



LCIF Corner:

We embark on a new Lions year with a challenge in front of us. Many of our clubs have enjoyed the benefit of having received an LCIF grant to help our communities. As LCIF is your foundation, it remains ready to assist any club in need. Most



grants are matching so half of the required funds need to be raised independently by the club. Some however do not require matching funds like for disaster relief. By remaining connected closely with community organizations like Chambers of Commerce, School Organizations, Medical Organizations, Churches, and so many others we can find numerous areas of needs perhaps requiring a grant for funding from LCIF.

All LCIF funds are put to use in the form of grants and the donations we make as clubs or as individuals make a huge difference. Donations are made by some other organizations also, but our help is certainly needed.

My home club, Bedford Lions Club received a grant to replace aging mosquito spraying equipment to provide better and more efficient mosquito control for Bedford. Our club could not handle the purchase without the help of LCIF and local donors. Local organizations provided half of the funding.

This year we should set a goal to increase our commitment to LCIF to provide funding needs they predict are necessary for the future. The goals they have set are:

2014-2015 US \$38.4 million

2015-2016 US \$41.3 million US \$45.4 million

2017-2018 US \$50.0 million LCIF 50th anniversary

Grants made to date:

US \$ 37 million to immunize millions of children against measles and rubella

US \$20 million to prepare and respond to natural disasters

US \$6 million to serve more than 240,000 special Olympics athletes and families

US \$18 million to teach critical life skills to 200,000 students annually through Lions Quest

US \$57 million to identify and support thousands of people impacted by diabetes

Last year District 25E donated \$8,599.16 to LCIF. The previous year we donated \$11,370.50. This past year District 25E donated the smallest amount of all Districts in MD 25 even though at the time we were the largest district. We met only 57.29 percent of our goal. So I am available to visit your clubs and present LCIF to your officers and club members. Please call to make arrangements for a personal visit.



That is the theme for the 2017 Indiana Lions State Convention in Evansville on April 28—30, 2017.

Make your plans now to join Lions from across the state of Indiana at the 2017 Indiana Lions State Convention to celebrate 100 years of Lionism. More than 130 Lions have already pre-registered for the convention. The convention will be hosted by the Oakland City and Petersburg Lions Clubs, assisted by Lions from throughout District 25-E.

Lions Clubs International President Robert Corlew will be our special guest at the convention. IP Corlew will participate in the presentation of awards at the Awards Luncheon on Saturday, and will be the keynote speaker at the All-State Banquet on Saturday evening. Convention attendees will have an opportunity to meet IP Corlew during a seminar session on Saturday afternoon.

A frequently asked question about the convention is: "What is the dress code for the All-State Banquet on Saturday evening?" The District Governors and other Lions leaders seated at the head table will be wearing formal dinner jackets, but this is a Lions function and Lions apparel is always appropriate at a Lions function. Please plan to attend the All-State Banquet, even if you don't have a Lions vest or shirt. We want you there, no matter what you wear.

Several exciting events and tours are being planned including a Friday evening dinner aboard the LST 325. LST 325 is a restored, fully operational, Navy ship that actually served our country in WWII. The LST is docked in Evansville on the Ohio River and will provide a unique dining experience. There will be a special breakfast commemorating Dr. W. P. Woods, LCI's first International President, who just happened to be from Evansville. Theme baskets are great items to bring for the Silent Auction. A great way for your club to participate in the convention. There will be many surprises throughout the convention

There is no charge to attend the convention business sessions, seminars, or visit the exhibit tables. We have done our best to provide affordable meals at the convention, including children menus for the Saturday Luncheon, All-State Banquet, and Sunday Brunch. Walk-in registrations will be accepted during the convention, however, no meal reservations will be accepted after April 20. The deadline for meal reservations at regular prices is April 1. After April 1, the price for each meal will increase by \$5.00. We encourage you to register early to avoid the added cost.




