Musical Notes—Lion George Smith



Merry Christmas 2023 and a Happy New Year 2024 from Lion George S. Smith, Past President of Anderson Lions Club, District 25-D, Past Organist/Pianist for District, State and International Lions (many times) having joined my club in 1965, the Lions have helped me in numerous positive ways. I have made myself available to serve and thus have been named Indiana's Merry Music Maker. I pay tribute to my wife of 67 years who has stood by me in our business side by side for 57 years and with our sons while dad was visiting and playing in most of the Lions dens throughout Indiana, and the world of Lions.

Now for the question; What is Your Musical Influence? We cannot assume there will be pianos and organs in our meeting places of tomorrow. Already the mindset of the younger generation is changing the arts in our music programs. There is so much richness and meaning in our older songs, the ones that touched us when growing up.

Is there a need in your community to help a child learn to play the piano and/or the organ? Perhaps you would provide an encouraging word and help with the funding of lessons, or make it a project in your club. We cannot assume that parents and community members will understand the complex nature of music making, the mental discipline needed to play, the emotional enrichment and other benefits that music provides in all of life's experiences.

There is a real need to encourage musicians. Music is often taken for granted and not appreciated by the laity. How often do we chatter during the prelude when the organist and pianist have worked so hard to prepare the music? As the Official organist even in our Anderson Club, I made sure that everyone took notice and appreciated my actions and burst forth with singing along with me.

When was the last time you heard an inspiring message via the piano or organ? I heard one recently while walking into the sanctuary of a church not far from our hometown. The thrilling sounds of a traditional hymn sounding froth from the majestic ranks of a great pipe organ.

In addition to the influences of people we know, there must also be a motivated desire within to make music. There are so many distractions today that were not there when I was a child. But, on the other hand, there have always been distractions of some sort. I was very fortunate to have parents (who were married 53 years) and took time to understand and appreciate my talent that needed nurturing from the beginning of time. My wife Norma who, for the most part, lets me and helps me fulfill my destiny of being a musician, teacher, performer and agreed from the moment we met to devote her entire life to this dream and make it her own as well.

Music is a gift to be cherished and to be passed on. Leave a legacy of music. The more you love music, the more music you love. How about you? Will you be a participant and/or helper in music? Indiana Lions Foundation Seeking Nominations for the Distinguished Hoosier Lion Award

The Indiana Lions Foundation annually selects one deserving Hoosier Lion to receive the Indiana Distinguished Lion Award. The award is presented at the Saturday luncheon of the Indiana Lions Convention. The winner is selected from among nominees submitted by individual clubs, the district cabinet with the approval of the sitting District Governor, or the Council of Governors with the approval of the Council Chair. Nominees must be a member of a club in Multiple District 25 that is in good standing and must have a minimum of twenty-five years of service as a Lion. Each nominee for this award will receive a recognition plague that will be presented in person at the Saturday state convention luncheon. Clubs are encouraged to use this mechanism to recognize long-service Lions who have served their clubs and their communities in exemplary ways. It is not required that nominees have had any involvement in holding district or state offices; rather each club will determine the criteria with which they wish to recognize a member from their club. Nominations are limited to one Lion per club and to five nominees in each district. Applications may be submitted by accessing the following weblink. The entry deadline is January 31, 2024.
