CELEBRATING 75 YEARS OF SERVICE

The Bluffton Lions Club is inviting the public to share in an evening of celebration on November 15th. The Bluffton Lions Club is celebrating 75 years of service to Bluffton and the surrounding area. Most known is the eye care offered starting with screening nursery and preschools that are offered without charge to the collection of used eye glasses throughout the community.

This idea of using these collected used eye glasses for third world countries was the innovation of Bluffton's own, the late Lion Past District Governor William (Bill) Trubey. As reported in the News-Banner article from May 25, 2000, "Dr. Trubey participated in the Volunteer Optometric Service for Humanity, a medical missionary service in at least 23 medical missions delivering "medical care to at least seven countries including Dominican Republic, Honduras, Mexico, Guatemala, El Salvador, Nicaragua, and Tanzania."

Lion PDG Dr. William (Bill) Trubey was the first Bluffton Lions Club member to go through all of the local offices and then the state positions to become the first District Governor from the Bluffton Lions Club. Since then two additional Bluffton Lions Club members have also obtained that status. The last two District 25B District Governors are members of the Bluffton Lions Club, Lion PCC Jerry Zeigler and currently Lion DG Sandy Zeigler.

Once again, the public is invited to join us as the Bluffton Lions Club celebrates 75 years of service, of putting into practice the Lions motto of "to serve." This exciting evening of celebration will take place at the Lighted Gardens Reception Hall on November 15th with the social time starting at 6:00, and the sit down meal following at 6:30. MAYFIELD IS STILL RECOVERING

On October 22, husband, Lion PCC Jerry Zeigler, and I took our pick-up truck and trailer full of medical equipment down to Paducah, Kentucky. This was Lion PCC Jerry's fourth trip down, and my third trip.

Lion Elder Pastor Ron Lytle, president of the McMillen Park Lions Club, found out that the American Legion in Waynedale, Indiana, had all kinds of medical equipment, that they wanted to donate to Mayfield, Kentucky.

As you probably recall, Mayfield had been hit last December by a really nasty tornado. That tornado had been down for over 100 miles in a trail of destruction. The tornado had taken 77 lives. The hardest hit area was the small town of Mayfield, Kentucky.



Last January at the Indiana Lions Mid-Winter Conference, Lions from all over Indiana had rallied together to donate socks, shoes, coats, and all kinds of clothes in an statewide effort called "Sock It to Them." Their next problem was that they needed

volunteers with pick-up trucks or vans that could transport

these volunteered items to Mayfield.

At this same time, I had my own problem going on. I had opted not to go to the Lions Mid-Winter Conference, because I was working with our insurance company trying to get them to approve more MRIs that our doctor needed to determine why I was having new, additional shoulder pain. I was also talking with them to extend their coverage to include new stronger pain patches. Without the insurance's coverage, the cost would be over \$300 for ten patches.

My pain management doctor had prescribed these stronger pain patches that he thought would more effectively deal with my intense pain. At that time, without additional MRIs, it was anyone's guess as to what was causing my new pain.

I insisted that my husband, Lion PCC Jerry, go to the Mid-Winter Conference in Indianapolis. After attending the conference, a few of the Lions were going to take the conference's collected socks, gloves, hats, and coats down to Mayfield, Kentucky. Since Lion PCC Jerry was already in Indy, it made sense for him to go down to Kentucky. This was Lion PCC Jerry's first trip down, and the only one that Lion PCC Jerry took without me.


On October 22, the three guys vowed that they would get it all unloaded as they joined forces of 3 working together with 1 common goal.



Lion PID Judge Shea's foot was needing a rest. He was still wearing a surgical support boot on his foot from a recent foot surgery.




MAYFIELD IS STILL RECOVERING

The guys looked at the last wheelchair that still remained and needed to be removed from our pick-up truck. Being an electric wheelchair, it was extra heavy.








Lion PID Judge Shea and


