This month, the answer is: **Someone helping the vision impaired.** As most Lions know, helping the blind and vision impaired has been a focus for Lions since 1925. That year, Helen Keller attended the International Convention in Cedar Point, Ohio and challenged Lions to become "knights of the blind in the crusade against darkness." Ever since, Lions have worked to support the blind and visually impaired in a number of methods, whether by supporting Leader Dogs for the Blind or the Indiana Eye Bank or by conducting vision screenings to identify those in need of assistance. Many of our clubs in District 25D are now conducting the state-mandated vision screenings for grades 1, 3, 5 and 8 in their local schools, and many others are conducting screenings for pre-schools using the Bling cameras from KidSight. If your club hasn't previously done vision screenings, reach out to our district vision services chair, Henry Rodriguez. He can assist your club in being trained so that you can help children in your community be able to see and read. If you learn of students that need glasses, Lions International has a program with Eyeglass World and America's Best that will provide a child in need with free glasses. They have stores in Hamilton Town Center in Noblesville and Markland Plaza in Kokomo.

I have started making visits to clubs and am looking forward to several visits in September. I'm also excited to share that the Muncie Lions Club has submitted its charter application and will be scheduling a Charter Party once the application is processed. Many thanks go to charter members Suzzy Giesman and Brenda Ragland, as well as PDG Steve Holtzleiter, PDG Betty Weist, IPCC Scott Smith, 1VDG Rocky Simpson and GMT/GET Jeff Kozicki for their persistence in this effort.

It's not too late to register to attend Banner Night, September 9, in Noblesville – rsvp to Kim Luckey by September 4. And it's time to start registering for the 2nd Cabinet meeting on October 14 in Union City. See the flyer for details.

What is Synthetic Identity Fraud?

Per Thomson Reuters at legal.thomsonreuters.com, Trends in synthetic identity fraud, Tad Simons, April 21,2023, "Over the past few years, synthetic identity fraud has surpassed creditcard fraud and identify theft as the fastest-growing form of fraud in the world. Why? Because stealing with a synthetic identity is easy, it's cheap, and the risk of getting caught is relatively low."

A Social Security Number can be purchased on the dark web for as little as a dollar. With that and PII (Personally Identifiable Information) which can be commonly found on the open web, a bad actor will create a fake identity and open credit cards, bank accounts, and all manner of instruments in that manufactured identity. They will often start slow with small transactions to test the new setup. If successful, the thief may go on a shopping spree and then disappear.

From the same Thomson Reuters article, Fraud-as-a-service (FaaS) is a new business model that thieves can sell. It is "literally a service to help people commit fraud." It is even being used to "facilitate money laundering, human trafficking, and finance terrorism."

Prevention and detection are difficult. That is why . . .

You must watch your own accounts. Pay attention to all financial transactions, reporting suspicious ones to your financial institution no matter how small (again, it could be a test).

You should know web sites you visit. Pay attention to the URL (Universal Resource Locator or web site address) to ensure you are on the site you expect.

When on a web site where you're making or reviewing financial transactions, you should ensure the URL begins with HTTPS and there is a lock icon beside it.



You should make passwords complicated (See last month's IT article). Change them frequently.

You should consider subscribing to a personal information monitoring service like LifeLock from Norton. There are others available as well.

Not all fraud attempts can be stopped. Often, losses can be recouped by the financial institution defrauded, however. Do your best to ensure your information is secure.

The Dr. Richard T. Miyamoto Fellowship



Indiana Lions Speech and Hearing has established the Miyamoto Fellowship to honor Lions and others for their dedication to their Lions Clubs, to Lions Clubs International, and to those in need in their communities around the world. Dr. Richard T. Miyamoto retired as Chairman of the Department of Otolaryngology-Head and Neck Surgery at the Indiana University School of Medicine. At Riley Hospital, he served as Medical Director of Audiology and Speech-Language Pathology.

In the 1980's, a grant from Speech and Hearing was provided to Riley Hospital and Dr. Miyamoto to expand the use of cochlear implants for children. Dr. Miyamoto's pioneering work has been recognized around the world, and he continues his close relationship with the Lions of Indiana.

A handsome plaque has been designed to honor the recipients of the Miyamoto Fellowship. For a \$500 donation to Indiana Lions Speech and Hearing, Inc. within a two year period, one plaque may be ordered in the recipient's name to be presented by the donor Lion or Lions Club. 
