From the International President

Dear District Governor Keith Thomas,

This is International President Dr. Naresh Aggarwal. I hope this email finds you in good health and great spirits in District 25-E.

It is now 9 months since we met in Chicago at the DGE Schooling. Thank you for your hard work this year. It gives me great pride to lead leaders like yourself. America is the only country to have actually served for 100 years, so I am humbled to be chosen your President at this most auspicious time. That is why this is the most special year of my life.

However, I have a small request. At the end of this year, in our International Convention, I wish to announce that we have fundamentally reached a new level of Lionism. That this year was a grand success. That you and I together have taken the Association to greater heights.

To say this, I must show 2 performance metrics – service of 150 million people this year (an increase of 32%) and membership of 1.5 million (our eternal goal since 1982).

We are on track to reach the 150 million service mark. However, the 1.5 million landmark is still 50 thousand members away.

I humbly ask you to add 1 net new member per Club. This year, you have net lost 63 members. Please try to reach net zero for the year, if not a net positive number. With 62 Clubs, I am sure this deficit can be reversed by the end of the year.

I want our special year to be remembered for a long time. The best way to do this is to cross our longest held goal – the 1.5 million mark. Maybe 10 years from now, if you meet any DG or maybe myself, we will remember how we took the Association across 1.5 million.

I hope you are with me on this. I am trying my best in my home country and multiple, but I need your help in Indiana.

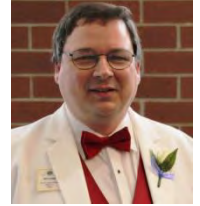
All the best. I wish you a great 3 months ahead and many more years of enjoyable service.

Hello Lions,

Like most of my articles, I jump thru several topics. And yes, I still want the clubs to review their current membership rolls and try to get inactive members either active again or off the membership rolls (see March's newsletter article).

A possible area to recruit members is from reviewing past membership rolls and looking at past dropped members. Sometimes, a former member dropped due to personal or other reasons that are no longer an issue. They may be waiting for someone to ask them again.

I hope everyone is busy working on their club officer elections. Don't forget about the new offices from LCI, the LCIF Club Coordinator, Club Service Coordinator, Club Marketing Chairs. Club Secretaries, it is important to get club information entered into MyLCI so the district team can begin to put together the district directory and also know who to invite to officer training. If you need help entering your election results in MyLCI, please contact CS Jeff Schafer at jeff.schafer1@comcast.net. Elections should be completed by mid-May. The directory takes a long time to complete and print.

Speaking of the directory, it is time again to be placing club ads for next year's directory. These ads typically wish the incoming Governor a great year or promote a club project or fundraiser. The prices for the ads should stay the same as last year; \$100 for a full page, \$50 for a half page, or \$30 for a quarter page. These ads are used to pay for the printing of the directory.

As of the publishing of this newsletter, clubs should already have received notice of the district's plan to elect a 2nd Vice District Governor at the caucus meeting in Muncie on April 28th. We need as many clubs represented as possible at the caucus meeting to ensure we have a quorum.

Hopefully in the next newsletter we will be able to announce a charter night in Vincennes. This will be the first new Lions Club of the new district E. Also, don't forget to sign up and attend the Women's membership retreat at Camp Koch on May 19th. I would like to see a large crowd there so we can all share ideas and grow our clubs.

This process is not difficult but is lengthy and takes time to insure a stable structure with planned service activities as well as fundraisers to support their goals. It must be a goal for our District to support our existing Clubs as well as start new Clubs to fill voids where there are no Lions to help the communities.

“Secretary’s Challenge”

In March, **we had 71% Monthly Membership Reports (MMRs)** and a **32% on the Service Activity Reports (SARs)** submitted. The MMRs average went up by 16% and the SARs decreased slightly by 5%. Overall, we completed 22,604 volunteer hours, served over 150,000 people, collected over 13,200 eyeglasses and 55 hearing aids, raised over \$118,800 and donated over \$36,600 and completed over 1,540 activities. Leo Service Grants Are Now Available

Lions and Leos have been awaiting the launch of the new Leo Service Grants. LCIF is excited to announce that as of January 19th, 2018, these grants are available for application! Leos will be able to create a bigger impact in humanitarian initiatives within their communities, while being exposed to valuable leadership and life skills.



