

Environmental News – January 2025



Hi folks - - it's the "tree lady" again. Hope everything is going well for you all. Today I'm on my little soapbox to tell you about what's happening in the tree world.

Do you think of trees when you use paper products in your home every day? Probably not. We just take for granted that they're a necessary item we can't do without. These disposable items come at tremendous cost to the boreal forest in Canada where industrial logging operations clearcut approximately 1 million acres of forest ever year. When these trees are leveled, so too is the home for scores of wildlife as well as vital nesting places for billions of migratory birds. A significant amount of what is logged is turned into wood pulp, much of which is then used by the big tissue makers, fueling what's come to be known as the "tree to toilet" pipeline.

Environmentalists have taken note of this and are speaking out. The Natural Resources Defense Council is now involved in this and is calling out paper companies like Kimberly-Clark. (Kimberly-Clark makes products like Kleenex, Cottonelle and Scott). This company is now taking steps to reduce forest degradation in it's supply chain.

However, Proctor and Gamble, which makes Charmin, Puffs, and Bounty, has been given nothing but failing grades for their efforts in reducing forest degradation.

We are consumers - - we can make choices. Even if new trees are being planted now, how many years will it take before they will be big enough to be used? I know the next time I buy paper products, I will think twice before I pick up Charmin, Puffs, or Bounty. Think about these things. We all want a better world for our children and grandchildren.

I appreciate your taking notice of my articles. The future of our world begins today!

Santa is Blind too

Here is a story of a man I have found most interesting. Below is just a sample of what I have learned about him.

Santa's helper called his name. The little blind boy jumped up and ran to the front of the ballroom where he heard the voice of Santa just moments before. He touched Santa's knee and Santa picked him up and placed him on his lap.

"Hello little one," Santa said. "Have you been a good boy this year?"

"Yes Santa, can I touch your beard?" he asked. "Do you have a cane?"

"Yes, I have a white cane. Santa chuckled.

"Are you really blind, blind like me?" asked the boy.

"Yes, I am blind. Santa is just like everyone. Santa is Colored to the little Negro children. He is blind, just like all of you here."

After a few more questions, Santa handed him a gift and reminded him that his friends were waiting for their presents.

Later, when the presents were opened and everyone had some light refreshments, the children played with their new toys. The little boy loved his new fire truck. He got down on his knees on the hotel ballroom floor and crawled quickly, varooming his fire truck to an imaginary fire. It crashed into a chair. Gasps and "Oh's" came from the sighted Lions members and local dignitaries.

But the fears of the sighted were unheard by the little boy as he backed up his truck and headed in a new direction. "Man, this place is small!" the little boy said. Then making a loud siren call, he scooted past the tables and chairs on the floor.

The Honorable Judge Ned H. Smith played Santa at the annual Detroit Lions Club Christmas parties for more than a generation. Over the years, he realized how important it was for the impressionable children to know Santa was blind and that a blind child could grow up to be whatever they dreamed of.

Ned met many blind children through his leadership positions and activities with the Lions and other civic organizations. He hoped that the little boy would continue to be unaffected by the fears and limitations of the other guests and society in general. He knew too many like him have their attitudes, curiosity, adventurism, and dreams dashed. If playing Santa could hold the limitations of others at bay for just one child each year, he would be happy.

Judge Ned Smith was born in Indiana in 1901 and went blind in his teens. Luckily, he had family and friends who kept his dreams of becoming a doctor alive, even if they felt privately that Ned could never reach his goals.

Ned entered the University of Michigan in 1921. With no adult services for blind students, Ned worked his way through college washing dishes. Although he was still learning to read and write in Braille, few books, especially those pertaining to his course work were in Braille. He hired readers, often students in his classes to read for him.

One reader who read for him was Floyd Howard Skinner, a member of his class of '26, and Black. Classmates and others warned Ned about socializing and being too friendly with the "Colored." But Ned, now in a minority not of his choosing, found he had more in common with Floyd than not.

Although Michigan was a northern state, it had segregated places of business and employment options closed to people of color. Ned found that he too was not wanted everywhere. The University was not supportive of his career choice nor was the local medical community. Injustice was taking on a whole new meaning for Ned. He went into law like Floyd.

Floyd got a research position in 1925 with a local Black lawyer, Oliver Green. Green filed suit in 1925, against the Keith Theatre in a case now known as Bolden. V. Grand Rapids. The case was filed on behalf of Dr. Emmett Bolden, a Black dentist who was refused seating in the theater based on his race. Floyd became well-known in the Black legal community for that work before his graduation and had job offers before leaving the University.

