



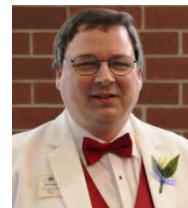

During my time as District Governor I have tried to stress that the district is here to support the clubs and not the clubs for the district. With that thought in mind, I want to approach an unpopular subject – dropping members. I want to discuss various types of members several of our clubs have and my suggestion of whether to keep said member or to discontinue their membership. With this thought in mind, please take a good look at the club's current membership in an upcoming meeting.

Do you have members you rarely or never see at a meeting or function and they are not paying their dues? If so, please make a point of looking them up and meeting them to find out why they have stopped coming to meetings and functions.

Did they lose interest in Lions? If they have lost interest in the club, and do not want to continue as a Lion, it is time to drop them as a member. It is not helping the club by carrying an inactive member who is not contributing to the club.

Did something happen at a club meeting or function to alienate or offend the member? If so, it is important to find out what happened and work to resolve the issue. If resolution is addressed, the club can take steps to prevent future issues, and the club may be able to get the Lion to become more active again. The Lion may want to be involved but not with this club. Maybe there is another nearby club to transfer to. This will allow the member to continue serving and reduce an inactive member from membership rolls.

Did the person not fit in with some members or with the club itself? Sometimes this just happens and helping them find a different club is better than losing a volunteer willing to serve.

Do you have members that happily pay their dues but never attend meetings or functions? Try to meet with these individuals and find out why they are unable to participate in meeting and functions. Sometimes, it is as simple as they forgot about it. I know I have forgotten about a meeting or a function in the past. It happens. The club can start sending out reminder emails, phone calls, and/or text messages. Hopefully this helps non-participation.

Sometimes the member just has too much on their plates. My recommendation for these members is to keep them in the information loop. If they have a free moment, they may attend. I would not drop these members. Non-attendance is no longer a good reason to drop a member.

Do you have members that gladly pay their dues and work most or all functions, but do not attend meetings? Sometimes members have to work at meeting times. If they are working, I would mark them as working on the attendance sheet and count that as attending the meeting. Lions is a volunteer organization and most of us need to earn money for us to be able to serve our communities. Keeping them informed of what is going on by, sending agenda items ahead of time, encouraging them to send in comments, concerns, and suggestions or moving an occasional meeting date/time are ways to offer more participation opportunities.

Do you have members that just don't like to attend meetings? Again someone should meet with them to find out if there is something specific about the meetings that they don't like. Are they too long? Boring? Disorganized? Whatever the issue, bring this back to the club and try to make changes. Let the member know about the improvements and invite them to try participating. Continue to keep them informed of what is going on. (continues on page 7)

Having just returned from the last training before the International Convention, I feel energized to serve our clubs. Leadership is critical well. Our district organization is made up of members like YOU. They come from your clubs and have specific functions to make the district function reasonably well. If you are disappointed in the way the district is run, engage and change the weaknesses. How do you engage? Get involved with your club leadership and assist in decisions at your club level. Nothing, this side of God's heaven is perfect, so NEVER GIVE UP. Be involved with district functions. Then get involved in a district office. YOU CAN make a difference! Your vote counts. We are unlike any other organization. We are only as good as we make it. Recognizing our meetings are long and boring is leading us to change how we do functions. My view is less formality, more attention to club needs, meaningful gatherings and being a better voice for clubs. However, YOU are an integral part of the district organization. Lions Tackle Diabetes

Raising Diabetes Awareness, Preserving Sight

The World Health Organization estimates that over 422 million people worldwide have diabetes, a growing world epidemic that is expected to affect over 642 million by 2040.

Diabetes and Vision Loss

People with diabetes are at risk of losing sight due to diabetes eye disease. It is the leading cause of new-onset blindness in many countries. All people with diabetes – both Type 1 and Type 2 – are at risk. That's why everyone with diabetes should get a comprehensive dilated eye exam at least once a year.

Diabetes can lead to other possible complications, including heart attack, stroke, kidney failure, leg amputation, and nerve damage. In pregnancy, poorly controlled diabetes increases the risk of fetal death and other complications.

Lions and Diabetes Awareness

With these statistics and concerns in mind, Lions have taken action through the Diabetes program. Our work supports diabetes awareness, education, prevention, detection, control, and research.

“Secretary’s Challenge”

In February, ***we had 55% MMRs*** submitted and a ***37% on the Activity Reports*** submitted. The MMRs average went down by 20% and the Activity Reports increased slightly by 5%. Overall, we completed 19,404 volunteer hours, collected over 12,530 eyeglasses and 49 hearing aids, raised over \$111,700 and donated over \$33,300 and completed 120 activities. Keep up the GREAT work in your communities!

