Our Guest speaker for our Lions District 25B District Convention on March 25 is International Director, Dr. Dianne J. Pitts, from Chappells, South Carolina. The following is her bio as it appears on the Website of Lions International:

Dr. Dianne J. Pitts, from Chappells, South Carolina, USA was elected to serve a two-year term as international director of Lions Clubs International at the association's 103rd International Convention, June 25 through June 29, 2021.

Director Pitts was an educator for 28 years and has twice received recognition as District Teacher of the Year. She is a contributing author to two textbooks and the published author of a three-volume Bible study for middle schoolers. She now uses her knowledge and experience to help Lions as well as other non-profit and charitable organizations with grant writing and presentations.

She first joined as member of the Gaffney Lions Club in 1994. And since 2010, has served with the Greenwood Lions Club. She has held a number of offices with the association including district governor, district Lions Quest chairperson, multiple district council chairperson and multiple district LCIF Campaign 100 chairperson. She has also served as faculty for multiple Lions Leadership Institutes and learning programs as well as webinars.

In recognition of her service, she has received numerous awards including several International President's Awards and International President's Certificates of Appreciation. Director Pitts is a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow. She has also been recognized as a Progressive Dr. Franklin G. Mason Fellow.

In addition to her Lions activities, Director Pitts is active in numerous civic and professional organizations including the South Carolina Education Association and the Nation Educational Association. She is also co-director for her local soup kitchen.

Director Pitts is married to Dr. Joe Pitts, a 50-year Lion and Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow.

To do a successful service project or fundraiser both are NEEDED and Everyone must feel that they are.

Service Projects present a way to gain work experience and learn more.

All projects need money – thus fundraising is important. Projects can be:

Reoccurring or one time

Conducted by a club/individual or partner with a company/organization

ALL have an IMPACT – for a specific group of people or area, even if it' is just someone passing through and area and noticing how nice the area is!

Helping the Hungry and/or Homeless

- Build a house with Habitat for Humanity
- Donate your old clothes
- Volunteer at a soup kitchen
- Donate old eyeglasses to an organization that collects that and distributes them to people in need
- Donate non-perishable food to a food bank
- Donate blankets to a homeless shelter
- Host a Thanksgiving dinner for people who may not be able to afford their own
- Offer to babysit or nanny for a family in need

Make "care kits" with shampoo, toothbrushes, combs, etc. to donate to homeless shelters

- Prepare a home-cooked meal for the residents of a nearby homeless shelter
- Collect grocery coupons to give to a local food bank
- Help repair or paint a local homeless shelter
- Donate art supplies to kids in a homeless shelter
- Help organize and sort donations at a homeless shelter
- Babysit children while their parents look for jobs
- Become a Big Buddy for children at a homeless shelter
- Take homeless children on outings
- Bake a batch of cookies or loaf of bread and deliver it to a soup kitchen
- Build flower boxes for Habitat for Humanity houses
- Organize a winter clothes drive to collect coats, hats, scarves, and gloves to be donated Make first aid kits for homeless shelters

Reducing Crime and Promoting Safety

- Volunteer at a police station or firehouse
- Become a certified lifeguard and volunteer at a local pool or beach
- Paint over graffiti in your neighborhood
- Organize a self-defense workshop
- Organize a drug-free campaign
- Sponsor a drug-free post-prom event
- Start or join a neighborhood watch program
- Create and distribute a list of hotlines for people who might need help
- Teach a home-alone safety class for children
- Create a TV or radio public service announcement against drug and alcohol use
- Become CPR certified
- Volunteer as a crossing guard for an elementary school

Make cards to give to a home for the elderly. This could fit well into an art project or poetry writing assignment.

- **2.** Have a can drive to collect food for your local food bank. Great for adding into a math lesson, learning about grocery shopping and budgeting.
- **3. Collect books for a school in another country.** If a student is going on a vacation abroad, they may have a suitcase to spare. Find a school that needs books and collect a suitcase full. And prepare a lesson on the country and culture when the student returns home!
- **4. Take baked goods to a local police/fire station.** Learning about different jobs in the community? Add some appreciation into the unit, as well.
- **5. Make sure the school has a recycling system** and, if not, raise awareness and funds to get one in place. Add up the trash each student uses and create graphs to share with the school community about how much garbage is created each day by individuals, families, classrooms, and the school. Older kids could write letters and a proposal for getting the needed recycling bins.
- **6. Sponsor an animal at the zoo by holding a class yard sale or raffle.** This one fits great into learning about animals or a field trip to the zoo.
- **7. Plant trees, start a school garden, or volunteer in a community garden.** Kids love to learn about where their food came from. Help them see the process first hand and find out how they can support nature in their community.
- 8. Donate household or baby items to refugees through the local refugee organization. Ask students whose families recently moved to your country to share a bit about their culture. Create some of their traditional food or celebrate a cultural holiday in class.
- **9. Take clothes to the local women's shelter.** Violence prevention can always be made age appropriate. Do some role plays about handling problems without violence... and invite guest speakers (like the police or social workers) to offer a presentation to the class about how to protect themselves and others.

