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

# Thankful November

Hello 25F Lions! How many of us still have leftover Thanksgiving items? Hopefully not many unless they are frozen. Speaking of frozen, our Winter Special Olympics is happening in January and they are asking all clubs in the State to donate. If you do plan to send a contribution, please don't wait till our District Convention, send it to our Cabinet Treasurer who can send it off to Special Olympics. Now I'm not just promoting Special Olympics as there are other State and District projects and committees that need your donations. However, I will ask that every Lion in the District think about donating to LCIF. While in LCIF Training, we heard a tearjerker of a story. Now normally I would be very skeptical about these as they just want your money. I am asking that you all read this, make your own opinion, & if you agree like me, donate.

## Lion Clarence Harris - Why did you become a Lion?

I've been blessed with good fortune in life and became a Lion to serve my community and help those less fortunate and have fun. Martin Luther King said, "We can all be great because we can all serve." Clarence also said; "Because my wife, Past International Director Karla, told me to join Lions."

## What keeps you as an active Lion?

I've seen the extraordinary service accomplishments of Lions working together and are supported by LCIF. I know firsthand that one Lion can make a difference in the world.

## What impact have you seen LCIF make?

In Wisconsin, we've historically greatly benefited from grants received for disaster relief, sight, and youth, but the most recent grant and the one pending are the most exciting grants ever! Late last year, we received a \$100,000 LCIF matching grant for a flow cytometer. It is the diagnostic equipment you have seen on TV that enables the process of turning one's own T-cells into cancer killing ninjas.

Of the 20 adults with stage 4 cancer treated for blood cancers this year, 8 of whom were given less than a month to live, 13 are in complete remission. We have another \$100,000 LCIF matching grant soon to be released for another flow cytometer and even more exciting, trials for children start later this year! There's no way our MDC could have purchased two flow cytometers without the funding support of LCIF. No one should outlive their children!

## Why is Campaign 100 important?

This Campaign allows me to carry on my wife's legacy of service and her work on eradicating childhood cancer. During the summer of 2016, First Vice President Gudrun asked Karla to chair her District Governor Elect school.

Unfortunately, Karla was diagnosed with malignant brain cancer in December of that year. Nevertheless, Gudrun keep her on as the Chair. The responsibility gave Karla a greater sense of purpose and that, I believe, added months to her life and for that, I will be eternally grateful to PIP Gudrun. Despite, three brain surgeries, radiation, chemotherapy, and twice daily shots in her stomach, Karla's resolve never wavered.

During the last five months of her life, Karla also agreed to participate in a research study of the brain whose goal was to help children with brain cancer. Despite many days of very low energy and headaches, she readily agreed to additional long, noisy, tiring MRIs each month.

The study also required me to shave her head every 3 days so she could wear 36 electrodes on her head that were intended to disrupt cancer cell division in her brain. The electrodes were hot and occasionally caused painful shocks and had to be worn a minimum of 18 hours a day, yet Karla never once complained.

Seeing her so uncomfortable, I told her to just stop the research. Her response was something I will never forget and something I carry with me every day. Karla said; "It's for the children. I'm a Lion for life and that means not only for *my* life, but also for life means for the lives of those children this research might help." She didn't know that a child is diagnosed with cancer every two minutes and the average age is just 6. Karla only wanted to help.

I am happy to report that she submitted her final materials for the District Governor Elect School and held a 2-hour conference call with leadership to review her work and the slate of instructors. Karla received much acclaim that day. She was thrilled, watched two hours of Friends, ate rice pudding, and later that night had the fatal brain bleed that ultimately ended her life, fittingly, on All-Saints day.

As part of the research, Karla donated her brain and as an organ donor, two individuals received the gift of sight. You see one person can make a great difference in the world and you can be that difference!

I recently retired to spend more time getting the word out about Campaign 100 and letting Lions know that \$100 a year will provide equipment to treat 8 children with cancer.

The great thing about Campaign 100 is, there is something for every Lion to get excited about. For me, it is childhood cancer and diabetes but for you, it might be vision, youth, disaster relief, the environment, hunger, and or measles. Most important, every Lion can make a difference in our world by giving to LCIF, telling our service story, or by helping more people in need, or ideally, all three.

