

I recently heard a fellow Lion tell this story, and I would like to share it with you. "A three-year-old boy, Ben, was brought in for an eye exam by his parents. They were confused by his behavior. He was usually angry and had trouble with things other kids his age were excelling at. As a special case, he was brought to a Sight for Kids exam, where doctors found Ben was completely blind in one eye. After an operation, little Ben was almost a different kid, smiling and laughing."

People all around the globe, including Ben, have a story of how Lions Club International Foundation (LCIF) made a difference. These incredible stories are powered by hard work, dedication, and made by Lions and friends. Thank you to Lions who are serving by giving and doing, and thank you to Lions who are there with feet on the ground, dedication your time and energy to those who need it most.

As my year as LCIF Chairman ends, I am reflecting on the goals our foundation and Lions, together, have accomplished. I have heard real-life stories of what donation make possible. Donations support clean water projects, so women like Chausiku can bring clean water back to her family. Donations support Shania, a sixth grade student learning how to say no to drugs and yes to a healthy future thanks to Lions Quest. Donations support Thomas, who is learning to manage diabetes on his own, and Ben, who is enjoying clear vision for the first time in his life.

Last year, we set am ambitious goal of raising US \$50M for LCIF - and achieved it. LCIF's Golden Jubilee (its 50th anniversary) is now over, but the Golden Era has begun. LCIF has a goal of raising US \$110M by June 30, 2019. We are close, but have not yet reached that goal. Please keep in mind the Power of Each. If every Lion donates just US \$2 each week to Campaign 100, LCIF can meet this year's goal and will be well on its way to reaching its goal of raising US \$300M by June 30, 2021. Take pride in your gift, no matter what the size. It may be a small gift, but if every Lion contributes, it will lead to massive benefits for our Foundation. Also, keep in mind the Lions Share recognition program begins with a gift of just US \$50.

My time here as LCIF Chairman has been an enormous reminder that together, we can. Thank you, Lions. It has been an honor to be your foundation's chairman.

Indiana Lions Foundation needs your help!

The Indiana Lions Foundation provides ticket sellers and ticket scanners at four gates at the Indiana State Fair. The fair runs from Friday, August 2nd through Sunday, August 18th. More than 700 shifts need to be filled over this 17 day period. This is the single largest fundraiser for the Foundation and the money earned is used to provide funds for grants and to maintain the State Office Building.

A new program called "SaffireTix" will be used for selling and scanning tickets this year. It is based on cell phone technology. Cell phones will be provided by the Fair. For an overview of this program, watch the following videos.

New for this year: Gate 12 will be remodeled to have indoor ticket sellers. Gate 18 will also be getting a face lift this year to make more room for more security scanners. Ticket sellers will still be in a building. Two shifts are available to work. The morning shift is 7:30A - 3P; the afternoon shift is 1:30P - 9/9:30P.

In return for working, the Indiana Lions Foundation is offering W.P. Woods Fellowship credits for workers – one credit for the morning shift and two credits for the afternoon shift. It takes 10 credits to earn a W.P. Woods Fellowship.

If your club or district wants to bring a van full of people (minimum 8) to work, the Foundation will reimburse you up to \$125 for the van rental. To be reimbursed after the fair, just submit your van rental receipt and a list of those who worked.

Member Spotlight: Erica Thomas

When did you join Lions Club?

2005 (Petersburg)

What motivated you to join?

It was something that [my husband] Keith and I could do together.

Now that you've been a Lion for 14 years, what motivates you to serve now?

It is knowing that I have many opportunities to help others on a much grander scale than I could ever help on my own.

Do you currently hold positions in our District?

District Tail Twister, Long Range Planning Chair, Indiana Lions Foundation Trustee, Reading Action Coordinator, and any other hat that someone needs my help with.

What positions have you held within your local Club?

Our Club is fairly small; I think I have held most every position except Treasurer.

What Lions positions have you held at the District level or higher?

I am currently Vice President on the Indiana Lions Foundation. I hold that position for one more year before holding the President's position for two years.

Which position is most memorable and why?

I am not sure that any of the positions are less memorable than the others. They are all a part of who I am and who I am becoming. I cannot get bored this way!

Throughout your time as a Lion, which service project have you been a part of that made the most impact on you?

Although the Foundation is not a project, most folks treat it as one. I think that having the ability to grant Clubs money to complete great projects in their communities that help a lot more people is huge. The different ideas that Clubs come up with is amazing! It is like tossing a rock in the water; you never know how many lives have been touched by one of the ripples.

What Lions-related fundraising effort that you've participated in has been the most successful in your local community? What makes that effort stand out to you?

I think our best fundraiser was starting to sell smoked ribs. They went so well that all the other clubs and groups started selling them and now we need to find another project.

What's on your Lions Club bucket list? What obstacles stand between you and achieving items on your list?

There's a Lions bucket list? Several Lions have asked me when I am going to be District Governor. I have commitments that I need to move through first, but it's coming; watch out District!

If you had \$100 for a Lions-related activity, where would you direct the funds?

I would use that money to increase what our Club donates to the state projects and the LCIF.

What if you were working with \$1000?

I would find a new need or two in our community to start working on.

What advice do you have for Lions Club members in our District?

There are new friendships, connections, and ideas just waiting for you to find them when you step out of your own Club. There are amazing opportunities to partner with others in a project just waiting for you to ask. There are monies out there for the asking to help fulfill a need in your community if you are willing to look for it and ask. The real question is, are you courageous enough to roar that you are a Lion and step out of what is comfortable, for just an instant?

