More From Your 1st Vice

As many of you may know I like to work with my hands. Whether that be building things in the wood shop or working in my garden or flower beds. Now, why do I bring this up? Well building clubs and Lions has much in common with producing a quality product or a large crop.

First there must be a purpose and a plan. The plan may be just a sketch on a scrap of paper or a complete set of drawings. As to purpose, each item produced must have a purpose, whether that is something nice to decorate with or more utilitarian as in the case of a dining table.

So as we look at growing Lions and Lion clubs each must have a purpose and a plan. Many clubs fail to look at and plan how to bring in new members. One approach is to have each club member submit two or three names of those who they think would be good members. The membership chair then consolidates the list. After that a brief class on how to approach the prospects is given and the club president assigns prospects to members to invite. A time limit is set to insure that each prospect is contacted and the results of the contacts are then reported back to the club.

But there is more than this to growing Lions and clubs. The club must have a purpose or reason to exist other than just meet and eat. Also, that purpose must be more than just giving money to some projects. I have seen many clubs slowly die because they were not doing any hands on projects. Members new and seasoned need to know that what they are involved in has a real reason to exist and helps them to give back to their community.

Having said all of this there is one more element to growth I would like to discuss. That element is training and fellowship. Now Lions Clubs International offers lots of training on line and through various seminars and forums. The State offers training at each council meeting and the District offers training at its cabinet meetings, Zone meetings and special training opportunities. Besides gaining knowledge one attending these training sessions gets to meet and know more about others involved in Lions and the projects they support.

So, let me close with a couple of questions. Does your club have an action plan as to what they hope to accomplish? If they do, how far out do those plans go? Does each of your members have a responsibility? Has your club reviewed the community needs and seen how you can meet them recently?

CLUB EXCELLENCE

The “Club Excellence Award” provides clubs with guidance and goals that expand their service and strengthen the effectiveness of club leadership. It provides a road map to a stronger club better able to more effectively serve its community.

There are 7 steps to earning the “Club Excellence Award”; 7 steps to a stronger more effective club. Some of those steps are much easier than others; all take a little planning and effort. Many of them your club is probably doing now.

The first of those “steps” is SERVICE. That only makes sense; we are a service club association; “We Serve”. This step requires that a club complete three service projects. If your club does not currently have 3 service projects, a goal for 2016-17 would be to add the necessary number of projects. Why not make sure your projects are relevant and needed by the community.

Humanitarian service, whether in your local community or globally, is what Lions are all about. Your club may have existing projects that have become a tradition, or perhaps you are ready to try something new, either way, when your club has completed three service projects, your club has fulfilled the service requirement for the “Club Excellence Award”.

MEMBERSHIP MINUTE

SEGMENT 9

Today's Membership Minute looks at the service side of Lions Club International.

Lions Clubs International provides financial grants, to be used for high impact projects and services, to Lions Clubs around the world. When it became apparent in the 60's that to give this support fairly and efficiently, a separate foundation was needed. Lions Clubs International Foundation was chartered in 1968.

LCIF is funded by Melvin Jones Awards proceeds, plus contributing member donations. LCIF grants are limited to well-planned, well-controlled projects and services with regional or national impact.

For instance, the SightFirst program responds to worldwide needs for prevention and reversal of blindness. In 1990, SightFirst was launched with \$146 million donated to be specially earmarked for this blindness prevention initiative. Often serving the poorest of the poor, SightFirst has had significant success in both prevention and reversal of blindness—especially in Pakistan, India, Africa, and China.