If there is not anything in this Campaign that gets you excited and want to give as you are able – you don't have a pulse. To reach and exceed our goal and meet the needs of hundreds of millions of people, we will need the help of every Lion. Please join us as we take our service to the next level and leave a proud legacy to our children and their children. We need your help. You can make a difference! Where there's a need, there's a Lion!

Heart Breaking, Right? The sad part is, it's true. Please consider making a personal donation or ask your LCIF Coordinator to come make a presentation.

**How** are we going to do this?

**Wear Your Lions Pin EVERYWHERE!** I wear mine everyday – it's called getting the brand recognition out there. We know we need more Lions and young Lions too!

**Find** new member *prospects* at fundraisers, fall festivals, news articles, TV news, Facebook, wherever you meet people! Invite them to service projects and evenings out.

**Refer** prospects to your club GMT if you're not comfortable making the approach. YOU don't have to do it all, WE all must do it!!!

**Tell** them that you think they are doing great and have they ever considered being a Lion? You may get their permission to ask them to be a Lion quicker than you think! Especially Generation X (40-54) – How do I know? Because that's me!

**Follow up** on your *contacts* with a message inviting them to talk more about being a Lion if they want to hear more, later.

**Make the ask.** "So, would you like to be a Lion with us?" is a great suggestive ask. Fill out the paperwork and get their check or cash. Working on a way to use cards.

**If they say, "not right now".** Club GMTs – here's your prospect list to keep updated, use to personally invite to your events and follow-up with them later.

**Hold a recruiting drive,** we can help you with ideas, staffing and materials – contact me.

**POST YOUR SUCCESS.** Welcome your new members on your club Facebook page and website with photos and their permission. Their example will bring their friends and family! Send pictures to the newsletter and Hoosier Lion! See our Facebook **District 25F Recruiting Forum page** for new updates too!

**Make them your newest recruiter.** Once sworn in, ask them who else they would like to bring along to the party!

**COULD ADDING A BRANCH TO YOUR CLUB HELP YOU RECRUIT YOUNGER LIONS?**



Take a hard look at your clubs: let's be honest with each other – Is there a clique or two in your club that might be 'getting in the way' of the club? Could folding in a "mini-club" allow the addition of some new energy, ideas and personalities? A good way to include new ways of doing things while having more members along with the "old" ...Remember one is silver (new) but the other is still pure GOLD!

Are you finding that your club is serving less due to an aging membership, and you are not having success at recruiting younger Lions? As you attempt to recruit, are you hearing "I want to serve, but I don't want to join a traditional club" or "I don't have time for meetings or to serve as an officer". Perhaps it might be time to consider forming a branch.

A branch is a group of Lions within your club, that operate as a "mini-club". They rely upon your club's infrastructure to manage the administrative functions, so they are free to serve with few club duties. They choose their own meeting times, traditions and projects and set their own dues. They may decide to be a cyber branch, thereby eliminating the need for physical meetings. Therefore, your club can continue meeting and operating as it has, but you can also recruit Lions that can meet and

serve as they desire. Your club benefits because it continues to serve and grow. The branch Lions are full members of your club, and can step up to leadership roles in the club and beyond.

This is an excellent way for a legacy club that may be finding it difficult to continue to do service projects to expand its membership and serve in new areas. **A branch could be started with a group of Lions that cannot regularly attend your meetings due to work.** Other opportunities could be groups of people who want to work on one specific project, and would benefit from the Lions name, insurance, image/brand and non-profit status. Partnerships with churches, civic groups, neighborhood organizations, schools, parents, etc., are perfect places to seek out small groups to recruit as separate branches. This could also be a company that wants to support their employees serving and sponsors them to join your club as a group.

How about a young mother's branch that meets at playtime and one person watches the kids while the others do a service project. A group of parents that support their kid's sports team or band and need to raise funds and cover insurance. The branch can also recruit new Lions on their own, thereby expanding your service footprint further. The opportunities are only limited by your imagination. *Remember, these are not strangers that you are supporting, these are your Lions doing your Lions service under your club's name.*

Organization is simple, your club board approves the concept, you find a person/s to form the group, you join the Lions to your club in MyLCI and then establish the branch in MyLCI and identify a minimum of 5 Lions as members of the branch in MyLCI. A branch liaison is appointed, a president of the branch is elected, and you are up and rolling.