District and Club Community Impact Grants Coming Soon

Soon, when clubs and districts donate to LCIF, they can apply for a grant that will give back 15% of that funding for a local project. The District and Club Community Impact Grant requires a US\$5,000 minimum donation for clubs and a US\$10,000 minimum donation for districts. Eligible clubs and districts must apply for the grant and upon approval, they can fund a project that helps boost their community!

Lions of 25-E Did You Know This Happened?

On Saturday, March 24, 2018, Lions Clubs International (LCI) and the International Diabetes Federation (IDF) signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU), on the occasion of Lions Day at the UN, to establish a cooperative alliance in the global fight against diabetes. The two organizations will come together to help prevent diabetes and improve the quality of life for those living with diabetes worldwide.



Diabetes affects 425 million adults worldwide, with the total set to reach 629 million by 2045.¹ An estimated 90% are affected by type 2 diabetes, which is largely preventable. One in two people with diabetes has not yet been diagnosed and their diabetes is not controlled. When diabetes is uncontrolled, it can have dire consequences for health and well-being and result in a number of serious complications that impact harshly on the finances of individuals, their families, and the economies of nations. People with diabetes who depend on life-saving insulin and regular monitoring to manage their condition pay the ultimate price when they cannot access affordable medication and equipment.

The signing of the MOU solidifies a partnership that will operate at the national, regional and global level. The two organizations agree to cooperate in good faith to achieve common goals:

- Prevent diabetes and improve the quality of life for those diagnosed
- Raise diabetes awareness and provide education where it is needed
- Increase access to diabetes care, medication, and diagnostic equipment
- Develop of holistic diabetes-service projects to improve care
- Elevate the issue of diabetes onto the national and global political agenda

According to LCI president, Mr. Naresh Aggarwal, “Lions are uniquely qualified to take on the challenge and growing epidemic of diabetes. With over 1.4 million members around the world, we can make an impact by helping to increase public awareness, screening for diabetes, and providing one-on-one peer counselling to young people, in addition to working with partner organizations.”

IDF President Prof. Nam H. Cho said, “Diabetes is fast becoming a global health emergency. Without concerted action to slow down the advance of this serious and debilitating disease, diabetes will overwhelm healthcare budgets everywhere. This is a timely and welcome partnership. Lions Clubs International is a dynamic movement with a vast and influential network. It has an impressive track record in bringing about positive change and health improvement. Our organizations are ideally placed to collaborate and make a difference for the many millions now living with diabetes and all those at risk.” LCI is the world’s largest service club organization, with 48,000 clubs and over 1.4 million members serving in 200 countries or geographic areas.

IDF is a leading authoritative global voice for the 425 million people living with diabetes and those at risk of diabetes.

With the signing of the Memorandum of Understanding it will be great to get the numbers of people living with diabetes down. Education is going to be a key factor.

Nominations and Elections *(by PDG Ann Haffner, CS, 25-G)*

March & April are the months when your club's Nominating Committee should meet to propose a slate of officers for the 2018-2019 Lions year. Elections should be held by April 15 and your officers reported on the MyLCI website by May 1. Either the club secretary or president can do this. Be sure to select term of office and click on 2018-2019 before reporting each officer for next year. All information for your president, first vice president, second vice president, secretary, treasurer, and membership chairperson should be reported. LCI now asks each club to report an LCIF coordinator, service chairperson and marketing communications chairperson. Your club's directors can also be reported.

It is important that each officer's information is updated before you file the report. You will probably need to add officers' birth years in order to update their information if the year is not already recorded with their entry. Please make sure names, addresses, phone numbers, spouses' names and e-mail addresses are correct. It is very important that e-mail addresses for all officers are included and correct. Most communication is now done by e-mail and your officers will not receive those communications if their e-mail addresses are not known or are incorrect.

As you report each officer for next year, be sure to click "save" before starting to report the next officer. Before you log out, click on "Club Information" and check to make sure the correct days of the month and meeting times are recorded along with the place and address of your meeting place. Once you have finished, click on "Reports" and then "Lions Club Officer Report for Next Year."
