ENVIRONMENTAL NEWS - - QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS 2023

Do you use the little "pods" of detergent for your washer or dishwasher? Did you know that these little pods release microplastics into the environment? Microplastics are pieces of plastic that measure less than 0.5 centimeters across. Out of the 2.4 million tons of plastic waste that goes into the oceans each year, 94% of it is made up of microplastics. It has been recently discovered that much of this comes from washing laundry. (You may say that we live in the Midwest and how do we affect the oceans? Almost all rivers in the Midwest eventually feed into the Mississippi River, which feeds into the ocean.)

The problem is that companies are advertising pods, strips, and PVA sheets as an eco=friendly and biodegradable alternative to traditional laundry. This is misleading. It's best to avoid pod detergents for the sake of the planet. A better alternative is just going for the powdered detergent. It's the same thing, just without water or the plastic coating, and you can get most of it in cardboard boxes which can be recycled.

According to an article in Environmental International, researchers have found plastic in the blood of 17 out of 22 study participants (about 77%). PET, commonly used in disposable water bottles, was the most widely encountered plastic polymer. The second most common was polystyrene (PS) which is used for food packaging and polystyrene foam used for plates, cups etc. The authors write that more research is needed to determine the human health risks involved with plastic in the bloodstream.

Moving on to another question: Can you recycle Christmas wrapping paper? First, check with your local recycling center to be sure it's O.K. to put it in with your other recyclables. But for the most part, you can recycle plain Christmas wrapping paper, folded flat, not mashed up into a big ball. Anything that has glitter or velvety flocking or is metallic, just throw it in with your regular <u>trash</u>. Don't try to recycle bows because of the "sticky" backing on them. With Christmas cards, use the same criteria – no glitter or flocking – and recycle the envelopes.

Another recycling idea I used a couple of years ago - - I had a lot of pretty scarves I'd used over the years, so I wrapped my daughter-in-laws' and grand daughters' gifts in them. They enjoyed the scarves, plus they looked pretty under the Christmas tree.

If you learn anything from these articles, I'll be happy. I care very much about our environment and am trying my best to make the world a better place for our children and grandchildren.



Cancer Control Project partners with Riley Children's Hospital and Walther Cancer Foundation.

YOUR Indiana Cancer Control Project has partnered with Riley Children's Hospital and the Walther Cancer Foundation for the Indiana Lions to raise \$100,000.00 this Lions Year. The Walther Cancer Foundation, has offered to Riley Hospital a matching grant program of up to 10 Million Dollars. The trustees of the Cancer Control Project have decided that the Indiana Lions can raise \$100,000 in this Lions year, to be matched by the Walther Foundation for a total gift to Riley of \$200,000.00.



Why raise this money NOW? First, we know that on average, from 2013 to 2017, 375 cases of childhood cancer and 57 childhood cancer deaths occurred each year among Indiana children aged zero to 19 years. For most cases of childhood cancer, the cause is unknown. (Indiana State Cancer Registry, 2021.) We may not see the impact that the lives of these of 1, 5, 10, 50 or 100 children will have here in Indiana. But if they do not have the resources to beat their disease, the lack of that impact will be forever and our state and world will be less because of it.

Secondly, 80% of these Indiana children will be treated at IU Health and particularly at Riley Children Hospital for treatment of their cancer. That is 300 of the 375 yearly cases. Riley Children Hospital is listed in the top 25 hospitals in the United States for research in childhood cancer by US News & World Report. Riley Hospital is the only nationally ranked children's health system and pediatric cancer program in Indiana. This money, raised by the Lions of District E, will go to an Indiana hospital, will be matched by an Indiana foundation, will be controlled by Indiana people, will pay the needs of Indiana doctors, nurses, researchers and will DIRECTLY AFFECT THE LIVES OF INDIANA CHILDREN. It will directly affect children some of our Lions in District E and in other districts personally know.


Third, it will show the people of Indiana and of the nation that Lions of Indiana are people who not only accomplish great things, not only are people who care, but are people with VISION as to what can be accomplished. By participating in this matching grant program, Lions of District E can help be a part of a VISION that results in 20 MILLION DOLLARS being raised for more effective treatments against existing cancers, research that leads to discovery of new treatments against cancer, control of pain, new drug therapies, the causes of cancer cell formation, and for the cure of cancer.

Coming Soon: Indiana Lions Mid-Winter Conference

The 35th annual Indiana Lions Mid-Winter Conference will be held on Saturday, January 20, 2024 at the Crowne Plaza Indianapolis Airport Hotel.

Some Indiana Lions say the Mid-Winter Conference is "the best place for learning" about leadership, service, and all aspects of Lionism. We offer seminars on club administration, community service, fundraising, and membership recruitment and retention, as well as opportunities for service, fellowship with Lions from around the state, and plain old everyday Lions fun.

The Early Bird registration fee – until November 30th - is only \$40 - \$5 less than last year - and includes informative seminars, on-site service projects, coffee and pastries in the morning, lunch at noon with a motivational speaker, and fellowship with other Lions.

The keynote speaker at the Saturday luncheon had not yet been announced when this article was written.

The conference will be preceded by a dinner on Friday evening. There is a separate fee of \$30 for this event. The after-dinner entertainment will be provided by magician Daniel Lusk. He has performed across the United States, overseas, for celebrities, national sports teams, and on national T.V. His magic has not only been seen by millions but Daniel also lectures at conventions for other magicians teaching his trade.

Conference attendees will be offered the opportunity to participate in two on-site service projects. After dinner on Friday evening, attendees will have the opportunity to participate in the Care-ing Cases project, using clean recycled hard eyeglass cases to assemble first aid kits and toiletry kits. Conference attendees are also encouraged to donate new socks, gloves, mittens, scarves, knit hats, and blankets to the Sock It To Me project. Collection boxes for these items will be available on Friday and Saturday. Our District Governors will share all items created/collected by these projects with those in need in their districts.
