FROM THE DISTRICT ADMINISTRATOR

If your club officers are having trouble signing in or inputting activity information, please give me a call and we will work together to solve the problem.

One of the issues that keeps cropping up beside the entering in of activities on LCI is what should be contained in the club minutes and what action should be taken on them. First the minutes should be either read or publish to everyone present. Once this is done the chair should entertain a motion to have the minutes filed for record. Please note, we do not approve or disapprove the minutes. Once the motion is made and seconded then discussion of any changes can proceed. After the discussion is completed then the motion is called.

Now, on to what should go into the minutes. The call to order along with the time, date and place. There should also be attached a copy of the agenda and a list of attendees. As reports are given, the name of the person giving the report, a brief summary and any future actions that might be required. Remember, the only motion on a report is needed if a request for funds or action is made.

So, how do we record a motion? When a motion is made the name of the person making the motion along with the exact wording of the motion should be recorded. Hen the name of the person seconding the motion comes next. If there is any discussion, each speaker with a summary of their remarks is recorded. Once the motion is called for a vote, the yeas and nays are reported. If there are no nays then simply note that the motion carried.



New Haven Lions Club



New Haven Lions Club set up at Harvester Homecoming on Aug.5th and 6th and sold hot dogs, hamburgers, cheeseburgers and chips!! We were able to raise a little over a \$1000.00 which will benefit the New Haven community and surrounding area.

HERITAGE LIONS CLUB

The Heritage Lions in Hoagland, Indiana are working with Changing Footprints (https://www.changingfootprints.org/) to collect used shoes of all types, sizes and conditions. Flip flops, sandals, fancy or grungy, high heels, baby and childrens shoes -- ANY shoes are acceptable, even a single shoe which has lost its sole mate. 80% of the collected shoes are distributed within 100 miles of Allen County. The shoes are brought to a warehouse in New Haven, where they are counted, sorted and readied for distribution.

Shoes are also distributed to disaster areas throughout the United States, and overseas to developing nations. When people lose everything to floods, fire, or hurricanes, shoes are high on their list of immediate needs. The people affected by the recent floods in Kentucky received a large number of shoes from Changing Footprints. Gathering and distributing used shoes prevents them from ending up in landfills. Any athletic shoes that can no longer be worn are FedExed to Nike to be ground up and made into playground surfaces, running tracks, etc. (https://www.nikegrind.com/)

We are asking your Lions Club to hold one or more shoe drives in your area. The drive could be a one-time Lions Club event or an on-going effort to collect shoes. We also encourage you to promote this project within your communities. Local high schools are often looking for service projects. Churches, YMCA and other athletic facilities, running race coordinators (all those 5K, 10K etc. races), and shoe stores are a few places to collect used shoes. Some places may allow a year-round bin placement for donated shoes. Local businesses may also wish to hold a short-term shoe drive among their employees.

This is a basic project that only requires interesting and wide-spread publicity prior to the event, a location for folks to bring their shoes, and a container to put the donated shoes in. After the drive, shoes can be bagged in plastic bags, and the Heritage Lions will pick them up from you and bring them to the New Haven warehouse for sorting and distribution.

To date the Heritage Lions in Hoagland have helped collect over 200 pairs of shoes of all kinds. We have placed semi-permanent bins into 6 Allen County Public Libraries, 3 YMCA, and the Hoagland Post Office. The Monroeville Lions have also maintained a shoe collection bin in the Monroeville Library for several years now. Over 200 solicitation letters have been sent to churches, schools, auctioneers and estate sellers. We have sent about the same number of emails, but they proved to be not very effective. We request that these places also hold an eyeglass drive. The Heritage Lions plan on having a Shoe Drive/Eyeglass Drive this fall.

Thank you and I hope you will support our efforts to help people who need these shoes.