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10. Collect toys for children in need.

Participating in community service is one of the most rewarding things you can do. No matter your age, giving back can help you build friendships, develop new skills, and increase life satisfaction — all while making the world a better place. It's no wonder that in a *Good Housekeeping* poll of over 4,000 people, 19% of respondents said they typically volunteer once a month and another 19% said they volunteer even more than that. Ahead, we've found the most impactful community service ideas for volunteers of all ages. Remember: these ideas are meant to be general. If one speaks to you, think of ways you can personalize it toward your interests and expertise. Don't be afraid to think big either. While you could totally pick up litter at the beach by yourself, you'd cover a lot more land if you organized a group to help you out. You might even ask everyone in that group to bring a can of food for a food pantry, too. It's all about getting creative and brainstorming ways to make giving back fun. And if you're hesitant to get out into your community, don't miss these exciting virtual volunteer opportunities

Drive seniors to doctors appointments.

Become a Big Brother or Big Sister.

Babysit for a neighbor in need.

Organize a musical hour or reading program for kids at a local park or library.

Assemble bags of socks, snacks, and other essentials to give to people in need.

Quilt or knit blankets for local hospitals, NICUs, or hospice centers.

Foster a cat or dog. Help train a service dog.

Read books with a buddy on StoriTime.

Start a Pay It Forward or Buy Nothing group for your neighborhood on Facebook.

Volunteer as a crisis counselor for a crisis hotline.

Help people who are blind or have low vision via video chat using Be My Eyes.

Become a translator for important causes through Translators Without Borders.

Start a positive-news-only Instagram account for people in your community.

Conduct mock interviews on video chat.

Convert public domain books into ebooks with Distributed Proofreaders.

Use your professional skills to help a non-profit through Catch a Fire.

Become an online volunteer listener through 7Cups.

Tutor students on video chat.

Help others navigate challenges at work by becoming a peer counselor with Empower Work.

Archive historical documents for the Smithsonian Institute.

Host a donations drive on Facebook for your birthday.

Play games with seniors on video chat.

Share petitions you're passionate about to bring attention to important causes.

Make <u>"superhero capes"</u> for your local children's hospital with basic materials (glue, string, fabric, felt, scissors).

Knit baby blankets or booties to be presented to newborns at your local hospital

- Ask members to bring in new, gently-used, stuffed animals to your club meeting so they may be donated to free health clinics in your community.
- Switch up your club meeting spot, and ask members to meet at a local Goodwill or similar store to shop for books to be donated to local school libraries.

Ask your club members to collect coloring books for kids at the local **Boys & Girls Club**.

- Ask members to bring inexpensive toys and games to wrap during a club meeting and then deliver to a women's domestic abuse shelter or other local charities for kids.
- Shop online at <u>Dollar Days</u> (a Kiwanis International partner) to buy basic supplies for schools supported by the club.
- Ask your club members to secure coloring books and crayons for kids in hospitals.
- Ask members to bring canned food to your club meetings around Thanksgiving time, so it can be donated to homeless shelters.
- Organize your club members to make up survival kits for civil servants to be utilize as they interact with kids.
- Ask members to bring in discarded cell phones to your club meetings that can be donated to domestic violence shelters.
- Organize your club members to make bookmarks and door hangers.
- Start a "diaper dump" service project, asking members to collect disposable diapers in various sizes that will then be delivered to local shelters, free health clinics and youth-serving organizations to give to mothers who cannot afford expensive disposable diapers for their children.

Do your club members have old sneakers that have a few miles left in them? Collect and send them to Soles4Souls, a charity that will find someone who needs them.

- Paint park benches
- Donate used books to your local library
- Become a tour guide at your local museum
- Plant flowers in bare public areas
- Organize a campaign to raise money to buy and install new playground equipment for a park
- Participate in or help organize a community parade
- Produce a neighborhood newspaper

- Petition your town leaders to build more drinking fountains and public restrooms

Next Steps

Now that you know what your options are for community service, you can take the following steps to start getting involved:

#1: Look over your interests: Which activities seem most appealing to you? Were they mostly in one particular category, like children or the environment? If so, that's a good starting place for choosing specific organizations to contact.

#2: Figure out how much time you can devote to community service: Are you available for two hours every week? Are you not free on a regular basis but can volunteer for an entire weekend now and then?

Think about transportation as well and how you'll be able to get to different locations. Knowing this information will help you choose which community service projects to pursue, and it's helpful information for volunteer coordinators to know.

#3: Do some research to see what projects you can do in your community: Check at your school, place of worship, or town hall for more information on volunteering. You can also contact the place where you'd like to perform your community service, such as a particular animal shelter or nursing home, and ask if they take volunteers.

#4: Start volunteering! This list ranges from small projects that you can complete on your own in a few hours, to much larger projects that will take more time and people. If you find a project you can start on your own, do it!

If you want to do a project where you'll need more resources or people, check around your community to see if a similar program already exists that you can join. If not, don't be afraid to start your own! Many organizations welcome new volunteers and community service projects.
