other fellow lions to assist with acuity vision screening for 1st, 3rd, 5th and 8th grade students on Friday November 08, 2024 at Westville School they will screen 288 students.




"Care-ing Cases" – After the dinner program on Friday evening, we will assemble our Careing
