W.P. Woods Chair Reports Inactive Accounts holding Credits and Donations

You may be unaware that you have W.P. Woods credits or donations in an inactive account. An inactive account is one having no activity for five or more years. These credits and donations are waiting to be used for W.P. Woods Fellowships.

The Indiana Lions Foundation Board of Trustees discussed options for these forgotten credits and donations, and agreed to notify account owners or owners' clubs, and voted on the following options for owners:

- 1. Reactivate the account with a donation of \$5 or more;
- 2. Notify the W.P. Woods Chair to transfer the credits or donations to another club member;
- 3. Notify the W.P. Woods Chair to give the credits and donations to your District.

The Trustees will notify account owners, or their clubs, by mail. Credits and donations in accounts not acknowledged by owners or their clubs within sixty days after receiving the Trustees' letters will be transferred to the Districts in which they originated. Accounts of clubs that no longer exist will be transferred to the District in which the club once existed.

Candidates must be Lions in good standing who have successfully served on a club committee and who have not yet attained the level of club president. Current charter club presidents are also eligible for this institute.

Candidates must be willing to commit to all days of the institute. Participation is limited to Lions from the Constitutional area noted in the schedule below.

Applications

Lions who meet the qualifications may apply to the ELLI. Because of the high number of applications received by the association, acceptance into the institute is not guaranteed. Applications can be found on the LCI website – Lionsclubs.org under the Members center tab, then the Resources tab then Leadership Resources tab and then finally the Development Resources tab. Please allow time for the application to be signed by your club President, District Governor Ron Bigham and Leadership Coordinator Reed Fish prior to the August 20 deadline.

Cost of the Institute

Lions Clubs International will provide meals and lodging according to the dates and schedule of the institute. Please note that a non-refundable participation fee of US\$125.00 will be required to offset a portion of these costs for all institutes. This fee will be due no less than six weeks prior to the institute start date. Please do not send funds until you receive a letter of acceptance to the institute. Participants are also responsible to pay for their own transportation and related travel expenses to and from the institute site.

Brian's Trike Race Needs Your Help!

Fellow Lions,

The Brian's Trike Race and Disc Golf Competition is fast approaching and we need your help! But, before I get to that, I would like to say a big Thank You to those clubs and sponsors that have supported us through the date change to September 16th!

Brian's Trike Race is the largest fundraiser for your State Project, The Indiana Lions for the Indiana School for the Blind and Visually Impaired.

What do we need?

We still need additional Lions teams to participate in the event, especially in the Disc Golf Competition. That being said, our biggest need now is to get better enrollment of student teams! This is where we need your help! Whether or not you are in driving distance from Indianapolis or not, some schools in your District are, and we need their participation!

Why Do We Need Students and What's in It for Them?

Having students at the event increases the excitement and vitality, but also gives them (and their teacher and parent chaperones!) visibility to the Indiana School for the Blind and Visually Impaired and Lions! They really do make the event more fun.

"So, what's in it for them?" you might ask. Great question! Aside from the fact that they tend to have a great time, they can also ear four Community Service hours, which many schools require for graduation or participation in certain school activities.

How to Get Student Teams

At this point, I assume you are convinced! ;-) So, how do we get these Student Teams? Well, we need to contact schools (it makes sense, right?) and ask. The action that we are requesting is that our Lions Clubs contact local schools to see if they would be interested in participating in the event. Here's some guidance on how to do that:

- Check your local high schools' calendars. Once schools have been back in session for a week or so, it's a good time to contact them.
- At your local schools, often the Vice Principal is the most senior person involved in the management of student organizations; start by asking for the Vice Principal when you call.
- Let them know that you are from their local Lions Club and give a few examples of how you help the community. Let them know that we have an annual fundraiser called Brian's Trike Race, held in Indian-

- apolis on September 16th, where adult and student teams of four participate in a relay race on adult-sized tricycles to race funds and awareness for the Indiana School for the Blind and Visually Impaired and we need student teams to participate. Let them know that this year we have added a disc golf tournament.
- Definitely let them know that participating students will receive four hours of community credit and will have fun!
- Student organizations (language clubs, sports teams, Key Clubs, etc.) tend to participate the most, because they are already often thinking of themselves as teams. The Vice Principal often knows the best groups or teams at the school to contact.
- Signup forms are available on the following two pages and additional information is available at the web site www.inlionsforisbvi.org If you direct them to the web site, be careful to letter-spell the whole address for clarity.

Call me or one of your District's Indiana Lions for the ISBVI trustees if you need help or have questions and with any registrations. You may also redirect any questions from the schools or students to me.

One final note: Often, student clubs don't have the funds to support a team. If your club would like to sponsor them, that is ideal. We also have some sponsored slots for teams already available!

Mid-Winter Conference Redesigned, Rescheduled, and Simplified for Lions' Convenience

Going back to its roots, this year's Mid-Winter Conference will return to the 2nd weekend in January (Jan. 11-12, 2019). MWC organizers realized that the November timetable had too many conflicts with Lions events throughout the state, and the relatively free January calendar dates offered a better opportunity for attendance. This year's committee also took a long hard look at the entire event and have made numerous adjustments.

What had been a confusing mixture of one and two-hour seminars and workshops that made some attendees to miss some topics of interest, this year's schedule has been simplified. The number of seminars has been reduced to 16 one-hour programs, and all will be held Saturday morning. Each Lion attending the MWC can choose four of the 16 sessions to attend. The Conference ends with a luncheon, featuring a keynote speaker that should be informative, as well as entertaining for all Lions.

Final details on the exact seminar titles have not been finalized, but look for topics such as: How to organize your district's (club's) eyeglass recycling; Marketing Communications Specialist - What should that person do?; Membership recruiting- New efforts for clubs to consider; Anyone can make baked beans- An answer to 'We've always done it that way!'; Leverage community partnerships to maximize your fundraising and service activities; Looking at the new MyLion. New presenters, including several from outside Indiana, have been scheduled to bring new, refreshing information.

The committee also moved the venue to the Crowne Plaza Hotel & Conference Center, located at the Indianapolis International Airport. All activities will be inside this facility, making it easy for attendees to park and remain there for both Friday and Saturday activities. 


