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Lions and Today's World

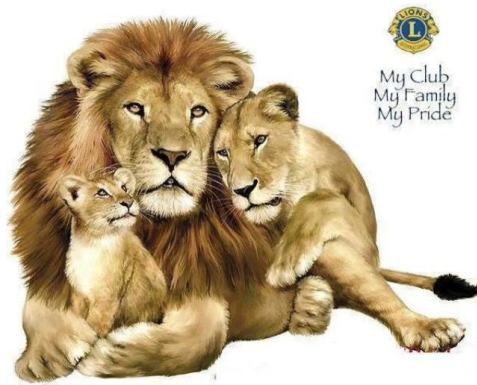

LIONS OF INDIANA OCULAR SURGERY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

The Lions of Indiana have an ocular surgery assistance program administered by the Indiana Lions Eye Bank, Inc. (ILEBI) that provides vision-saving surgery to those in the community that require help in paying for it.

Community residents who are without insurance and are ineligible for government aid can apply for help through the assistance program.

This program is intended to cover ocular surgery and treatment for individuals who are no longer legal to drive (20/50 in each eye) without such surgery or treatment. Services and treatments

include, but are not limited to:

- Cornea transplants
- Cataract surgery
- Laser treatment related to [diabetic](#) retinopathy
- Glaucoma Surgery
- Physician visits
- Diagnostic testing

Some of the requirements:

- A recent eye exam by an optometrist or ophthalmologist is required to show the need for the surgery
- If qualified, complete an application (available from the contact given below)
- A copy of the applicant's most recent tax return will be requested

Once the application is completed it will be forwarded to the chairman of the Ocular Surgical Assistance Program and will then be forwarded to the Ocular Assistance Committee for review.

Some services not covered will be discussed with the applicant at the appropriate time. If the application is approved, the applicant will be contacted and referred to a surgeon that works with the program.

Note that some expenses may not be covered. Again, these will be discussed with the applicant at the appropriate time.

District 25C Receives LCIF Covid-19 Emergency Grant of \$10,000!

Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) has awarded a \$10,000 grant to the Lions of West Central Indiana to help support frontline health care and emergency personnel during the pandemic.

The Lafayette Lions Club's "Feeding the Frontline" project will receive the funds, allowing them to continue to provide quality, hot meals from area restaurants and catering services. These meals are purchased in bulk at discounted rates. They are then distributed by Lafayette Lions and the provider of the day to the group requesting them.

"As a nurse, I've worked a lot of shifts where there just isn't time to leave patients to go find a meal", said Project Leader Lion Diane Haby. "This project is providing a real boost to the staff when they need it the most."

Lafayette Lions have provided over 1,700 meals over the last 60 days to a dozen different hospitals, nursing care homes, ambulance services, police patrols and fire departments. The club has raised over \$13,000 locally to purchase and provide meals.

"Thanks to LCIF, we will be able to continue this program for at least a month. It's great to have the Foundation's backup, and it comes at a perfect time. Helping our front line people while we also help our local restaurants and caterers is a win for everyone."

Indiana Lions Celebrate 100 Years in 2020-2021

Feeding the World through Service

The Early Years: 1916-1930

Part One

From the early beginnings of Lions Clubs, Indiana has always been at the heart of Lions Clubs International. From our Hoosier leader Dr. W.P. Woods in 1916, and later to the famous Chicago LaSalle Congress of 1917 and Melvin Jones, Indiana Lions formed a critical part of our early history. We not only provided the Lions name and structure, but much of its early growth.

The clubs founded before the 1917 Congress by Dr. Woods are now known as Founder's Clubs. The only remaining Founders Club in Indiana is the Austin Lions Club, founded in 1916. After the 1917 Chicago Congress, the travel restrictions of WWI and the Spanish Flu pandemic began to be relaxed in early 1919. Lions Clubs were in a position to grow rapidly. Melvin Jones' vision of a consolidated, unified service movement under the Lions emblem spoke to a world weary of war and discord.

Communication between an organizing committee of Lafayette businessmen and the newly organized Association of Lions Clubs in 1919 led to the organization of the Lafayette Lions Club on March 23th, 1920. It chartered with forty-one members and is recognized as the first Lions Club in Indiana.

In 1920, the Lafayette Club became the first Indiana club in what was then known as the Ninth District, made up of seven states: Nebraska, Iowa, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Michigan, and Eastern Wisconsin. The first District Convention of the Old Ninth that year was held at Quincy, Illinois. It was not much more than a conference, as most states only had only one or two clubs, except for Illinois which had nine. The 1921 convention in Peoria Illinois saw new Indiana clubs in Indianapolis, Kokomo, Marion, Gary, and South Bend. These were started by professional road salesmen employed by Lions, with help, endorsements, and good offices from Lafayette.

Indiana Lions leaders felt they had enough members and activity to branch off from the Old Ninth and be our own Lions district in 1923. At that point, Indiana Lions had five clubs with a total of 202 members. As a result, the twenty-fifth District of Lions was approved at the District convention held at Decatur Illinois on May 22, 1922. Lafayette's Frank "Ted" Tedford was chosen as the first District Governor of District 25 by the Indiana delegates, with L.H. Vaughn of Terre Haute as Secretary. A year later in 1923, Indiana had twelve clubs and 631 members. 1928 saw thirty-eight clubs with 1543 Lions. At the tenth anniversary of Lions in Indiana in 1930, one club of 41 Lions had become ninety-one clubs with 2,869 active Lions.

Early Lions pioneers such as Tedford and Phillips of Lafayette, Arthur C Call of Anderson, Rev. Elmer Ward Cole of South Bend, Jap Jones of Martinsville, and Frank Wickes and Leslie Bain of Gary worked tirelessly to expand membership and sponsor new clubs. Arthur C Call served three years on the Board of Directors, while W. P Woods served as the first President of the new Chicago-based International Association of Lions Clubs. On the eve of the Great Depression, Indiana's leadership in Lions International was firmly established.
