Lion Kassie Lemons shared her gratitude that October was Blindness Awareness/Guide Dog Awareness month. October 15th was celebrated as White Cane Awareness Day. The white cane is a universal symbol and is essential for a sight impaired person when traveling. White cane skills are a requirement for someone to be paired with a guide dog. Guide dogs make many choices about what is the safest way to travel. They are an essential travel aide for direction and safety. Some travel directions have been augmented with speaking GPS units that provide for a much broader range of travel and more precise location information. One of the important functions of a guide dog is also to be a companion. In addition to the GPS, computers, cell phones, and specialized software, ride services such as Uber, and delivery services for ordering, food, groceries and other items have greatly improved the life of the blind and visually impaired persons.



## Indiana Lions Mid-Winter Conference

#### Mid-Winter Conference Announces Conference Schedule

Members of the MWC planning committee have been meeting regularly for the past several months in preparation for the 2020 event, planned for January 10-11 at the Crowne Plaza Hotel at the Indianapolis International Airport. Last year's MWC saw a dramatic change, in the seminars offered, the number of attendees, and the 'all under one roof' feature that the Crowne Plaza offered. Additionally, an extensive evaluation survey last year resulted in an unprecedented 60% return rate, with many comments affirming the decision to return to the January dates as well as holding all events in one facility. The new seminar format, which eliminated the previous 2-hour workshops and 1-hour seminars was also seen as favorable, allowing more attendees to participate in more seminars.

This year we will also see a return of 16 seminar sessions, offered in four, 50-minutes time slots. A few of the seminars will be repeated twice. MWC committee members also poured through hundreds of individual comments in last year's evaluations, again resulting in additional changes made for this year's conference. In particular, the Friday evening keynote speaker has been replaced with the adoption of a special service project, a Million Meal Movement program. A separate article detailing this project has been distributed to district newsletter editors.

One of frequent comments from the surveys addressed the ten minute 'passing' period from one seminar to the next. This has been extended to 20 minutes. Many other details to enhance the enjoyment of the MWC were also addressed and should result in an even more enjoyable conference this coming January. Watch for registration information in the next several weeks as it will be distributed through district newsletters and the MWC Facebook page at Indiana Lions Mid-Winter Conference.

Millennials were born between 1981 and 1996; this makes them currently between 38 and 23 years old. There are roughly 75 million Millennials in the US and they are projected this year to overtake Baby Boomers as the nation's largest living generation.

Generation Z (or Gen Z) members were born between 1997 and 2010; this makes them currently between 22 and early teens. There are roughly 65 million Gen Z'ers in the US.

Is your Lions Club making the necessary changes to attract Millennials and Gen Z'ers?

These generations are different in many ways from the current average Lion; they grew up using computers, are very savvy on social media, consume news and entertainment in vastly different ways than their parents and prefer to use social media for communication. They are also more racially and culturally diverse than prior generations.

As these generations are different we need to think of Lionism differently. When I hear "young people do not want to join service clubs", my blood pressure shoots up. Today's young people grew up having to perform service hours for sports teams, church groups and school organizations. They absolutely want to belong to groups and serve. What they don't to do is join a Lions Club that hasn't changed in 30 years. We must change. And the sooner the better -- the future of Lions depends on this change. Are we open and welcoming to ALL groups in our communities? Indiana is becoming more racially and culturally diverse; are we cognizant of this and aware of what we can do to attract these groups? Lions clubs are non-religious, yet many Lions meetings and events open with a prayer -- are we open and welcoming to ALL groups in our communities?

My son is 22; he joined the Carmel Lions Club when he turned 18. When he was home for the summer, he showed up on the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays for the social hour and grilling prior to meetings. He would not sit through the meetings. What can we do to make Lions meetings attractive to Millennials and Gen Z -- this question is critical to our future.

Editor: Knowing that Carmel had previously been involved in giving out dictionaries to third graders as many clubs are, I asked 1st VP Bill Ryan to provide some more information on this new program:

We were thinking that dictionaries had outlived their usefulness. Most children have access to a device (phone, tablet, or computer) that has a virtual dictionary, spell check or a thesaurus on it. I spoke to one of Carmel's Vice Principals and he agreed. He added that at the end of the year they were cleaning out classrooms and would find 20 plus dictionaries that were going into the trash, barely used.

The money spent on dictionaries wasn't providing the same value to children as it had in the past. The Vice Principal and I came up with an idea to spend the same amount of money at each school and work directly with the Media Director to provide useful books that the children could learn from and build their reading levels.

In the form of a grant, the schools get to pick the books. We purchase them and add a "donated by the Carmel Lions Club" sticker to the inside cover.

The schools loved the idea. We gave books to 5 local Carmel schools. The best part was 2 of the schools had brand new teachers so this put \$300.00 worth of new books into the classroom of a teacher that is just starting out.


## **COATS FOR KIDS**
