

Look around the Bend!

I have just returned from the USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum, and I am excited to have gone! I was a Lion for 18 years before I attended my first USA/Canada Forum, and I wish I would have attended sooner.

What's so GREAT about the Forum? First, there were four wonderful inspirational speakers at meals, one of which was our International President, Gudrun Yngvadottir. She is an accomplished, inspiring person who is down-to-Earth. You may have heard of at least one of the other keynote speakers. They were John Pinero, acting as Vince Lombardi, Michelle Ray, and John Petz. All were interesting and inspiring.

Second were 87 seminars to choose from. Each attendee could attend 10 different seminars. Seminars ranged from information about LCIF, to diabetes, to vision screening, to team building, to the Women's Initiative. Lots of choices with lots of opportunity to learn.

Third was the opportunity to participate in a Strides Walk, which raises funds for diabetes research. Over 300 walked the route, but 500 signed up and paid their money. Fourth was the opportunity to talk to Lions from all around the USA and Canada and share ideas. Many of the seminars and speakers have ideas that apply to one's work situation in addition to one's Lion activities.

There are many other Lions Learning opportunities. Some of the leadership opportunities are Mid-Winter Conference, Indiana Leadership Institute, Emerging Lions Leadership Institute (ELLI), Advanced Lions Leadership Institute (ALLI), and internet classes and webinars sponsored by Lions Club International.

Mid-Winter Conference will be in early January and will have a keynote speaker and 4 seminars. It is just one day. Indiana Leadership Institute will be held in April and it lasts two days.. It has good lessons, and is focused on upcoming Indiana leaders. District D should fill all three slots held for us. ELLI is put on by Lions Clubs International and is two days of learning about Lions and leadership. ALLI is the next step, and is also two days worth of Lions and leadership information. Finally, the webinars and web-based lessons are available from one's own computer.

Lions! Help us identify potential Lion Leaders who would benefit from these Leadership opportunities. When the information becomes available, sign up for Mid-Winter Conference and encourage fellow Lions to join you around the bend at the conference and at other training.

From A War Battle to Lionism

In late September, I had the unique honor to travel with my parents to Buffalo, NY to attend my dad's Navy reunion. The crews of the USS Zellars (a Sumner-class destroyer) from WWII to Vietnam meet each year in a different location to rekindle friendships, fellowship, and remember their fallen shipmates. Dad served during the Korean War on the USS Zellars.

This trip I got to walk with dad on a Fletcher-class destroyer USS The Sullivans. As we walked, I could tell the experience was taking him back to the days he served. He pointed out and described several aspects that I would have overlooked. I learned more that day about a Navy destroyer than I ever knew (e.g. the hull of the USS Zellars was only one quarter inch thick, thus the moniker "tin can.")

The USS Zellars was commissioned October 25, 1944. During the U.S. assault on Okinawa, the ship was set upon by three Jills or Japanese torpedo bombers in a coordinated Kamikaze attack. Approaching at about fifteen feet above sea level to the port side, the first plane was dispatched as was the second. The third plane, carrying a 500 Kg. bomb struck successfully forward of the bridge. Forty-four sailors lost their lives, all of which are remembered in ceremony each reunion.

I was honored to get to spend several hours with two of the sailors who had survived the Kamikaze attack. One of the men, Paul was manning the gun that took out the first plane. Jerry (aka "Salty") was on the bridge at the time.

Salty was knocked off of his feet and badly wounded. At 93 years old, he's still dealing with the injuries, including loss of hearing. But it was the story Salty shared with me that struck me hard. It was one that he hadn't told at that point, even to his good friend Paul. I'll try to do it justice.

One shipmate, as Salty described him, "was the nicest fellow." He would say "hello" or "good morning" to Salty, always greeting him pleasantly. "I always enjoyed seeing him," Salty said.

When the Japanese plane hit the USS Zellars, this pleasant shipmate was hit badly – too badly to recount here. Disfigured the shipmate held up two fingers (as Salty did telling the story), which Salty knew meant he was asking for a cigarette. Hurrying, Salty grabbed a cigarette from someone standing near. By the time he got back, the man was gone. With a shaky voice, Salty said, "I still wake up seeing that. I can't get it out of my mind."

I comforted my new friend with understanding, but how can I truly? Salty and Paul left the room and me alone. It took a few minutes for me to gather myself.

Salty's story was striking for me on two levels. The first and most obvious is that even seventy-three years later, Salty is still dealing with the event. So much so that he hadn't even told Paul, trying to keep it repressed, I'm sure.

The other is the pleasant shipmate whom Salty lost. That sailor, a young man I'm sure, left us with an example of the impact of kindness. Just saying "hello" made a great impact on Salty and I'm sure others around him. These simple, kind words are still making a difference today.

As Lions, we have the opportunity often, even daily, to make a difference in someone's life. Money raised and applied, a helping hand in tough times, or just a kind word can have an everlasting impact. Give all in good faith. You may never know, as *We Serve*, how wide and for how long your simple act of kindnesses will be felt.

Invite them to take part in the project.
- 2. Write letters. Develop a mailing list of people who have participated in previous projects as well as a list of other people you would like to invite as members. Mail them a letter explaining what the club does and ask them to contact you if they are interested in attending a meeting.
- **3** .Produce club newsletters. Mail a special edition of your club's newsletter to prospective members. Outline your club's accomplishments and announce plans for the future.
- **4. Send out project announcements.** Send announcements explaining a special activity to people who will benefit from the program. Invite them to take part in the project and find out more about the club.


