Preparation is underway to begin rolling out the new Lion Portal. Here is some important information to prepare you for launch.

Phased rollout for Lion Account Users

Our target launch window is April 15 – May 13*. During this time, all current Lion Account users will receive an email inviting them to access the new Lion Portal**. We're doing this phased rollout to ensure staff are available to provide the best support possible and offer you a positive introductory experience.

- Now April 11: MyLion, MyLCI and Insights will continue to function as normal.
- April 12 and beyond: MyLion, MyLCI and Insights are no longer available.
- April 15 May 13: Invitations to access the new Lion Portal sent via email on a rolling basis to existing Lion Account users.
 - Please note: User permissions will not change. In other words, those who can report service, access member data and other key functions remains the same.
- May 13 and beyond: All visitors attempting to access the previous digital tools will be automatically redirected to the new Lion Portal.

*Dates are subject to change. Our number one goal is to create a positive experience for Lions and Leos. If determined more time is required to ensure the product is in an optimal state, the dates may be adjusted accordingly.

**If you don't see the email in your everyday inbox, please check all spam and junk folders for it first before contacting Member Support.

Note that the new Lion Portal will require a unique, unshared email, and phone numbers will no longer be supported as a log in credential.





Plainfield Lions Club Member Passionate About the American Flag

"As a former helicopter engine H21 mechanic with the 57th Aviation Battalion in Qui Nhon South Vietnam in 1963, I admire and cherish the sacrifice, bravery and heroism that our men and women in the armed forces display each and every day whether at home or in hostile environments. The American flag represents the selfless sacrifice of these true heroes, whether it is hosted up in a field of battle or unfurled above a baseball field" says Plainfield Lions Club member Gary Lawson.

Come Memorial Day, American flags will be displayed across the nation commemorating the men and women who died while serving in the United States Armed Forces, particularly those who made the ultimate sacrifice for their country and died in battle or as a result of wounds sustained in battle. Flag etiquette on Memorial Day is unique. At sunrise, flags are to be raised to full staff briskly, then lowered to a half-staff position, where they will remain until noon. Traditionally, volunteers often place small American flags on each grave site at national cemeteries.

Have you ever wondered how to display the American flag? Although the code is U.S. federal law, following the Flag Code is voluntary and meant as a guideline. "The flag is a symbol of respect, honor, and patriotism" says Plainfield Lions Club member Lion Gary Lawson. "It has been the emblem of our identity as a sovereign nation for more than 200 years."

Here is a partial list of rules and guidelines on American flag etiquette and the U.S. Flag Code to help you display Old Glory properly:


- The flag should not be displayed on days when the weather is inclement.
- The custom is to display the flag only form sunrise to sunset on flag poles out in the open. It may be displayed at night if illuminated.
- When displaying the U.S. flag with other flags, the U.S. flag comes first and is centered in the middle of a flag
 display. In addition, the U.S. flag must be placed higher than the other flags, unless other national flags are
 present. In that case the U.S. flag would be the same height. When flags of states, cities, etc., are flown on the
 same halyard, the American flag should be at its peak.
- When displayed either horizontally or vertically against a wall, the union should be uppermost and to the flag's
 own right, that is, to the observer's left. When displayed in a window, the flag should be displayed in the same
 way, with the union or blue field to the left of the observer in the street.
- · The flag should never be displayed upside down unless trying to convey a sign of distress or great danger.
- The flag should never touch anything beneath it; this includes water, merchandise and even the floor.
- The flag should never be used as wearing apparel, bedding or drapery, embroidered on cushions, handkerchiefs, napkins, boxes or for advertising purposes.
- Staffs and finials should always be upright and not leaning. The U.S. flag should flow freely in the wind with a
 passing breeze as people walk past.
- Clean and damage-free flags should always be used. When the flag is torn or in a condition that it is no longer
 a fitting emblem, it should be destroyed in a dignified and ceremonious fashion, preferably by burning. Most
 American Legion posts and the Boy Scouts will conduct an annual ceremony, often on Flag Day (June 14) to
 retire old or worn flags.

With Memorial Day, Flag Day, and Independence Day just around the corner, Lion Gary Lawson asks all to assess the condition of their flag. The flag and its likeness should not be cheapened or tarnished by improper use or tom or in a condition that is no longer a fitting emblem. If you need help retiring or replacing your American flag, please contact Lion Gary Lawson at plainfield.in.lions@gmail.com. "Those stars and stripes have covered many caskets of men and women who felt compelled to ensure our rights and freedoms. When we love and respect that flag, we are respecting those who died for our liberty. May it ever wave in our yards, schools, government buildings and hearts", says Lion Gary.



Major Changes to ISBVI Campus Beginning This Summer

You may already know that the State of Indiana intends to move the Indiana School for the Deaf to the current campus of the Indiana School for the Blind and Visually Impaired. Most of the existing buildings on the ISBVI campus will be torn down and new buildings will be erected for each school. This is a multi-year project which will begin in earnest this summer.

What will happen to the current ISBVI campus buildings?

After graduation, the contents of existing buildings will be removed to Indianapolis Public Schools #83 and #94. These schools are 20 minutes east of the ISBVI campus. Bulldozing will begin in late summer. The tower and wings will remain and be renovated. The auditorium has already been renovated. The pool and its building will be renovated.

There will be no auction of contents left behind.

Indiana Lions Foundation at the Indiana State Fair

The dates for the Indiana State Fair this year are August 2, 2024 through August 18, 2024.

There are a couple changes for this year.

- Last year the Fair was closed on Monday and Tuesday each week; this
 year it will be closed only on Monday.
- Automobile entrance to infield parking will be handled differently this
 year. In prior years, cashiers collected money for auto parking fees
 and entrance fees on the access roads. This year, only auto parking
 fees will be charged at the access roads. Four new gates are being


