November is National Diabetes Month

This month starts a series of articles on various Diabetes related topics.

One third of US adults are pre-diabetic; ninety percent do not know they are pre-diabetic. Lifestyle changes can prevent many, many of these pre-diabetics from developing diabetes.

The starting point in managing diabetes or pre-diabetes is to know if you have it or not!

Diabetes causes the body to either not produce enough insulin or not use the insulin it produces well. Insulin is necessary to help the body process glucose (sugar). Uncontrolled diabetes results in glucose levels that are too high.



Diabetes can be diagnosed with simple blood tests. The A1c test is a measure of glucose levels over a period of two to three months. Another test is a simple glucose test that measures the amount of glucose in the blood at a given point in time. A health care professional may use either of these tests to help make a diagnosis. These tests may be repeated a second time to diagnose diabetes.

Symptoms of diabetes include:

- Urinating often
- Feeling very thirsty
- Feeling very hungry even though you are eating
- Extreme fatigue
- Burry vision
- Cuts or bruises that are slow to heal
- Tingling, pain, or numbress in the hands or feet
- Very dry skin

Risk factors for diabetes include:

- Age
- Family history
- Activity level
- Weight

There is an excellent, quick seven question test to help you gauge your risk level for diabetes. It can be found by 'googling' the phrase American Diabetes Association Risk Test.

November is National Diabetes Month. Now is a good time to do yourself or someone you care about a favor and make sure they talk to a health care professional if they may be at risk of diabetes.

The source of the above information is the American Diabetes website and the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) website. Please note the information above is for general discussion purposes. Please consult a health care professional for specific questions you may have.

District Office and Trustee Nominations

It is time to submit your letters of intent to run for a District Office or Trustee position in District 25F.

Anyone who intends to run for District Governor, 1st or 2nd Vice District Governor must submit a request in writing to the District Nominations Chair, Lion Ken Faulkner. You will also need a letter of endorsement from your home club which states that you are a Lion in good standing in that club and that the club supports you and endorses your candidacy for office. This letter is due 30 days prior to the District Convention. Since the convention is being held on March 11, 2017 letters for District Offices will be due by February 9th, 2017.

Anyone intending to run for Trustee of the five state pro-

jects and the Indiana Lions Foundation will also need to submit their request in writing, and include the same type letter from your home club. These letters will be due by March 1, 2017, ten days prior to the District Convention.

Also Camp Woodsmoke Zone Trustees are to be elected at the last Zone Meeting of the year prior to the ending of a term of office. Region Trustees are to be elected at the Spring Cabinet/Convention Meeting prior to the ending of a term of office.

If you have questions about the requirements for any elected position, you may reference the District 25F Constitution and Bylaws, which may be found on the district website, lions25f.org. Lions Share Dictionaries with MV Third Grade Students

Recently the Fortville Lions delivered personal paperback dictionaries to Mt. Vernon third grade students in all three elementary schools. The dictionaries arrived just in time for the students to begin learning how to properly use a dictionary in their classroom. The children were very excited to have a dictionary of their own designed specifically for a younger reader which includes so much more information than just words. The students can also use their dictionaries to learn about the planets, countries of the world, US presidents and many other exciting topics including the longest word in the English language.

The Lions annual Dictionary Project began five years ago when it was learned that due to budgetary constraints there were only a few hardback dictionaries available in each third grade classroom. The Lions conferred with local principals and determined that there was a need for personal dictionaries. The Lions worked with the schools to begin the dictionary distribution. The teachers have found the personal dictionaries to be very helpful because the students are more likely to want to look up information in their own dictionaries.

The Fortville Lions used funds raised throughout the summer at the BBQ-To-Go events to provide approximately 300 dictionaries to students and teachers.

My Fellow Lions,

Hurricane Matthew affected several areas, including the Caribbean and the United States. It was the deadliest hurricane in the Atlantic Ocean since 2005. Many main roads are impassible and many bridges have been washed away. Food and drinking water are in short supply and many of those who need aid the most are still waiting for it to arrive. When disaster strikes, Lions are among the first to offer help to the victims, even though they are often victims themselves. Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) is right there beside them, ready to support their efforts with funding assistance through Lions disaster relief programs. Working together, LCIF, local Lions and Lions leaders assess the urgent needs and quickly deliver the aid most required by victims.

LCIF awarded an initial Emergency grant to Haiti to address immediate needs of disaster victims. Lions and Leos from Port-au-Prince traveled to Petit-Goâve to work with clubs there. Together, they have packed and distributed over 2,000 relief kits of medicine and food to residents in need. LCIF has also awarded an Emergency grant to the Lions of 31-N in North Carolina, USA. Lions there are braving the conditions to bring much needed food, water, blankets and medical supplies to those affected most by the storm. More updates about the relief work there is forthcoming. The situation is dire, but Lions are working to bring hope to their neighbors. You can show your support for Lions and their work by making a donation to LCIF's disaster relief fund today.

Meetings – Can They Finally Be On Time?

Running effective meetings is a matter of preparation and timing. Be sure to draft an agenda before every meeting, and don't forget to share it with all pertinent parties. If someone is slated to speak or present during the meeting, they should have a copy of the agenda ahead of time so they may prepare accordingly. Once the meeting begins, it is important to honor your members' own respective schedules by limiting the meeting to the originally scheduled time frame. It might be helpful to appoint someone (like the club's Tail Twister) to monitor speakers and ensure they stick to their allotted speaking time.

- GLT multiple district coordinators (1 per multiple district) on record with LCI are eligible for an operating budget of US\$600 per year.
- GLT district coordinators (1 per district) on record with LCI are eligible for an operating budget of US\$250 per year.
