Westfield Lions Award \$13K in Scholarships
And Another New Lion Was Inducted into the Club

At their May 1st “Scholarship Awards Night”, the Westfield Lions presented eight Westfield H.S. seniors with scholarships totaling \$13,000. The Lions’ annual tradition of recognizing and rewarding deserving students is the Club’s highlight each year.

This year’s scholarships included \$500 awards to the Male and Female Athletes of Year. This year’s recipients were Will Harvey and Addie Kooi.

The \$2000 Florence Benson Memorial Scholarship was awarded to Ava Britton-Heitz. Flo Benson was a well-respected and long serving “Home Economics” teacher at Westfield H.S. (The program is now known as Family and Consumer Science.) She was also the wife of Lion Bob Benson and mother of Lion Rodney Benson. The Benson scholarship winners are selected based on their involvement in community service – the key mission of Lions Clubs International.

The Lester Tudor Memorial Scholarship was established to honor Tudor who was a principal at Westfield H.S. in the late 1950s and an active Lion. This year’s winner was Maryn Babb. The Tudor scholarship winner is also selected based on community service involvement.

The two Service Over Self (S.O.S.) Club Scholarships were awarded to Mia Gordeau and Layla Ryan. These two young ladies went above and beyond with their involvement in the club and their work serving others. The Westfield Lions have worked closely with the S.O.S. Club since its inception during Covid. The two clubs have a mission of serving others, so it’s a perfect fit for teaming up on service projects and fundraising.

Three years ago, the Lions began offering two new scholarships – the Trade & Vocational Scholarship and the Don Russel Career Development Scholarship. The Lions recognized a need to encourage and support students who might be interested in pursuing degrees and certifications at schools other than traditional colleges and universities.

The Don Russel scholarship was named in honor of one of the Club’s most influential Lions in its 95-year history. Don Russel’s involvement in the Westfield Lions Club resulted in developing the Club into the successful organization it is today. His vision and leadership lead to the origination of the Club’s wildly successful semi-annual Poker for Sight® tournament. This tournament, established in 2009, has allowed the Club to award hundreds of thousands of dollars in grants, scholarships, and donations.

To cap off the evening, Past District Governor Bob Benson inducted a new member into the Lions Club. Rob Ginder becomes the 69th Lion in the Club. He is sponsored by Lion President Bill Nesbitt.

Westfield Lions' Poker for Sight Tournament Raises Over \$17K *"Big Checks" Awarded to 4 Organizations*

On April 25th and 26th the Westfield Lions held their semi-annual Texas Hold 'em "Poker for Sight" tournament in Noblesville. Over 220 players competed for \$25,000 in prize money, with Adam Hamilton of Fishers coming away with the \$10,000 first place check. This year's "Poker for Sight" tournament was successfully held despite an unexpected last-minute change in venue. Every year since the tournament started in 2009 the Lions have held it at the Hamilton County Fairgrounds. Due to a major renovation project involving the 4H building, the Lions were

informed in early March that they would have to find another location for the April tournament. Tournament director Mike Birk immediately began scrambling to find an alternative location so that the tournament would not have to be cancelled. With some good fortune, Birk was able to work out a rental agreement with Rocky Shanehsaz, owner of the Mill Top, to hold the tournament at the former Legacy Bible Church on Greenfield Avenue.

Shanehsaz went above and beyond, making sure the facility was ready for the tournament and the Lions had everything they needed to hold it. Rocky's assistance was instrumental in the tournament being a huge success.

At the beginning of each of the 3 qualifying sessions, and prior to the championship session, the Lions presented \$1500 "Big Checks" to well-deserving organizations in the community. The Friday morning check went to Girls, Inc., a national organization with a chapter in Indianapolis that promotes leadership skills and provides encouragement and support for girls and young women. This organization is recognized as a critical building block for strong, independent

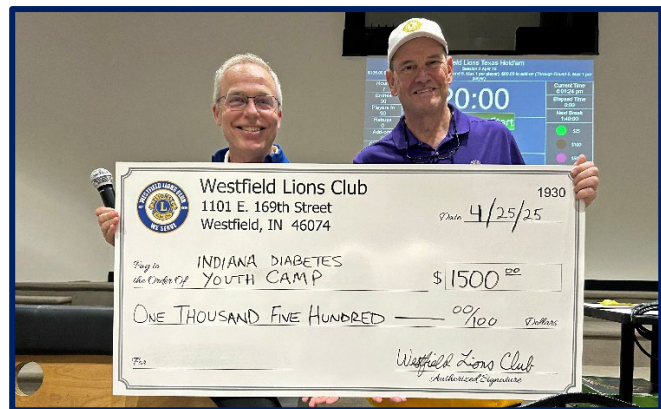
The second Big Check was awarded to the Indiana Diabetes Youth Camp – a facility near and dear to the Lions' hearts. Besides there being a worldwide effort on Lions Clubs International's part to fight the causes of diabetes and assist those suffering from it, the Westfield Lions have worked closely with the camp leaders over the years to help prepare the facility for campers each spring. The youth camp is a wonderful opportunity for children suffering from diabetes to be able to enjoy some of the same experiences other youth are able to. Student Impact of Westfield also received a Big Check during the tournament. This is another organization that the Lions have a long history of supporting. The final Big Check was presented to the Leader Dogs for the Blind organization. Ever since Helen Keller challenged Lions Clubs International in 1925 to be "Knights of the Blind", Lions around the world have worked to support efforts to eliminate the causes of blindness, support those affected by it, and provide eye exams and glasses to those that cannot afford them. The Leader Dog program, located in Rochester, Michigan, trains dogs that help give individuals suffering from blindness the opportunity to live a normal life. Indiana Lions Foundation Report

Trustees of the Indiana Lions Foundation, Inc. met on Saturday, April 12th at the Lions of Indiana State Office Building and approved ten matching grants totaling \$9,385. In addition to these matching grants, an emergency disaster assistance grant was approved for District E in the amount of \$1,000 to assist with relief supplies for the tornado and flooding events in southeastern Indiana. Matching grants were approved for the following clubs:

Camp Woodsmoke – Remodel camp infirmary addressing structural issues

Centerville – Remodel outdated kitchen in the historic Mansion House

Mexico – Replace outdated plumbing system in the community center

Plainfield – Purchase a surgery light for the Hope Free Medical Clinic

Riley Township – Erect marquee signs containing various community organization's signs destroyed by severe weather

Peru – Purchase a PlusOptix® vision screening camera to be used in the club's reading action and vision screening program

Noblesville – Purchase and plant trees in a greenspace area created as a result of a new White River bridge

Griffith – Provide 'Blue Bags' containing sensory stimulation items that help to de-escalate Autistic and special needs patients during over-stimulation emergency situations.

New Paris and Leesburg partnership – Purchase materials and assemble beds for needy families in their communities

The Trustees approved an increase in the club matching grant maximum to \$1,500 effective July 1, 2025.

Funding for matching grants is derived from Lions license plate sales, funds earned as a result of Lions working at the State Fair, sales of W. P. Woods fellowships and investment earnings on the Foundation's endowment.
