Coke understands the importance of Brand Recognition. Does your club understand how important brand recognition is in your community?

If members of your community see your club out doing service projects or a fund raising, do they know that it is your club doing the work? How would they know? Do you have a club uniform or easily recognizable attire that makes you stick out from the crowd? Having your community aware that their local Lions Club is active and doing all the great things that Lions do is a sure way to get people interested in being a Lion. You must show who is doing that project - do not assume that they know.

How do you show that Lions have done a service project once it is completed? Yard signs are an effective and budget friendly way to go. Yard signs are also a good way to display an ongoing project or one to happen in the near future. For a more permanent fixture, a display plaque may be the way to go. Do you ever do joint projects with other service clubs or volunteer organizations? Be sure that your club gets credit by having your club name and logo listed in the credits for that project.

How do you show your Lion Pride? Do you wear Lions apparel to your meetings? Do you have a sign in your yard proclaiming you're proudly serving your community? One of the easiest ways to show your support of Lions only takes one action and thousands will see it. Get a Lions license plate for your vehicle. You only have to do it once, and it renews just by paying for your plates every year. You have to do that anyway. The simple act of wearing a Lions hat, a Lions pin, or a Lions shirt could be the catalyst that starts the conversation that brings the next member into the Lions family. Never pass up an opportunity to share your great experiences in the Lions Club with someone new.

Greetings to all! As we enter the holiday season, I wanted to take a moment to say thank you. Thank you for being you. Thank you for being willing to step outside of yourself and help others. The world is better because of the effort you put into serving your community.

You are doing an amazing job!

Since last month, I have had several conversations with Lions who spoke about the hard time they had getting started as a Lion because there is so much to know, and they did not know where to start. So, before we get to talking about how to use the list of names you have been developing for several months (I promise, we will talk about that next month), here are a few ideas for getting new Lions off to a good start.

- 1. Create a "quick start" packet for each new member. This can include your club roster, your club annual calendar with meetings and events, who to contact with questions, and how to get into the Lions Portal with the Lions Membership Number.
- 2. Have an orientation event. You can do this during one of your regular meetings or as a separate event, but a suggestion is to do this with as much of the club as possible because there are many long-time members that probably do not know all the ins and outs. As part of this, demonstrate how to get into the Lions Portal.
- 3. Introduce them to the Lions Learning Center. I keep mentioning the Portal because, while it has some shortcomings, the Learning Center has awesome videos and training that each member can do at their own pace. When you log into the Portal, the word "Learning", the middle option on the toolbar. There is then a big yellow button that says "GO" under the Lions Learning Center title. On the new page, you can select "Content Library" to see listings and search for many topics.
- 4. Encourage all Lions to attend the Mid-Winter Conference. It is on January 18, 2025, at the Crowne Plaza Airport Hotel. This is not just for "leaders" but any Lion that wants to learn more about being a Lion as there are 14 seminars and 8 "Speed Learning" topics from which to choose. Westfield Lions Raise Over \$25K at "Poker for Sight" Tournament:

Joshua Koblnick Takes Home \$10,000 1st Place Prize

On Friday and Saturday, November 15th and 16th over 260 poker players competed in the Westfield Lions Club's semi-annual "Poker for Sight" tournament. Over \$25,000 in prize money was paid out, with Joshua Kublnick coming in first place and claiming the \$10,000 prize. The first thing Joshua said when he received his check was that it would be going toward the downpayment of a house he is trying to buy.

For the tournament, the Lions netted just over \$25,000, which will go toward the numerous organizations and projects supported by the club. Prior to each of three qualifying sessions and the final round the Lions presented \$1500 "Big Checks" to organizations that work with veterans, blind students, citizens that struggle

to afford health care, and the homeless. This year's recipients of the Big Checks were the Indiana Blind Children's Foundation, Pets Healing Vets, the Heart & Soul Free Clinic, and Habitat for Humanity.

The IBCF is the fundraising arm of the Indiana School for the Blind and Visually Impaired. Lions Clubs International places a major emphasis on supporting organizations that fight the causes of blindness and helps those suffering from it. This has been part of LCI's focus since Helen Keller challenged LCI to be "Knights of the Blind" at the 1926 LCI convention. Pets Healing Vets is a program run by the Humane Society of Hamilton County. It works to pair up veterans suffering from PTSD and TBI with carefully selected shelter animals.