Ned took an assistant prosecuting attorney position in Detroit for Wayne County in December of 1926. His new bride acted as his reader. Ned became active in local politics and joined civic organizations. He spoke on many topics to churches and community groups. In 1936 he ran for Common Plea Judge and won, being re-elected for the next 10, two-year terms.

Judge Smith got a reputation of being fair and willing to go beyond the courtroom to help those in need. Newspapers such as the Detroit Times, a Black-owned newspaper endorsed Ned as a judge for all of Detroit, not just the white citizens.

When WWII began, he did his part by donating blood on a regular basis and encouraging others to do the same. "With our boys spilling their blood all over hell, here's our chance to spill a little bit. It doesn't even hurt," reporters quoted Ned in their blood drive articles.

When the blind children from the public schools told his Lions Club they did not want gifts from Santa, rather the money for their gifts to be used to purchase war bonds, Ned took pride and inspiration in the patriotic spirit of the blind kids and his Lions Club did purchase war bonds in their names. The kiddies also got gifts from Santa at each Christmas party during the war.

Ned loved sports. Rarely did he miss a Detroit Lions football game. He enjoyed swimming in the summer. He loved to play bridge or cribbage with friends and poker after work in the courthouse. He kept a Braille deck of cards in his desk at work.

He became a champion bowler in the state's blind bowling organization. His league was made up of blind men and women from all backgrounds. They became friends. He even married a blind teammate to a young blind woman in his chambers. Ned loved to unite the many couples who came to the courthouse, especially soldiers about to head overseas, during the war.

But it was his commitment to his fellow blind people that inspired Ned. Often parents reached out to Ned to talk with their blind child. He shared with the families how he accomplished his job, the importance of being able to read and write in Braille, as well as using human readers. He told the families how important it was to explore and use all the senses, especially hearing. Ned proudly told of his 42-acre farm where he liked to spend his weekends. He described how he harvested his walnut trees, cut wood for the fireplace, and weeded the gardens. He shared his stories of being a blind parent and the importance of community involvement. One single mother asked Ned to talk with her blind son, Herman Hudson. The two wrote letters in Braille back and forth to each other. Ned encouraged Herman to go to college. When Ned learned that Herman might have to drop out due to financial reasons, Ned helped pay for Herman's tuition. Herman went on to be one of the first Black professors at Indiana University. He founded the IU's Department of Afro-American Studies. Although Ned chose not to travel with a guide dog, several of his blind friends did. Ned promoted the dog guide schools when speaking about blindness. He supported his fellow blind when they were hit by cars on the streets of Detroit. A "White Cane" ordinance passed in Detroit in 1936, and a similar law for the entire state of Michigan in 1937. The law protected the right of way for the blind traveler on city streets and the right to use public services such as movie theaters and restaurants. Yet too often Ned was called to remind the courts of the law's existence.

Ned died September 21, 1956, in Detroit, while still in office. An election was held to fill his seat. A Black man, Elvin Davenport won the seat by more than 30,000 votes. Ned would have been pleased.

Hello Lions,

I hope everyone had a Merry Christmas and 2025 is off to a good start. As we start the second half of the year, I want to give everyone a few reminders

A club must now pay their dues 14 days prior to the start of the convention. No longer can a club bring their check to convention and expect to be able to vote. With the District Convention being March 22nd, that deadline date is March 7th this year. Your club must be in good standing for anyone in the club to be on the ballot.

Now is the time to start making plans to attend the District Convention at the Gasthof Amish Village in Montgomery on March 21st and 22nd. Our visiting International Director this year is Edwin "Guy" Hollander from Kentucky. District Governor Erica Thomas should have more information regarding the upcoming convention in this newsletter as well as the registration form.

At the elections, we elect new trustees for the five state projects and the Indiana Lions Foundation for a three year term. The trustees typically meet in Indianapolis for 4 to 6 meetings per year. Trustees are to visit the various clubs and inform the clubs what their respective project does and how the Lions can support the project. The 3rd year trustee gives a report at the district meetings.

Some of these positions will be opening up as the current trustee is not running for re-election, but if you are interested in one of these positions you should go ahead and submit your name for the ballot.

We will also be electing a District Special Projects trustee for a three year term. The District Special Projects trustees meet at least twice a year in person and via email as grant requests are submitted. As with the state projects, the 3rd year trustee gives a report at the district meetings.

Lastly, this is the time we elect the District Governor and the 1st and 2nd Vice District Governors. The candidates for District Governor and 1st Vice District Governor are the current 1st and 2nd Vices respectively.

But the office of 2nd Vice District Governor needs to be elected. A candidate for 2nd VDG has to meet certain qualifications.

The qualifications are as follows:

Must be an active member in good standing of a chartered Lions club in good standing.