By 2002, LCIF leadership realized there was much work left to do and the funds raised wouldn't last forever. In 2005, Campaign SightFirst II was launched with a goal of \$150 million and a challenge goal of \$200 million. Campaign SightFirst II had new objectives in addition to the initial SightFirst I goals, which had included eliminating river blindness in Latin America and controlling its spread in Africa. The second campaign aimed its funds and programs at addressing emerging threats to vision such as diabetes, glaucoma and childhood blindness that affect all countries, not just those in developing nations with poor access to resources. Campaign funds would also be used for training, vision screening, eyeglasses, vision clinics and research, as well as for programs to help the blind and visually impaired whose eyesight cannot be restored. In 2008 the Campaign came to a close surpassing the challenge goal and raising \$205 million. SightFirst now partners with other organizations, such as the

. Carter Center and LensCrafters to provide more and better results.

There are as many different humanitarian services performed by Lions clubs worldwide as there are clubs. However, two youth programs are commonly supported by many clubs around the globe: the Leo Club program and Lions Youth Outreach.

The Leo Club, providing youth with an opportunity to serve others in the community and around the world, is an activity sponsored by a Lions Club. A Leo Club can be community-based or school affiliated. As Leos respond to the needs of others, they are developing leadership, organization, and social skills as well as positive self-image – fulfilling the Leo motto—Leadership, Experience, and Opportunity. LEO

The mission of Lions Youth Outreach, “Changing Tomorrow Today”, is to help and challenge youth to learn, to achieve, and to serve. In thousands of schools the Lions Question Education Program, sponsored and also published by LCI, focuses on these goals. For grades K-5 “The Lions Quest for Growing”, for grades 6-8 “Skills for Adolescence”; and for High School “Skills for Action” each teach youth how to make healthy decisions; to say “no” to drug abuse and other negative behavior; as well as to develop responsible citizenship skills. All three Lions Quest programs also include community service and conflict resolution/violence prevention components. “Changing Tomorrow Today” happens every day in thousands of schools worldwide because Lions reach out to youth.

Globally, many youth participate in Lions Youth Camps and Youth Exchange. Over 350,000 adolescents enter the International Peace Poster Contest each year.

As Youth and Sight are longstanding high priorities for Lions, the worldwide development and successes of these LCI service programs are important and satisfying to all Lions and their clubs.

UNION TOWNSHIP LIONS CLUB

The Union Township Lions and the Decatur Fire Department would like to thank you for coming to today's press conference. We are proud to show you the newest dry hydrant installed in the rural Decatur. A dry hydrant is a 6 inch PVC pipe that is installed into a pond with a strainer section located approximately 3 feet below the water surface. The other end is located aboveground with a firehose fitting where the fire department can attach a hose to draw water from the pond to fill a tanker truck or if close enough to the fire; pump directly to another fire engine to fight the fire. The above ground pipe is also insulated so water can be drawn from the pond even in the middle of winter.

This dry hydrant was installed by members of the Union Township Lions Club. The Lions Club is pleased to take this opportunity to "show off" our latest service project for the local community. The dry hydrant was paid from past fundraising efforts, namely citrus fruit sales between Thanksgiving and Christmas and the sale of concrete picnic tables (we have 3 still available). The Lions Club would also like to thank the local community for the support of our past fundraisers that made this service project possible.

20 years ago the Union Township Lions Club installed 8 other dry hydrants located east of Decatur to the Ohio state line and north of US 224 to the Allen county line. These dry hydrants were located so that if a fire was in this area of rural Adams county the fire department would be no more than 2 miles from a dry hydrant location to save time shuttling water to a fire scene. This newest location is near a very residential area north of Decatur near Monmouth, Chapel Chase, and Roe Acres. The goal of the Union Township Lions Club is to give the Fire Department tools and resources to help them serve the community, and with these 9 dry hydrants we feel we have done that.

Another reason for this press conference is challenge other Lions clubs in the area to install dry hydrants in their local community to help their local fire departments.

When the fire department hooks up to one of these dry hydrants they draw water with a 4 ½ inch suction hose. They can then pump between 700-800 gallons per minute to refill a tanker truck for fighting fires.

Again thank you for your time in sharing this information which demonstrates the Lions club motto of "WE SERVE".