Traveling Trophy



Is there a club out there in the District that can take the Traveling Trophy away from the Petersburg Lions? What does it take to do this? The points are computed by taking the number of Lions from each club times the distance traveled for each day at the District Convention. So, if you have 4 Lions attending the “Meet the ID Dinner” on Friday and then stay over or come back to the Convention on Saturday, and the distance traveled is 100 miles round trip (RT), then that club gets 800 points (= (4 Lions * 100 miles RT) * 2 (number of days)).

So let’s get everyone from your Lion’s Club to attend the District Convention in Nashville on March 10 & 11. Don’t forget to check your mileage when you sign in.

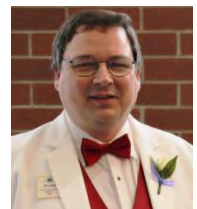


Congratulations on Doubling Our Service Goal!

Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) is focusing on Child Cancer this coming year.

There are a large number of incidents of cancer in children worldwide. In my own church family we lost a young boy to cancer. He had a protracted illness and was treated in several parts of the country because of the severity. Eventually the cancer won, but the need for research, treatments, care, and financial aid lives on. Our donations will make it possible for many of these affected children to receive the care they need. It was recently discovered elephants don't get cancer. You might ask what does that have to do with children. DNA is the answer. Elephants have an excess of certain cells that destroy cancer forming cells; thousands more than in humans. Our DNA chain may be altered to produce these.

Let's help LCIF to assist in the advancement of this new technology combatting cancer in our children.

Donations in our district continue to grow painfully slowly. Through the end of January donations from 24 clubs have donated a total of \$9,515.22. Four months remain to reach our goal of \$12,000.00. A goal to help fund projects needed to help those with serious needs. Should we be successful in reaching our goal, let us not be complacent. Our goal is the smallest in the state and has been for three years.

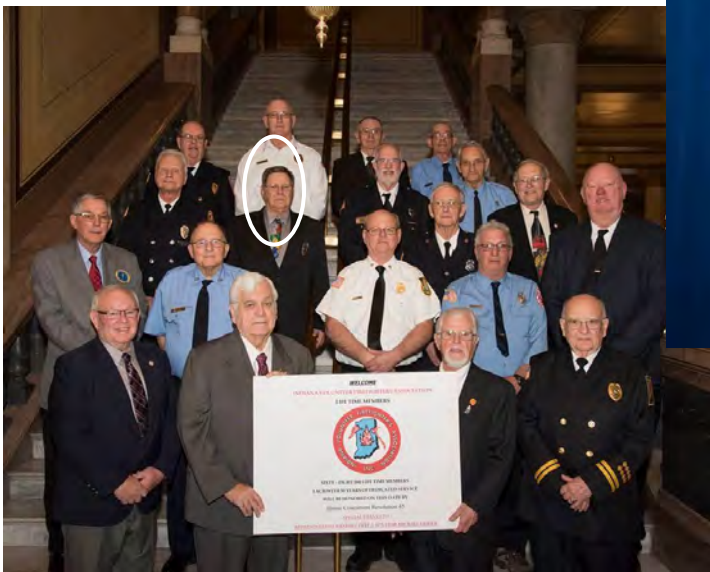

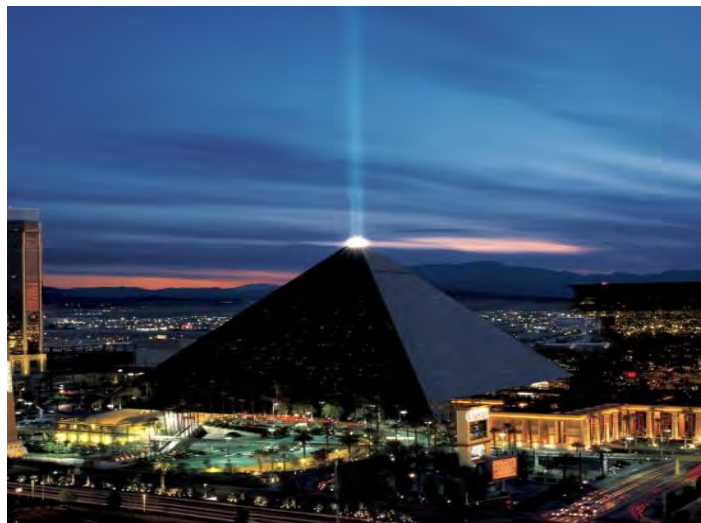