Must be endorsed by their club or a majority of the clubs in the district. This endorsement should be submitted to Nomination and Elections no later than 30 days prior to the convention.

Have served as club president, a member of the board of directors of a Lions club for no less than 2 years, and served as a zone, region chair, district global extension team coordinator, district global leadership team coordinator, district global membership team coordinator, district global service team coordinator, district LCIF coordinator, cabinet secretary or cabinet treasurer with none of these being accomplished concurrently. The District Constitution requires a letter of intent stating intent to run and including the above qualifications including years served in these positions.

If you are planning to run for a trustee or a district office position, the deadline for submitting your written nomination and/or endorsement is February 20th. Please submit your letters to Nominations and Election Chair PCC Keith Thomas at kthomas@threeidesign.com so that your name will be on the ballot.

It is time to start the process of electing your club officers for next year. Elections are due by end of April so start early and get it done. In addition to the regular club officer position, LCIF added a Club LCIF Coordinator a few years ago. LCI is requesting that someone be appointed to this position. If no one steps up, then the club should enter whoever was or is the immediate past president. If the secretary has problems with any officer entry into the portal, please contact the district administrator PID Linda Tincher at 812-240-0545.

Vice District Governor John Spurgeon is looking for Lions for step up to be District Committee Chairs. Come to the district convention and discuss these positions in person with John to learn more.

Local Lions Clubs Join Together To Build A Record Number Of Ramps In 2024

The Bedford Lions Club members started building ramps in 1989 and now have completed building 338 ramps helping many people in their community. This year the Lions volunteered to build a new yearly built record of 25 ramps for people in need who couldn't get out of their houses by themselves.

The ramps built in 2024 totaled 723 feet of constructed ramps varying from a 60 feet long ramp to a 11 feet long ramp and took a total of 1,032 volunteer hours to complete. They also built handrails and or steps at 5 additional houses this year.

This project has been a combined effort of the Bedford Lions Club, the Fayetteville Community Lions Club, the Mitchell Lions Club, and the Bedford Noon Lions Club working together to help these people in need. The number of Lions that work constructing these ramps varies from six to ten depending on the length of the ramp. The ramps will greatly improve the quality of life for these handicapped people and their families greatly appreciate all the work completed by the Lions building these much needed ramps.

In most cases they are senior citizens taking pride in aiding other senior citizens. LIONS COMPLETE KIDSIGHT VISION SCREENING OF PRESCHOOL CHILDREN FOR 2024

Members of the 4 Lawrence County Lions Clubs (Bedford, Bedford Noon, Mitchell, and Fayetteville Community) have recently completed their 11th year of Operation KidSight vision screenings at 19 area preschools and childcare facilities. They have done screenings at North Lawrence Playful Pathways Preschool, St Vincent Preschool and Kindergarten, Dive Christian Preschool, Calvary Lutheran Preschool, Free Methodist Preschool, In His Hands Preschool at Old Union Church, Crossroads Daycare Ministries, J C's Christian Preschool and Kindergarten, Restoration Child Care & Preschool, Hatfield Preschool, Tiny Persimmon Preschool, Lollipop and Rainbows Preschool, Grace Childcare Ministries, Lawrence County Independent Schools Kindergarten, Stone City Christian Kindergarten, Where Futures Begin Preschool, Springville Community Academy Kindergarten, Counting Futures Preschool and Cornerstone Preschool.

These screenings are provided at no cost to the child, parents, or facility where the screenings are performed. This year the 16 Lions who volunteered screened a total of 391 children with 28 children being referred for further examination by an Ophthalmologist or Optometrist. The vision screening system they used is a PlusOptix S12 camera system which was new in 2021 after the Bedford Lions received a matching grant from the Lawrence County Community Foundation to help purchase this system. This system works by taking a digital picture of the child's eyes from a distance of 3 feet. An invisible infrared light projects through the pupils onto the retinas and depending on the refractive error or prescription of the eyes the reflected light forms a specific brightness pattern within the pupils which the PlusOptix software analyzes to detect nearsightedness, farsightedness, astigmatism, lazy eye, eye misalignment, and imbalance between the eyes. After the child is screened a report is generated and sent in and reviewed by the Operation KidSight staff in Indianapolis and then the results are sent out to the sponsoring vision screening site who reviews them with the parents with any referrals and explanation of any vision problems found.



LIONS COMPLETE KIDSIGHT VISION SCREENING (CONTINUED)

The first few years of a child's life are critical in the development of normal vision. A child with vision problems often does not realize they can't see properly even when their eyes appear to look normal. Many eye problems when caught early enough can be completely corrected and the earlier they are diagnosed the better the chance for correction and the easier and less expensive the treatment will be.


