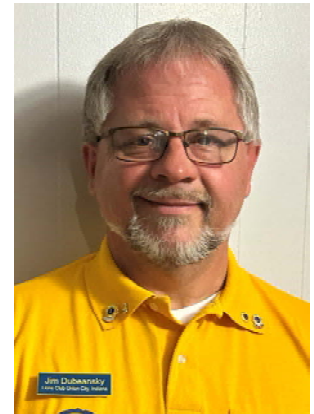

Coming Soon: Indiana Lions Mid-Winter Conference

The 35th annual Indiana Lions Mid-Winter Conference will be held on Saturday, January 20, 2024 at the Crowne Plaza Indianapolis Airport Hotel.

Some Indiana Lions say the Mid-Winter Conference is "the best place for learning" about leadership, service, and all aspects of Lionism. We offer seminars on club administration, community service, fundraising, and membership recruitment and retention, as well as opportunities for service, fellowship with Lions from around the state, and plain old everyday Lions fun.

The Early Bird registration fee – until November 30th - is only \$40 - \$5 less than last year - and includes informative seminars, on-site service projects, coffee and pastries in the morning, lunch at noon with a motivational speaker, and fellowship with other Lions.

The keynote speaker at the Saturday luncheon had not yet been announced when this article was written.

The conference will be preceded by a dinner on Friday evening. There is a separate fee of \$30 for this event. The after-dinner entertainment will be provided by magician Daniel Lusk. He has performed across the United States, overseas, for celebrities, national sports teams, and on national T.V. His magic has not only been seen by millions but Daniel also lectures at conventions for other magicians teaching his trade.

Conference attendees will be offered the opportunity to participate in two on-site service projects. After dinner on Friday evening, attendees will have the opportunity to participate in the Care-ing Cases project, using clean recycled hard eyeglass cases to assemble first aid kits and toiletry kits. Conference attendees are also encouraged to donate new socks, gloves, mittens, scarves, knit hats, and blankets to the Sock It To Me project. Collection boxes for these items will be available on Friday and Saturday. Our District Governors will share all items created/collected by these projects with those in need in their districts.

Information and Technology Article for District 25D

What is Artificial Intelligence?

No, it's not how you should describe your know-it-all brother-in-law after spending four hours with him on Thanksgiving (then again, maybe it is). Then what exactly is Artificial Intelligence (aka A.I. or AI) as used in the technology world?

Britannica.com defines A.I. as "the ability of a digital computer or computer-controlled robot to perform tasks commonly associated with intelligent beings." – meaning humans.

AI is evolving daily, so the scope and application of AI is going to change, grow, and increase in our daily lives. AI will be used to design cars, write code, create art, write text, and make decisions for us. So as not to get too deep here, let's jump to a fun part of AI.

The AI that creates and learns based upon your input is called Generative AI (aka GenAI). I recently played with a GenAI site (<https://stablediffusionweb.com>) that will create "photographs" for you. I asked it to create all kinds of pictures based on my crazy input like, "babies wearing diapers sword fighting," and "angry old women racing bicycles," and "black ducks carrying an umbrella wearing golashes on a sunny day." It produced some pretty interesting results.

The most interesting was when I asked for "Lions eating dinner showing proper etiquette." Below is what it produced and what it produced shows a major flaw with GenAI. See if you can spot it before reading on.



GenAI creates based on what it knows and later on what it has learned. In this case, it took pictures it knew and tried to merge them.

Here's the flaw: One lion has human arms. Pretty freaky.

Until you know for sure, don't trust AI output without verifying accuracy. Ensure you're using reputable sources. And be aware of its limitations. This arena is still being developed.

But on the other hand, there have always been distractions of some sort. I was very fortunate to have parents (who were married 53 years) and took time to understand my talent that needed nurturing from the beginning of time. I am very fortunate to have a wife (we've been married for over 67 years) who for the most part, lets me and helps me fulfill my destiny of being a musician, teacher, performer and works beside me helping to build our music business for the past 57 years along with two of our sons.

Indiana Lions Foundation Seeking Nominations for the Distinguished Hoosier Lion Award

The Indiana Lions Foundation annually selects one deserving Hoosier Lion to receive the Indiana Distinguished Lion Award. The award is presented at the Saturday luncheon of the Indiana Lions Convention. The winner is selected from among nominees submitted by individual clubs, the district cabinet with the approval of the sitting District Governor, or the Council of Governors with the approval of the Council Chair. Nominees must be a member of a club in Multiple District 25 that is in good standing and must have a minimum of twenty-five years of service as a Lion. Each nominee for this award will receive a recognition plaque that will be presented in person at the Saturday state convention luncheon. Clubs are encouraged to use this mechanism to recognize long-service Lions who have served their clubs and their communities in exemplary ways. It is not required that nominees have had any involvement in holding district or state offices; rather each club will determine the criteria with which they wish to recognize a member from their club. Nominations are limited to one Lion per club and to five nominees in each district. Applications may be submitted by accessing the following weblink. The entry deadline is January 31, 2024.

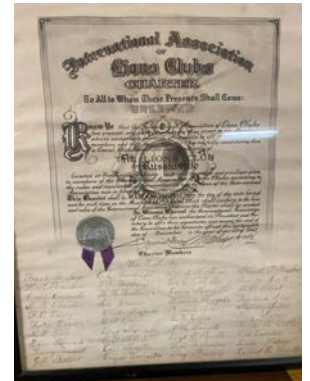

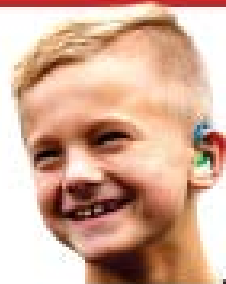

More Than 80% of Children Diagnosed with Cancer are cured, but that number does not begin to make clear the damage cancer wreaks on kids and their families. Approximately 1,800 kids still die each year from this disease in the U.S. alone. For those who do survive, toxic treatments take an irreversible toll on their health. These therapies leave Children with lifelong chronic conditions that range from fragile bones to strained hearts to infertility.

Skylar survived 2 battles with Leukemia that robbed her of her elementary school experience. She is now Cancer free, but her bones were so ravaged by treatment that she has trouble walking and is in excruciating pain and will eventually require an artificial hip.

Layla was diagnosed with a brain tumor at the age of 4, kidney cancer at 10, and thyroid cancer at 15. Despite all she endured, she remained a bright light for all around her. She passed away in 2022 at the age of 19 when her brain cancer recurred.



There are at least 483,000 childhood cancer survivors in the U.S. Many suffer from lifelong conditions, including heart damage, stroke, and increased risk to develop other cancers.

Cancer Control Project Accepts Matching Grant Challenge



On August 4, 2023, the Walther Cancer Foundation and Riley Children's Foundation announced that the Walther Cancer Foundation has pledged \$10 million to match donations of \$100,000 or more from other organizations and individuals.

At their meeting on September 10, 2023, the trustees of the Lions Cancer Control Fund of Indiana, Inc. (CCF) voted to accept this challenge and raise at least **\$100,000** for Riley Children's Foundation. With the matching grant from the Walther Cancer Foundation, this will result in a donation of at least **\$200,000** for pediatric cancer research and treatment at Riley Hospital for Children.

The trustees also voted to set aside \$20,000 from CCF's current cash balance as "seed money" for this effort. We need your help to raise an additional **\$80,000** in time to present a \$100,000 check to Riley Children's Foundation at the Indiana Lions State Convention in April 2024.