Thinking to the future of Lions Club, what gets you most excited? Why?

I think Lions are slowly realizing that we cannot serve our communities as we once did. The Clubs that are figuring this out, changing and moving forward, are the Clubs that continue to grow and help fulfill more needs in their communities. With more hands, there can be more service. With more service there continues the legacy of what it means to be a Lion.

History of Lions and Leader Dogs

It all began in 1938, when Charles A. Nutting, Donald P. Schurr and S.A. Dodge led the Uptown Lions Club of Detroit in establishing a school to train guide dogs for people who are blind. Their motivation was Dr. Glenn Wheeler, a fellow Uptown Lion whose attempts to be accepted by another guide dog organization proved unsuccessful. The first clients were housed at the Park Avenue Hotel in Detroit and graduated in the fall of 1938.

On April 4, 1939, Lions Leader Dog Foundation was incorporated as a Michigan nonprofit. In May 1939, the Foundation leased a small farm in Rochester Hills, Michigan to house their new venture. Fifty dollars per month rented a farmhouse for the clients and staff, a barn for the dogs and a garage. On October 8, 1939, the first class of the official Lions Leader Dog Foundation graduated. The cost to graduate a client/dog team was \$600. Soon after incorporation, on June 15, 1940, the new name "Leader Dog League for the Blind" became official.

Leader Dog received a new Executive Director in 1951, Harold "Pock" Pocklington. Pock had been on the Board of Trustees since 1948 after he first visited Leader Dog while a District Governor-Elect. Leader Dog's global ties to the Lions began strengthening in 1953 when S.A. Dodge served as president of Lions International, bringing Leader Dog to the Lions at the highest possible level. Melvin Jones, founder of Lionism, gave Leader Dog his personal endorsement in 1958.

In 1963, Lions International President Jorge Bird of Puerto Rico became involved with Leader Dog when he brought a Spanish soldier, Francisco A. Garcia, who had been blinded by a shell explosion, to get a dog. Until this time, the Lions were unable to establish themselves in Spain because its leader General Franco opposed having international associations in the country. However, when Garcia returned to Spain he received much press and Franco became aware of him. When President Bird was finally able to get an audience with Franco, he provided approval for Lions to establish themselves in Spain. At this meeting, Franco recognized the Lions as the group that "gave the dog to someone in Barcelona." The association of Lions of Spain and Leader Dog continues to this day. On May 10, 1968, Leader Dog received permission to use the Lions emblem by Lions International, formalizing the deep connection between the two organizations.

The Lions' sustained support of Leader Dog was celebrated in 1972 with the addition of a life-size Lion to the Downtown Rochester training facility. The 2,200 pound statue was installed by the Shelby Township Lions and was designed and constructed by Gan Jacobsen (who became a long-time Trustee of Leader Dog). During this decade, Pock, who was still serving as Executive Director of Leader Dog, was twice elected to the Lions International Board (1974–75, 1978–79).

In April of 2013, LION Magazine listed Leader Dogs for the Blind as one of the "10 Brilliant Breakthroughs in Service." In November of 2013, Leader Dog, Lions Clubs International, and partners Purina Pro Plan and the Iowa Department of Corrections jointly received the Community Partnership Award from the Mutual of America Foundation for Leader Dog's Prison Puppy Raising Program. The program places Leader Dog puppies with inmates for their first year of life.

Lions Clubs throughout the world have continued to support Leader Dog and its clients financially, brought thousands of people who needed assistance through Leader Dog's doors and have continued to serve on the Board of Trustees. They are puppy raisers, volunteers, breeding hosts and so much more. Many recipients of Leader Dog services have become Lions after experiencing their support and mission firsthand.

To this day, the mission of the Lions, "We serve," perfectly complements the Leader Dog mission of empowering people who are blind or visually impaired with lifelong skills for independent travel.

Current committees: Activities, Auditing, Budgeting/Finance, District Chaplain, Constitution and By-Laws, Convention, Diabetes, Drug Awareness, Elections, Environmental, Honorary, International Understanding, District Global Leadership Team, Leo Club, Lions International Foundation, District Global Membership Team, Parliamentarian, Public Relations, Rules and Resolution, Sergeant-At-Arms, Vision Screen, Song Leader, Youth Exchange, Law Camp, Long Range Planning, District Pin Design, Liberty Day, Newsletter and Hoosier Lion Editor, District Website and Technology, and Operations Kids Sight.

At the local level, Lions Club leadership consists of a President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, Secretary, Club Administrator, Treasurer, Membership Chairperson, LCIF Coordinator, Service Chairperson, Marketing Communications Chairperson, and Director.

William Perry Woods, M.D. Dedication

On Sunday, June 30, 2019, the Lions of Indiana dedicated a marker sign honoring William Perry Woods, M.D. It is located near his grave in the Lutheran Cemetary. As a young man, he wanted to service his community. Dr. Woods was founder of the Association of Lions Clubs in 1916, later to be named Lions Club International. Today, his Lions Clubs total 1.4 million members in 205 countries with over 45,000 Clubs.

Dr. Woods was the first International President of Lions Club. He came to Evansville, from Clarinda, Ohio, as a physician and surgeon working at Deaconess Hospital. He was honored with an award for 50 years of service to the people of Evansville, Indiana and surrounding areas.

He served his fellowmen until two years prior to his death at 88 years old. The motto of the Lions Club is, "We serve." Our city is very honored to have such a man call Evansville home.
